Australian Open 2025 — Unforgettable tennis, epic entertainment and new rivalries

Australian Open 2025 is set to serve up an unforgettable three weeks in January.

Some fascinating emerging on-court rivalries are the headline acts and have tennis fans across the globe salivating in anticipation.

But as well as the thrills of world-class tennis, plans unveiled for next year's 120th anniversary event include an epic fusion of music, entertainment and innovative new experiences to delight fans of all ages.

"Following a record-breaking 2024, we're aiming for an even bigger Australian Open celebration, launching the tennis season globally with more tennis, more entertainment and a host of fresh initiatives to bring fans closer to the action than ever before." Australian Open Tournament Director **Craig Tiley** said.

"On court we already have some incredible new rivalries - **Jannik Sinner** and **Carlos Alcaraz** are setting themselves apart. There's a certain 10-time AO Champion in **Novak Djokovic** who again showed his dominance at the Paris Olympics and who will come to Melbourne determined to lift the trophy again. And then there are the likes of **Daniil Medvedev, and Stefanos Tsitsipas** who've both been finalists here, and the Americans **Taylor Fritz, Frances Tiafoe, Tommy Paul and Ben Shelton.**

"Aryna Sabalenka and world number one Iga Swiatek took the lion's share of the tennis spoils this year and their rivalry is a must-watch. Coco Gauff is back in good form and won in Beijing last week, Qinwen Zheng, Elena Rybakina, Barbora Krejcikova, Ons Jabeur and Jess Pegula are also major contenders. Others, like Emma Navarro and Jasmine Paolini and of course a superstar like Naomi Osaka, would not surprise anyone if they went on a run here in Melbourne. The women's field is just rich with possibility and talent.

"And of course, on the home front we have the emergence of a growing and formidable Aussie posse of men, led by **Alex de Minaur, Alexei Popyrin** – who could forget that incredible win over Novak at the US Open - and **Jordan Thompson**, all in the top 30. **Ajla Tomljanovic** is back in the top 100 and it was great to see her win the Hong Kong tournament last week, and **Olivia Gadecki**, after reaching the finals in Mexico recently, has also hit the top 100 milestone."

Tiley explained that a focus of Australian Open 2025 was designing more ways for fans to get closer to the action.

"The Village – between Kia and John Cain Arena, with new-look shaded viewing platforms and fun bars and snacks close by, is where you can catch the very top players in practice; we look forward to announcing a stellar legends field, in another Grand Slam first we're introducing a wheelchair qualifying event, there will be a new junior wheelchair tournament, and much more," he said.

"Off-court attractions include the creation of **TOPCOURT**, a world-first immersive experience where tennis, culture, digital media and gaming collide, the most diverse culinary options yet, a range of stunning premium experiences, an expanded music line up and a ramped-up Opening Week.

"We are fortunate to have wonderful partnerships with an ever-growing list of incredible global brands. They truly help us to bring the event to life year after year.

"The AO's broadcast and online presence has also reached unprecedented levels. Broadcast viewership for AO 2024 surged by 57% compared to 2023, with an incredible 558 million unique viewers worldwide. On social media, we've seen remarkable growth, with 3.8 billion impressions during AO 2024—an increase of 228% from

the previous year. Our year-round content strategy is clearly resonating with fans, as social media impressions have grown by 18%, and YouTube views have skyrocketed by 186%, reflecting a massive appetite for Australian Open content.

"Each year, we push the limits of what the AO can offer—whether it's enhancing the site, elevating the food and drink experiences, offering even more tennis to enjoy, or, in 2025, introducing more ways to play. We've added more live music and nearly doubled our shaded areas to ensure fan comfort. The demand keeps growing, and we're expanding to meet it. We are delighted that our fans, both local and international, keep showing up, and we can't wait to welcome everyone to the best AO yet."

Australian Open 2025 three-week tennis and entertainment extravaganza includes:

- **TOPCOURT**, a vibrant new precinct in Middle Terrace at Birrarung Marr, is another Grand Slam first. Bringing the vibe for the next generation of tennis and entertainment fans, it will feature live music and DJs, a public Padel Court, retail pop-ups and a host of the latest gaming setups. The ultimate hangout spot to chill with friends, TOPCOURT will be the place to gather, shop and show off your fit at AO 2025.
- EXPANDED OPENING WEEK, including AO Qualifying; daily Open Practice sessions in Rod Laver Arena; four exhibition and charity matches featuring top players; Kids Tennis Day on Saturday 11 January, with family fun including competitions and prizes, more ways to play tennis, a huge variety of food and drink options across the site and the fan favourite Rod Laver Arena Spectacular.
- **COURTSIDE BAR**, after being one of the most popular spots to take in the tennis and grab a drink at AO 2024, the two-storey Courtside Bar will return. With increased capacity, enhanced tennis viewing, an intimate rooftop bar and delicious bar menu, it's set to be one of the hottest spots on site.
- **INCREASED SHADE**, there will be almost twice as much shade across Melbourne Park than at AO 2024, and three times as much shade than just five years ago. This includes a new shade structure over the seating bowl of 1573 Arena and 300 square metres of shade in food and beverage areas.
- AO LIVE will bring big-name headline acts including Benson Boone, Kaytranada, Kesha and Armand Van Helden to the finals along with more music across the precinct for the entire three weeks of the event.
- The Village, nestled between John Cain Arena and Kia Arena, offers fans an up-close view of the world's top players as they practice and gear up for Grand Slam glory. With new shaded viewing platforms and an expanded selection of food and bar options, it's the perfect spot to relax and catch all the action.
- Wheelchair Qualifying, in another Grand Slam first, each wheelchair tennis division, men's, women's and Quads, will have a four-player qualifying draw with two players progressing to the main draw.
- Australian Open Junior Wheelchair Championships debuts, with eight junior athletes to compete in the inaugural event.

Australian Open 2025 will also host the first **Evonne Goolagong Cawley Day**, which in 2024 was renamed from First Nations Day to honour the tennis legend. Fan favourites **All Abilities Day**, **Hot Shots Tennis Day, Women & Girls Day** and **Pride Day** will all return.

Both **Evonne Goolagong Cawley** and **John Newcombe** will celebrate 50 years since their respective second AO titles in 1975. Newcombe will feature on the coin tossed before matches at the AO and all Summer of Tennis events (as Goolagong Cawley did in 2024).

Era-defining rivalries set to thrill fans at AO 2025

The race to write the next chapter of tennis history has never been so intense.

Rivalries are unfolding right in front of us that could define the sport for the next decade—and at the centre of it all are the Australian Open defending champions.

AO 2025 winner **Jannik Sinner** and Spanish foe **Carlos Alcaraz** have dominated much of 2024, sharing the four Grand Slam titles between them. But the King of Melbourne Park, 10-time champion **Novak Djokovic** produced a stunning reminder at the Paris Olympics that he is far from done.

"These three superstars will be looking to put their stamp on 2025 with the first Slam title of the year, and it will be fascinