PRESIDENT - TENNIS NSW



On behalf of the Board of Tennis NSW, it gives me great pleasure to present the President's Report for 2014/15.

Tennis NSW capped a fantastic year of growth in passing 115,000 registered players for the first time, indicating we are well on our way to our 2018 target of 330,000. Much of this growth can be credited to the hard work of the Tennis NSW staff and the dedication and commitment they have displayed towards achieving our goals under the leadership of CEO Alistair MacDonald.

There were several highlights of the NSW summer this year, with some key major events helping put tennis in NSW on the map. Undoubtedly the high point was the global launch of Tennis Australia's innovative new format, FAST4, through a special night with 17-time Grand Slam champion Roger Federer and Australian legend Lleyton Hewitt. It was fantastic to see this event sell out in just a few days and witnessing more than 12,300 fans pack the Qantas Credit Union Arena was truly spectacular. Sydney has taken the lead in establishing itself as the 'home of FAST4' and plans are in place to build on this in 2016.

This event tied in perfectly with another successful Apia International Sydney event and the introduction of Legends FAST4. Despite bad weather early in the week, it was great to see a sold-out crowd pack Ken Rosewall Arena for the men's final session. Iconic tennis personality John McEnroe and Australia's own Pat Rafter were crowd favourites, while we crowned two new champions in Petra Kvitova and Viktor Troicki.

2014 also saw the reintroduction of two Pro Tour events to Wollongong. Both events ran back to back in November and were a great success thanks to Tennis Wollongong and the Tennis NSW Tournaments staff. The two Pro Tours will return to Wollongong this year with plans to develop them even further.

Tennis NSW has worked tirelessly with members, government authorities/agencies and Tennis Australia on facility development throughout NSW, including work on a Western Sydney strategy and a Sydney based venue for major international events.

We have continued to improve our organisational capability representing financial strength and an effective ongoing business strategy. Operating expenses were reduced whilst maintaining investment into grassroots tennis activities. Our aspiration is to achieve financial sustainability by 2018 through having a breakeven budget after non-cash items and before investment income.

Tennis NSW has also taken positive strides towards ensuring Sydney Olympic Park Tennis Centre (SOPTC) is a financially sustainable best practice venue. In May, the Board resolved to introduce the



Tennis World model at SOPTC. Tennis World officially took over the venue management in July and will continue to work closely with Tennis Australia and Tennis NSW. Tennis World has had great success in managing venues at Melbourne Park and Albert Reserve in Victoria and we look forward to growing the SOPTC venue with them.

In the coming year, Tennis NSW will be reviewing the guiding governance principles of the organisation in consultation with members. One particular area will be that of voting rights. We will also be introducing a range of new software options for members with the aim of providing them with the tools to better manage and run their centres and facilities.

Finally, I would like to thank the professional and extremely knowledgeable Board of Directors who provide leadership, governance and a clear strategic direction for the organisation. 2014/15 has been a fantastic year for tennis in NSW and I look forward to continuing to grow our great sport with each of you in the coming years.

TENNIS AUSTRALIA CEO MESSAGE



There is a real buzz about our sport, whether it be in the suburbs of Sydney or in regional New South Wales.

Loyalty, Excellence, Teamwork and Humility are the values that underpin our daily operations, complemented by an innate innovative streak.

We value our excellent and highly collaborative working relationship with Tennis NSW, which we believe helps drive benefits for the sport throughout the community.

Highlights of the past financial year include the work Tennis NSW has done to establish the Grassroots Facilities Reserve Fund (GFRF), which is now under successful management, and the global launch of FAST4 tennis with Roger Federer and Lleyton Hewitt in front of a sell-out crowd at the Qantas Credit Union Arena in January. A new operating model is now in place at Sydney Olympic Park Tennis Centre, and it was very pleasing to see more than 115,000 players register to Tennis NSW in the past 12 months.

These achievements have been symptomatic of many of the areas in which we work together to help drive growth in tennis and support those who deliver it, whether they be clubs, administrators, associations, volunteers, coaches or parents.

The joint effort from the entire tennis community has led to an incredible surge in the popularity of ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, with more than 570.000 children across the nation enjoying the experience in the past 12 months and 1043 primary schools involved.

An additional 319 new or reconditioned courts have been delivered in the past year, with a total of 2154 courts delivered as part of the National Court Rebate Scheme since its inception in 2007. We continue to work together to provide quality facilities for players of all abilities at both metropolitan and regional locations.

Australian Open 2015 enjoyed a record attendance of 703,000 in a summer that also featured the global launch of FAST4 tennis and a brilliant Emirates Australian Open thank you for your unrelenting Series of lead-in events, attracting strong attendances and excellent viewing audiences on television and online around the world. That, of course, includes Apia International Sydney, which was very well run, highly entertaining and attracted great reviews from players and fans alike.

The appointment of Pat Rafter led to a restructuring of the Performance team with the aim of building on all the good work of recent years done in each of the National Academies.

The results from the Australian players have been encouraging but there is still plenty of work to be done at all levels and we are looking forward to continuing the journey.

There are exciting plans for the continued growth and development of our sport, from grassroots to the elite level. Participation initiatives including ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, FAST4 and our player registration program will remain a focus and continue to drive more people to play more tennis, more often at tennis courts around the country.



TENNIS NSW CEO REPORT



I am pleased to report that Tennis Membership in NSW has continued to grow, with our core focus over the past 12 months on participation.

Last year we identified three major strategic objectives that would enable us to reach our overarching participation goals. Thus, we have implemented a plan to reach financial sustainability, enhance our major events in NSW and to create Sydney Olympic Park Tennis Centre as a best practice tennis venue and a training base for our affiliates.

In regards to our major priorities, I am pleased to report that we are on track to achieve our 2018 targets. This year we reduced our operating deficit (excluding investment income) by over 30%, we had approximately 70,000 fans attend Apia International Sydney and the global launch of FAST4 in Sydney during January. We also welcomed a great partnership with Tennis Australia and Tennis World which will help us deliver a best practice tennis and training ground at Sydney Olympic Park.

With our plan in motion, it is encouraging to see that NSW tennis is making progress towards the national goal of 1 million players nationally by 2020. As a state based organisation we have now reached over 115,000 registered players.

In 2014/15 we have spent considerable time working with our members to build stronger working relationships with our state and local governments. Local governments are collectively our number one stakeholder in tennis and we continue to work with Councilors and Council staff to ensure that tennis is a priority community activity for their respective local areas.

Over the last few months and moving forward over the next 12 months we have been working on our communication and we are excited about some of the products and services that will become available to our members in the coming months. On the back of the launch of our new Tennis NSW website, Member Clubs will soon have access to new competition software, a world class player rating system, online court booking systems and a significantly enhanced membership Finally, we would like to thank the management tool. All of these are designed and provided for our Members in an attempt to minimise administration time and increase time spent on the court.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to reflect on a significant project that Tennis NSW and Tennis Australia collaborated on with the state government. In January 2015 we hosted the global launch of FAST4 in Sydney, with Roger Federer and Lleyton Hewitt facing off in Sydney's CBD. It was fantastic to see the event sell out in less than 48

hours and furthermore, over 40% of our tickets were sold to our registered players and fans in a special pre-sale during the first 24 hours. In addition to this, it was also great to see the men's final at Apia international Sydney sell out with John McEnroe and Pat Rafter opening the evening with a special FAST4 match. While the event itself faced significant challenges due to wet weather, this highlighted the need for Sydney to have a covered court to showcase tennis and this is something that we are working collaboratively on with the state government.

I want to thank the Board of Tennis NSW for their continued support and our incredible staff who commit so many hours and travel so many kilometres to work with our coaches and volunteers. A special thank you must also go to Tennis Australia who has assisted tennis in NSW across a variety of areas. Furthermore, I would also like to thank Martin Leo and HEAD Tennis for their fantastic partnership. A special thank you must go to Minister Stuart Ayres and his team and administration whose support and counsel is much appreciated.

GOVERNANCE

Tennis NSW continues to undertake important initiatives in order to work towards having a best practice governance strategy in place for a state sporting organisation. These initiatives highlighted below ensure the organisation is best positioned to maintain its longevity by having optimal structural and operational procedures in place.



THESE INITIATIVES INCLUDE:

REVIEW OF CONSTITUTION

Tennis NSW is currently undertaking a review of its constitution in order to bring it into line with the Australian Sports Commissions (ASC) recommendations. This analysis aims to ensure Tennis NSW operates under best governance principles for a state sporting organisation.

UPDATE TENNIS NSW BY-LAWS


Tennis NSW has updated their ByLaws to include changes to how Tennis Country and Tennis Sydney operate.

ANALYSIS OF BOARD SKILLS

An evaluation of the Tennis NSW Board was undertaken in order to evaluate the combined skills of the non-executive directors of the Board as a collective unit. This analysis has enabled Tennis NSW to identify any gaps in the current skill set of the Board and will be used when appointing Board Members in the future.

WHS AND RISK

Tennis NSW undertook an enterprise wide risk management process during the 2014/15 year. This process has allowed Tennis NSW to identify its high level risks in all areas of the business and put processes in place in order to reduce the likelihood of these occurring.



PARTICIPATION

The Participation team consists of 11 full-time staff employed to work directly with our Members in NSW, as we strive towards our goal of 330,000 registered players by 2018. This number is made up of participants within both the ANZ Tennis Hot Shots program and Cardio Tennis, as well as Club Members and competition players.





ANZ TENNIS HOT SHOTS

A major focus for the Participation team in 2014/15 was to continue to grow the ANZ Tennis Hot Shots program through Coaches, Clubs and Schools. At year end, over 37,000 kids were registered with the program in NSW, across 390 venues (Clubs & Coaches), 235 primary schools and 11 secondary schools. Nationally, the ANZ Hot Shots program ticked over 200,000 registered participants making it the largest grassroots sporting program in terms of overall participants in the country.

Given the emphasis on ANZ Tennis Hot Shots programming in recent years, the more recent focus has been on the establishment of additional and relevant playing opportunities through ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Leagues to ensure kids remain in the sport. Over 300 kids, across 13 venues were involved in the initial roll out of these leagues that focus on team tennis, teaching the basics of scoring and game play.

AWARDS & RECOGNITION

Craig Louis, Head Coach at Gunnedah Tennis Club, received some well-deserved recognition when he was awarded the "Coaching Excellence - Club" award at the Australian Tennis Awards. Whilst Parkes Public School took home the award for "Most Outstanding School".

Local Gunnedah resident, Anna Bishop, was not only selected as ANZ Tennis Hot Shots player of the Month. but was also selected by ANZ to be the face of their promotional campaign, appearing in collateral in ANZ branches all over the country. ANZ also organized a private meet and greet with her favourite player, Novak Djokovic during the Australian Open.

A NSW Hot Shots participant was also the winner of the 2014 ANZ Tennis Hot Shot of the Year Award. TJ Gordon from Umina Beach won \$5000 cash, one year of free coaching and a private lesson from former world No.8 Alicia Molik at his Club.

Congratulations also go to Wendy Hudson from Kendall Tennis Club, who was awarded the Community Sport Administrator of the Year award at the 2014/15 Sport NSW Awards.

AO TENNIS BLITZ

NSW cleaned up again in the 2014 AO Tennis Blitz with Kendall and Casino finishing first and second respectively on the national town leaderboard. As a result, Novak Djokovic (Kendall) and Serena Williams (Casino) represented their towns at the Australian Open. When both players went on to take out the title in their respective events, the towns scored a permanent AO Tennis Blitz sign, signed memorabilia and an AO Trophy Tour weekend visit. A great result for two passionate and dedicated tennis clubs.

For the first time, as part of the AO Tennis Blitz, the Australian Open opened its doors to players of all ages and abilities through the Win a Wildcard events. Northern Suburbs Tennis Association played host to the NSW event, with over 61 pairs turning out for their shot at winning a Mixed Doubles wildcard into the Australian Open.





COMPETITIONS

NSW continued to grow and develop elite competitions through the Asia-Pacific Tennis League (ATL) and the development of the Sydney Tennis League (STL) and North West Tennis League (NWTL). All three competitions showcased the new FAST4 format and some fantastic results were achieved in each. Tennis NSW will look to build on the success of all three events as we continue to develop the competitions space.

TENNIS NSW TEAM UP WITH NICKELODEON TO DELIVER A MASSIVE KIDS TENNIS DAY AT THE APIA INTERNATIONAL SYDNEY

KIDS DAY AT APIA INTERNATIONAL SYDNEY

Kid's Tennis Day presented by Nickelodeon was a great success in 2015, with more players than ever out and about interacting with fans. Despite the persistent drizzle, thousands of kids enjoyed a visit from Nickelodeon characters including SpongeBob, Dora the Explorer and Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, an exhibition match and activities around the grounds.

INCLUSIONS

Results continued to flow in the wheelchair space, with NSW laying claim to 4 athletes in the Top 50 across the ITF Wheelchair Tennis Ratings - Adam Kellerman (11), Ben Weekes (20), Keegan Oh-Chee (40) and in the ladies, Janel Manns (44). Thanks to GIO for their ongoing and generous support of these athletes through the Australian Summer of Tennis campaign. To top off the year, Adam Kellerman was rewarded for a great year on the court when he took out the award for 'Most Outstanding Athlete with a Disability' at the Australian Tennis Awards and NSW/Australian wheelchair tennis legend, David Hall, was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame.

Kelly Wren continued her impressive reign over the Australian Tennis Championships for players with an intellectual disability winning her 18th consecutive title at Melbourne Park. Kelly's brother Michael also had a successful year, winning bronze at the Special Olympics World Games in LA.

Securing some funding from Tennis Australia, Tony Podesta School of Tennis implemented a multicultural tennis program for refugees in the Fairfield area that improved accessibility to tennis for local residents with a multicultural background.

PLACES TO PLAY

The Tennis NSW - Places to Play Team remain focused on driving grassroots tennis facility development, assisting stakeholders in brokering successful project partnerships and developing/educating affiliates with regard to sustainable venue outcomes. Also, building and evolving relationships with our government stakeholders remains key to future Places to Play strategy.



FACILITIES

The Places to Play team continues to focus on stimulating investment in local infrastructure to create high-quality places to play tennis in NSW communities. Working alongside our membership on small, medium or large scale projects is vital to delivering Tennis successfully across the state. Our assistance ranges from providing affiliates with technical information, leasing and licensing advice, assistance with Local Council negotiations, infrastructure improvements at facilities, asset management support, business development opportunities and forecasting demand for tennis. Providing support in these key areas is important to securing facility project success and creating great places to play tennis in NSW.

LEASING

The leasing and licensing of public tennis facilities remains a key challenge for the sport. Striking the right balance between commercial pressures for land owners and community benefit is a difficult task in some areas of NSW, particularly in Sydney. Tennis is currently developing a program to drive positive change in these areas and influence lease conditions at local facilities for the benefit of tennis and the wider community. Warringah Council in partnership with Tennis NSW recently delivered a Council wide tennis leasing strategy.

The new strategy promotes best practice in leasing/licensing from a local Government perspective whilst maintaining a direct focus on facility condition and ongoing maintenance requirements.

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

A strong focus for the Places to Play team in 2014/15 was Local Government relations. In collaboration with Inside Edge Sport and Leisure Planning and Tennis Australia, Tennis NSW commissioned its first state-wide Local Government Places to Play survey. The survey focused on a range of key indicators such as leasing, understanding of capital maintenances costs/procedures and future planning/strategy for tennis facilities in Local Government areas. The results of the survey were telling and will assist Tennis NSW in driving strategy, education and resources through our Local Government partnerships.

Tennis NSW also maintains a strong link with State Government as we recognise the broader role they play in delivering and enhancing grassroots sport across our State. Tennis was a lead participant in the State Government - Future Needs of Sport study in 2014/15, this is an ongoing project which seeks to define strategic sporting developments across NSW. We look forward to the impact this study will have on tennis and investment in our sport.



A number of major projects have been completed within the 2014/15 year across NSW. These projects have been successful in leveraging funds from a range of project partners, which has assisted in them reaching fruition. Key major projects which were completed in 2014/15 were:

- Tennis Tweed development of 8 new hard courts and clubhouse
- SOPTC Lighting project - Led Lighting Upgrade

Other major projects which are nearing completion:

- Tennis Terranora
- Blacktown Stanhope Gardens
- Kendall TC
- Knox Grammar School
- Nepean & District Tennis
 Association Woodriff Gardens

Tennis NSW is also working with a number of affiliates with regard to site master planning activities in partnership with Tennis Australia and SportDev.





TOURNAMENTS

It has been another successful year for Tournaments in NSW with over 400 tournaments conducted across NSW country and metropolitan regions in 2014/15.

A number of key tournament directors and officials continue to provide great leadership in this space and TNSW is indebted to those who assist in delivering the NSW tournament calendar.

Thank you to all concerned for your time and effort in ensuring these events are run and officiated to a high standard across the state. TNSW wishes to also thank the Tennis Australia Tournaments team who continue to provide great support to NSW and assist in the delivery of an outstanding tournament calendar.



MAJOR TOURNAMENTS

The TNSW Tournament's team hosted some of the largest tournaments nationally in 2015, including the return of the ITF Pro Tour to Wollongong. Major tournaments hosted in NSW during the year included:

- ITF Pro Tour events in Wollongong in November
- ITF Gosford Junior International
- AMT Platinum events at North Shore, Nepean and Sydney Olympic Park
- NSW Age
- State Teams events
- State Final

In 2015 the NSW Age officially became the largest junior tournament in Australia, with 558 players competing.

Also, for the first time the Apia Wheelchair International was fully integrated into the Apia International Sydney. The event hosted the best wheelchair players in the world, with world No. 1s Shingo Kunieda and Yui Kamiji of Japan winning the men's and women's events and Australian Dylan Alcott winning the quads event.



AUSTRALIAN RANKING TOURNAMENTS

In line with our strategy to provide high quality competitive opportunities for players and to produce Grand Slam Champions from NSW, the organisation conducted 110 Australian Ranking (AR) tournaments. Tournament participation continued to climb with a 10% increase in participation numbers across NSW.

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT SERIES

112 Junior Development Series (JDS) events were held across the state during the year, culminating in the country regions Champion of Champions' events and the Junior Development Series Final at Richmond and Penrith in November.

Thanks to all country regions and the metropolitan region for their continued participation.

OTHER TOURNAMENTS

The tournament calendar also boasts a number of Non-AR events, including over 30 Tennis Seniors events and a further 96 round robin and general tournaments. These participation opportunities are key to driving interest and participation in tennis and we will continue to work with the relevant stakeholders to conduct meaningful participatory tournaments across the state.



CHAIR UMPIRES

OFFICIATING

2014/15 saw the introduction of the Tennis Australia Officiating Membership program. From 1 July 2015 Tennis Australia assumed all responsibilities for the recruitment, training and ongoing mentorship and development of officials at all levels

As part of this change, Tennis Officials Australia - New South Wales Division (TOA NSW), elected to cease operations. It is with great appreciation that we acknowledge the contribution of TOA NSW President Glenn Toland, and the other TOA NSW Board Members for their invaluable contribution to the development of officiating in NSW.

With the continued support from Tennis Australia Officiating, a number of courses for newly recruited officials were presented in 2014/15, which resulted in the accreditation of 28 new line umpires, 7 chair umpires and 9 court supervisors.



PLAYER CONDUCT AND INTEGRITY UNIT

Tennis NSW wishes to thank the members of the TNSW Tribunal Panel - Paul Shead, Paul Archer, Kelvin Andrews and Bill Gilmour for their services and continued support. We would also like to welcome Shane Merry as the newest member of the panel.

Since the establishment of the integrity unit in 2013/14, it has implemented several initiatives to improve the general player behaviour of NSW players competing in our local tournament arena. The general philosophy of the unit is to address conduct concerns of individual players through early intervention and education.



This strategy has proven very successful, with several players exhibiting corrections in the way they conduct themselves at tournaments. We will continue to vigilantly monitor the information and statistics as produced by Tennis Australia through the Code of Behaviour management system, to ensure a supportive environment is created that is conducive to achieving corrective discipline.

PERFORMANCE





PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

The core NSW programs of National Academy, Player Support Team, and Talent Development all continued through the majority of 2014/15 largely without interruption. Numerous NSW players and coaches represented the pathway on a national and international level with noted success across all age groups.

The private coaching market remains paramount to the health of Athlete Development, with a majority of the coaching community continuing to show their support of the pathway for the betterment of players across the state. Recognition and support initiatives are primarily delivered through the Talent Development Coach program which remains a key component of Athlete Development.

With Patrick Rafter taking on the role of Performance Director at the beginning of 2015, there was a national shift towards a more inclusive and elongated pathway, which mirrors the direction undertaken in NSW over recent years. As part of the structural refinement, Talent Development was realigned to

Athlete Development and now more formally sits the base of the athlete development pathway. This will allow greater consistency of program delivery and effective allocation of resources.

COACH EDUCATION

Our focus in 2014/15 was both up-skilling new coaches and offering professional development opportunities for our existing TA Coach Members. Our courses, recognised by the International Tennis Federation, were successfully held in regional and metropolitan areas of NSW. In total. 29 courses were delivered and over 340 coaches attended.

Ongoing professional development included performance specific workshops run in conjunction with the Talent Development department and also the nationally led 'Grow your business, Grow the game' workshop. During the Apia International Sydney we had over 100 coaches attend a presentation from Darren Cahill. In the next 12 months we will be using more online resources, alongside traditional courses and workshops, to connect with our Coach Members in our bid to drive participation through developing quality coaches and deliverers.

ENGAGEMENT

MEMBERSHIP

The 2014/15 Membership year saw membership figures in NSW reach an all-time high, building on the breakthroughs made in 2013/14 as a result of the membership reform policies.

Tennis NSW affiliated Members (Clubs, Associations and Court Operators) grew from 494 to 511 over the past 12 months with over 115,000 players, ANZ Tennis Hot Shots and Cardio Tennis participants now registered in NSW, growth of 17% on the previous year.

2014/15 also saw the introduction of the TennisConnect Rewards Program, a national initiative aimed at getting as many tennis participants to verify their details with their State Association in order to connect the tennis playing community and create greater access to the benefits on offer. Clubs, Coaches and Schools were offered \$5 for every one of their players that verified their details, with more than 32,000 verifying in NSW. This resulted in Clubs sharing over \$107,000 in reward and Coaches sharing over \$43,000. City Community Tennis verified the most members in NSW, and second most in Australia, earning \$5280 which they put towards their Community Tennis Project Fund.

TennisConnect was the first step to migrating Membership online and was followed up with a reaffiliation option for all Member Clubs through My Tennis. This was the first year Members had been able to re-affiliate online and saw more than 160 Clubs take up the option. We are hopeful this number will continue to grow as the MyTennis platform undergoes a more user-friendly upgrade in October.

We would like to thank our Member Committees for their support throughout the year and we look forward to working with all Clubs, Associations and Court Operators on some exciting initiatives over the next 12 months.



MARKETING / COMMUNICATIONS

Tennis NSW has placed a large focus on improving communications over the past 12 months, with several exciting advances made in this space.

TennisConnect was a major project, influencing the way TNSW could communicate. By ensuring we have verified data and the correct opt-in settings in place, the organisation can now better engage with players to communicate relevant tennis news, important updates and upcoming tennis events.

Our communications channels also received an upgrade, with a Tennis NSW Twitter created (@Tennis_NSW) and the relaunch of the TNSW website in July. Off the back of the website launch, Clubs and players will also soon have access to a world class player rating system,

online court booking systems and a streamlined membership management platform.

The Get Court Up campaign established in 2013/14 has been continued across all marketing and communications materials, enabling TNSW to create consistent messaging across all platforms. This campaign has been highly effective and will continue to be incorporated into all our TNSW and Apia International Sydney materials.

Our focus continues to be on establishing strong communication channels and engaging messaging that will enable us to advocate and drive participation opportunities across our member and playing communities.

SYDNEY OLYMPIC PARK TENNIS CENTRE (SOPTC)

Sydney Olympic Park Tennis Centre (SOPTC) continues to provide ample community tennis opportunities, high quality tournaments and events, and player development opportunities for high level NSW players, as well as playing host to the Apia International Sydney in January.

The cost structure of SOPTC remains a significant challenge for Tennis NSW, however following recent agreement the Sydney Olympic Park Authority (SOPA) have committed to a Venue Maintenance Deed, which has provided some welcomed relief in this area. In addition, a number of capital works projects have occurred at the site during the period.

Tennis NSW wishes to thank the SOPA, the Sydney Olympic Park Business Association (SOPBA) and Tennis Australia for their support at SOPTC during the year.

This year, SOPTC hosted over 20 Australian Ranking (AR) and Non-AR Tournaments and a range of competitions and events, including the Asia-Pacific Tennis League and Sydney Tennis Leagues for NSW and ACT players. ANZ Tennis Hot Shots programs and Adult competitions expanded this year in line with the national competitions focus. Major events were held at the venue during the period, namely the Apia International Sydney with 68,000 patrons in January 2015 and the Bengali Indian Festival with close to 10,000 patrons in April 2015. A range of other off-court activities continued to support the bottom line of the SOPTC business.


In excess of \$800k worth of Capital Expenditure works took place at SOPTC over 2014/15. Included within the scope was:

- Tennis NSW Office Refurbishment
- LED Lighting Upgrade
- Compliance works
- Court Resurfacing

The Apia International Sydney became the first internationally broadcast tennis event utilising LED lighting technology (Show Court 1). There is growing interest amongst Tennis NSW affiliates regarding LED lighting and we expect the interest to continue to grow, given the direct benefits of its introduction. We would like to take this opportunity to thank our lighting project partners Sydney Olympic Park Authority (SOPA) and GigaTera.

TENNIS WORLD AT SOPTC

During the latter part of 2014/15, the Board of Tennis NSW undertook a thorough review of SOPTC Tennis Operations and considered options for future management of the venue. This resulted in Tennis World (a business unit of Tennis Australia, specialising in facility management services) being appointed as operators of SOPTC into the future. Tennis World was subsequently transitioned into SOPTC through May- July 2015 and launched on 1 July 2015. A huge thanks to the team who delivered a great program at SOPTC during the year and most importantly assisted greatly with the Tennis World transition.





APIA INTERNATIONAL SYDNEY 2015

10,891 fans attended the final session on Saturday, 17 January to see the iconic John McEnroe take on Aussie great Pat Rafter in the first men's FAST4 legends match, before Serbia's Viktor Troicki triumphed over Kazakhstan's Mikhail Kukushkin for his first Sydney title. It was the largest Ken Rosewall Arena crowd since the Sydney Olympics in 2000.

WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIPS

In 2015, the Apia International Sydney draw featured an incredible six of the top 10 ranked women in the world, with the main draw cut off an impressive No. 28. While many of the favourites fell, two-time Wimbledon champion Petra Kvitova held strong to notch her first victory in Sydney over countrywoman and WTA Rising Star Karolina Pliskova. After overcoming 2014 champion Tsvetana Pironkova in the semifinals, Kvitova triumphed in two hard fought sets in what was the first all-Czech title match at the tournament in the Open era.

"It's always nice to win a title for sure. It's a great feeling and I'm just glad to have it here," Kvitova said.

MEN'S CHAMPIONSHIPS

Saturday night was one for the history books at Sydney Olympic Park Tennis Centre, with a sold out Ken Rosewall Arena enjoying a night packed full of action. American great John McEnroe and Australia's own Pat Rafter took to centre court for the first ever Legends FAST4 showpiece, entertaining the crowd and proving why they are considered true greats of the game.

They were followed by a top quality match between Serbia's Viktor Troicki and Kazakhstan's Mikhail Kuskushkin in what was the first all-qualifier final in ATP Tour history. 2011 runner-up Troicki proved too good for Kukushkin, cruising to a two sets win and his first title in five years. The win proved a catalyst for the former world No.12, as he continued his fine form throughout the first half of the year to move back into the world's top 20.

"Very happy. A lot of emotions actually. It's been a tough road, a lot of work, and it paid off with a nice title," Troicki said.

"I had a great week behind me and it's just everything was really satisfying."

January also saw Sydney play host to the global launch of FAST4 tennis, a shortened format of the game designed to speed up a conventional tennis match. World No. 2 and Grand Slam singles record holder Roger Federer, faced off against Aussie superstar Lleyton Hewitt at the Qantas Credit Union Arena in front of a sold out crowd.

The scene was set for the evening with a stunning event launch on Sydney's Harbour, with Federer and Hewitt trading volley's on speedboats before having a hit on a custom built court in front of the Sydney Opera House.

Highlights of One Night with Federer and Hewitt included:

- Sold out within 72 hours of tickets going on sale
- 12, 340 fans packed Qantas Credit Union Arena while 2.4 million Australians tuned in on Channel 9

COMMITTEES & MUSEUM

TENNIS SYDNEY MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

After undergoing a review in late 2013/14, the Tennis Sydney Committee was reformed in 2014/15 with a specific charter and clearly defined purpose - building a strong and relevant competition structure within Metropolitan Sydney, in collaboration with Clubs, Associations and Coaches.

The group are excited about the opportunity to have a real impact on the sport in this space and have held several workshops and discussions in order to review, develop and profile competition tennis in Sydney. The general enthusiasm and acceptance for change has been a constant throughout and the group look forward to sharing and implementing their recommendations with all stakeholders shortly.

We would like to thank the members of the current Tennis Sydney Committee, TNSW Board Members, TNSW Management and all those who have been involved in discussions and consultation to get the work to this point. In particular, we would like to acknowledge Ginette Porteous (TNSW Director & Tennis Sydney Chair) for her passion, dedication and extensive research efforts to keep the group progressing towards its objectives.

TENNIS COUNTRY

The Tennis Country Management Committee (TCMC) has continued its important work on country events and fixtures during the 2014/15 year. The Committee met three times to discuss issues affecting tennis in the six country regions.

The following highlights stand out -

• Forster was the host of the NSW Country Closed Championships for the second year running. Entries increased dramatically on last year in both the AMT and the JT events. Thanks goes to Ellen, Darren, Tim, Dave and Justin for their invaluable assistance in ensuring that the tennis events, Country Starz induction, Country Starz Invitational, Barefoot Bowls at Forster Bowling Club as well as the "Welcome to Forster" event and meetings with TNSW staff who attended went off without a hitch. A big vote of thanks goes to the Forster Tennis Club members, who look after everyone well and it remains a popular choice of venue.

 The TCMC made the momentous decision this year to rename the Country Week to the NSW Teams Carnival hosted by Tennis Country. The finer details for this event will be discussed at our forthcoming workshop and these details will be forwarded shortly. • The Country Starz program continues to go from strength to strength. In the 2014/15 period, we had representatives from each country region and the teamwork and support of each other at various tournaments has been unified. Trudi Musgrave is the Starz coach and is present at all tournaments.

- The Foundation Cup, held in Melbourne in January, is a flagship event for the TCMC. The eight junior TCMC representatives have a great week of tennis and have the opportunity of playing this event with a court coach. Darren and Bernadette did a great job this year and TCMC were fortunate to again win both the boys and girls events.
- City v Country Challenge teams events were also contested during the 2015 Apia International Sydney. The country side were defeated by their city counterparts this year but our teams put in an excellent effort. The afternoon prior to the Challenge, TCMC conducted a training afternoon courtesy of the members of the Country Starz on the clay courts at SOPTC and then spent the rest of the afternoon/ evening watching tennis in Ken Rosewall Arena.

TCMC was restructured during the year and has an Independent Chair, 6 Country Delegates and 6 Regional Delegates. Our challenge for this year is to come up with a Business Plan outlining where we wish to see both TC and each of the 6 regions placed in 5 years. A big task but one that needs to be done!

THE AUSTRALIAN TENNIS MUSEUM

The major exhibition at The Australian Tennis Museum in 2015 was 'Remembering White City', the iconic venue which was the Tennis NSW headquarters at Rushcutters Bay for 77 years from 1922-1999. Many past players and fans enjoyed the exhibition, which looked back at the great matches held there, including famous Davis Cup moments. Apia International Sydney saw almost 2,500 visitors through the Museum doors and our revamped group tours have brought in 1000 visitors over the last 9 months.

The 2015 Ken Rosewall Luncheon was held on May 25 with special guest speakers Bill Sidwell and John Fitzgerald. Sports commentator Garry Wilkinson again delivered probing interviews revealing Bill's tennis triumphs and his long career with Slazenger and John's Davis Cup insights and assessment of the young players now emerging in Australia. More than 150 guests were joined by other tennis champions including Lesley Bowrey, John Cheadle, Beryl Collier, Mark Edmonson, David Hall, John Marks, Jan O'Neill, Kim Warwick and, of course. Ken Rosewall. Patron of the Australian Tennis Museum.

The Museum received many significant donations throughout the year such as a double strung Blackburne racquet, the old bar doors from the original White City Clubhouse (now installed in the museum library) and tennis memorabilia from the great Thelma Coyne Long (1918-2015). Ken Rosewall also donated clothing items from his professional tennis career, including a World Champion Tennis jacket worn on the American circuit.

The Australian Tennis Museum enjoys the support of 10 core volunteers who work every week and another 5 who join the team to help organise our two major annual events - the Apia International Sydney in January and the Ken Rosewall Luncheon in May. The volunteer team were finalists in the Sport NSW Community Sports Volunteer Awards and the Volunteering Australia Regional Volunteer Awards for mid-west Sydney (announced October). The Australian Tennis Museum volunteers are a valuable team who continue to contribute to the preservation of Australia's tennis heritage.

TENNIS NEW SOUTH WALES LIMITED DIRECTORS' REPORT

For the year ended 30 June 2015

To support both the Mission and Objects, Tennis NSW has developed a Strategic Plan for tennis in this state. The Board of Directors (Board) and senior management team updated the organisation's strategy in March 2014, to align the business further with Tennis Australia (TA) and to capitalise on the changing sport and recreation landscape in NSW. The plan has seven main areas;

- Governance
- Participation
- Places to Play (Facilities)
- Tournaments
- Performance
- Engagement
- Sydney Olympic Park Tennis Centre

5 **PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES**

The Company is a public company limited by guarantee and is a not-for-profit organisation.

The principal activities of the company during the financial year were to govern, promote and develop the game of tennis in New South Wales.

There was no significant change in the nature of these activities during the financial year.

OPERATING AND FINANCIAL REVIEW 6.

The Company's net result for the year ended 30 June 2015 was a surplus of \$394,136 (2014: \$2,332,571) and after including unrealised gains on investments, the total comprehensive Income of the Company was \$1,243,728 (2014: \$2,578,404). The 2014 result included a gain on a write-back of a provision of \$1.300.000.

STATE OF AFFAIRS 7.

The Company has complied with Australian Accounting Standards as issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board.

During the year, the company continued to engage in its principal activity which is disclosed in the financial statements and Item 5 of this Directors' Report.

EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO REPORTING DATE 8.

The Board of TNSW has resolved to enter into a Facility Operation Agreement (FOA) with Tennis World (TW), a business unit of Tennis Australia (TA) which provides best practice management services for major Tennis Centres. The FOA provides for the lease of a major portion of SOPTC to TW for a fee, for the purpose of establishing thereon a best practice facility management program. TNSW will retain under its control only that portion of SOPTC which is used for administrative purposes. TNSW will retain rights to use the relevant portions of SOPTC to conduct its major events such as the Apia International Sydney, Davis Cup etc. Under the FOA, TNSW retains an interest in earnings of TW/SOPTC. The FOA became effective from 1 July 2015 and will expire in December 2024. Other than this matter there have been no events subsequent to balance date which would have a material effect on the Company's financial statements.

LIKELY DEVELOPMENTS 9_

The Company will continue to pursue its principal activities whilst attempting to develop additional revenue streams for he future to assist the development of tennis in NSW. It is not expected that the results in future years will be adversely affected by the continuation of these operations.

10. ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATIONS

The Company's operations are not subject to any significant environmental regulations under Commonwealth, State or Territory legislation.

The directors are not aware of any significant breaches of environmental regulations during the period covered by this report.

INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE OF OFFICERS 11.

Indemnification

The Company has agreed to indemnify the directors and officers of the Company against all liabilities to another person (other than the Company or a related body corporate) that may arise from their position as directors of the company, except where the liability arises out of conduct involving a lack of good faith. The agreement stipulates that the Company will meet the full amount of any such liabilities, including costs and expenses.

Insurance Premiums

Tennis Australia, through a national insurance scheme, provides the Company with directors' and officers' liability, legal expenses and insurance contracts, for current and former directors and officers of the Company. The continuity of insurance has been maintained during the year.

1. REPORTING ENTITY

Tennis New South Wales Limited (the "Company") is a company domiciled in Australia. The Company is a company limited by guarantee. The address of the Company's registered office is:

Sydney Olympic Park Tennis Centre 1 Rod Laver Drive Sydney Olympic Park, NSW

The Company is a not for profit entity and the principal activities of the Company during the course of the financial year were the promotion and development of the game of tennis in New South Wales.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

(A) STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

The financial statements are Tier 2 general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001. These financial statements comply with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements.

The financial statements were approved by the Board of Directors on 18 August 2015.

(B) BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for derivative financial instruments and trading investments which are measured at fair value.

(C) FUNCTIONAL AND PRESENTATION CURRENCY

The financial report is presented in Australian dollars, which is the Company's functional currency.

(D) USE OF ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected.

In particular, information about significant areas of estimation uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amount recognised in the financial statements are described in the following note:

Note 15 - Property, plant and equipment (impairment assessment and determination of useful lives)

(E) COMPARATIVES

Due to the change of account presentation in the 2014 financial year, where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified to achieve consistency in disclosure with current year financial information.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- (A) FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS
 - (i) Non-derivative financial instruments

Non-derivative financial instruments comprise trade and other receivables, cash and cash equivalents, interest bearing liabilities, and trade and other payables.

Non-derivative financial instruments are recognised initially at fair value. Subsequent to initial recognition non-derivative financial instruments are measured as described below.

A financial instrument is recognised if the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial assets are derecognised if the Company's contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial assets expire or if the Company transfers the financial asset to another party without retaining control or substantially all risks and rewards of the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised if the Company's obligations specified in the contract expire or are discharged or cancelled.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances and call deposits.

Bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the company's cash management are included as a component of cash and cash equivalents for the purposes of the statement of cash flows.

(ii) Loans and receivables

Other non-derivative financial instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

(iii) Non-derivative financial liabilities

The group has the following non-derivative financial liabilities: trade and other payables.

Such financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value plus any directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition these financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

(B) PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

(i) Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost or deemed cost less accumulated depreciation (see below) and accumulated impairment losses. The cost of property, plant and equipment at 1 July 2004, the date of transition to AASBs, was determined by reference to its cost at that date.

Cost includes expenditures that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. The cost of self-constructed assets includes the cost of materials, direct labour, the initial estimate, where relevant, of the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located, and an appropriate proportion of production overheads. Purchased software that is integral to the functionality of the related equipment is capitalised as part of that equipment.

Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment (calculated as the difference between the net proceeds from disposal and the carrying amount of the item) is recognised in profit or loss.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED) 3.

- (B) PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT (CONTINUED)
 - (ii) Subsequent costs

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only when it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company. Ongoing repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

(iii) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment.

The estimated useful lives in the current and comparative periods are as follows:

٠	Leasehold Buildings and Stands	10–25 years
٠	Australian Tennis Museum (ATM)	10 -25 years
٠	Plant and equipment	2.5 -10 years
٠	Clay Courts	10 years
٠	Leasehold Powells Creek	10 years
•	SOPTC Grounds	10 -15 vears

The residual value, the useful life and the depreciation method applied to an asset are reassessed at least annually.

(C) INVENTORIES

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of inventories is based on the firstin first-out principle, and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing location and condition. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

INTANGIBLE ASSETS (D)

(I) Recognition and measurement

Intangible assets that are acquired by the Company, which have finite useful lives, are measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

(ii) Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific asset to which it relates.

(iil) Amortisation

Amortisation is recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of intangible assets, other than goodwill, from the date they are available for use. The estimated useful life for the current and comparative periods are as follows:

• Leases - 25 years

Amortisation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

(E) IMPAIRMENT

(i) Financial assets (including receivables)

A financial asset is impaired if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset, and that the loss event(s) had an impact on the estimated future cash flows of that asset that can be estimated reliably.

An impairment loss in respect of a financial asset measured at amortised cost is calculated as the difference between its carrying amount, and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the original effective interest rate.

Individual significant financial assets are tested for impairment on an individual basis. The remaining financial assets are assessed collectively in groups that share similar credit risk characteristics.

All impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss.

An impairment loss is reversed if the reversal can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised, and this reversal is recognised in profit or loss.

(ii) Non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of the Company's non-financial assets, other than inventories, are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

An impairment loss is recognised if the carrying amount of an asset or its cash-generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount. A cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable asset group that generates cash flows that largely are independent from other assets and groups. Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss. Impairment losses recognised in respect of cash-generating units are allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the units and then to reduce the carrying amount of the other assets in the unit (group of units) on a pro rata basis.

The recoverable amount of an asset or cash-generating unit is the greater of its value in use and its fair value less costs to sell. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset.

Impairment losses recognised in prior periods are assessed at each reporting date for any indications that the loss has decreased or no longer exists. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised.

(F) EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

(i) Long-term employee benefits

The Company's net obligation in respect of long-term service benefits is the amount of future benefit that employees have earned in return for their service in the current and prior periods. The obligation is calculated using expected future increases in wage and salary rates including related on-costs and expected settlement dates, and is discounted using the rates attached to the Commonwealth Government bonds at the balance sheet date which have maturity dates approximating to the terms of the Company's obligations.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED) 3.

(ii) Short-term benefits

Liabilities for employee benefits for wages, salaries and annual leave represent present obligations resulting from employees' services provided to reporting date and are calculated at undiscounted amounts based on wage and salary rates that the Company expects to pay as at reporting date including related on-costs, such as workers compensation insurance and payroll tax.

A provision is recognised for the amount expected to be paid under short-term cash bonus or profit-sharing plans if the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

(G) **PROVISIONS**

A provision is recognised if, as a result of a past event, the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability.

(H) REVENUE AND OTHER INCOME

(i) Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of returns and allowances, trade discounts and volume rebates. Revenue is recognised when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the buyer, recovery of the consideration is probable, the associated costs and possible return of goods can be estimated reliably, and there is no continuing management involvement with the goods.

(ii) Rendering of services

Revenue from services rendered is recognised in the profit or loss in proportion to the stage of completion of the transaction at reporting date. The stage of completion is assessed by reference to surveys of work performed.

(iii) Financial Income

Income from investments are brought to account on a realised or accrued basis respectively when they can be reliably measured.

(iv) Grants

Reciprocal grants

Grants received on the condition that specified services should be delivered or conditions fulfilled are considered reciprocal. Such grants are initially recognised as a liability and revenue recognised as services are performed or conditions fulfilled.

Non-reciprocal grants

Where a grant is received where there is no performance obligation or return obligation, revenue is recognised when the grant is received or receivable.

(I) LEASE PAYMENTS

Payments made under operating leases are recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

FINANCE INCOME AND COSTS (J)

Finance income comprises interest income on funds invested. Interest income is recognised as it accrues, in profit or loss using the effective interest method.

(K) INCOME TAX

The income of the Company is exempt from income tax, and accordingly, no provision has been made in the accounts for income tax payable.

(L) GOODS AND SERVICES TAX

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated with the amount of GST included.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are classified as operating cash flows.

(M) NEW STANDARDS AND INTERPRETATIONS NOT YET ADOPTED

The following accounting standards, amendments to accounting standards and interpretations have been identified as those which may impact the Company in the period of initial adoption. They were available for early adoption for the Company's annual reporting period beginning 1 July 2014, but have not been applied in preparing this financial report.

AASB 9 Financial Instruments becomes mandatory for the Company's financial statements for the period beginning on or after 1 January 2018 and could change the classification and measurement of financial assets. The Company does not plan to adopt this standard early and the extent of the impact has not been determined.

There are also other amendments and revisions to accounting standards and interpretations that have not been early adopted. These changes are not expected to result in any material changes to the Company's financial performance or financial position.

(N) DETERMINATION OF FAIR VALUES

A number of the Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the determination of fair value, for both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities. Fair values have been determined for measurement and/or disclosure purposes based on the following methods. Where applicable, further information about the assumptions made in determining fair values is disclosed in the notes specific to that asset or liability.

Trade and other receivables

For receivables with a remaining useful life of less than one year, the notional amount is deemed to reflect the fair value. All other receivables are discounted to determine the fair value.

23. OTHER RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Company, being an Associate member of Tennis Australia (TA), receives shared services benefits from TA. These benefits include accounting, human resources, legal and information technology resources. These services were provided for nil consideration.

The Directors of the Company act on an honorary basis.

The key management personnel for Tennis New South Wales includes the CEO and Senior Management. The compensation paid, payable or provided in short term retirement and other long terms benefits is \$384,113 (2014: \$530,864)

24. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Tennis NSW occupies Sydney Olympic Park Tennis Centre (SOPTC) under lease from Sydney Olympic Park Authority (SOPA) for a total term of 40 years, including extensions.

The lease provides that TNSW will hold the "TNSW SOP Tennis Centre Sinking Fund" for and on behalf of SOPA, on terms and conditions set out in the lease.

The lease provides that as and from year 11 of the lease term (year ending 30 June 2010) TNSW will pay the annual "Base Contribution" of \$50,000 to the SOP Sinking Fund, subject to TNSW generating sufficient "Available Cash" to enable it to do so.

If in any financial year insufficient "Available Cash" is generated to enable the "Base Contribution" to be paid, any deficiency is accumulated as a "Carried Forward Contribution". Therefore currently there is a contingent liability of \$100,000 (2014: \$50,000) being two years accumulated carried forward contributions.

On an ongoing basis, the lease provides for the payment of an "Annual Contribution" which is defined as meaning "for each financial year of TNSW, the lesser of the Base Contribution plus the Carried Forward Contribution, and Available Cash". In this regard "Available Cash" means "for each financial year of TNSW the surplus cash available from such financial year, being the net operating profit of TNSW after tax, adjusted to exclude "defined" non- cash items".

Since 2010 TNSW has paid the Base Contribution of \$50,000 to the Sinking Fund for the years 2010 and 2011. TNSW has provided in its financial statements for the "Base Contribution" for 2012 and 2013, a total of \$100,000. The balance of the former Provision for Sinking Fund of \$1,300,000 has been written back to the Profit and Loss account in the 2014 year.

During the 2014 financial year SOPA and TNSW executed a Venue Maintenance Deed (VMD) which varied the SOPA lease with TNSW, with the following effects:

- A. The GFRF assets are quarantined from the other assets of TNSW and are not accessible to meet the Maintenance Obligations under the lease, and
- B. The earnings of the GFRF are excluded from the determination of "Available Cash" for any year from the date of the Deed.
- C. If TNSW generates no" Available Cash", or insufficient "Available Cash", to meet the Maintenance Obligations, SOPA releases TNSW from such obligations.

As a consequence of entering into the VMD, the Board of TNSW has determined that TNSW obligations under the lease in respect to the period subsequent to entering into the VMD should be identified as Contingent Liabilities of the company as they are contingent upon TNSW generating sufficient "Available Cash", as defined, to meet the maintenance obligations referred to above.

TNSW generated no "Available Cash" during the 2015 financial year.

25. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Board of TNSW has resolved to enter into a Facility Operation Agreement (FOA) with Tennis World (TW), a business unit of Tennis Australia (TA) which provides best practice management services for major Tennis Centres.

The FOA provides for the lease of a major portion of SOPTC to TW for a fee, for the purpose of establishing thereon a best practice facility management program. TNSW will retain under its control only that portion of SOPTC which is used for administrative purposes. TNSW will retain rights to use the relevant portions of SOPTC to conduct its major events such as the Apia International Sydney, Davis Cup etc. Under the FOA, TNSW retains an interest in earnings of TW/SOPTC. The FOA became effective from 1 July 2015 and will expire in December 2024 Other than this matter there have been no events subsequent to balance date which would have a material effect on the Company's financial statements.
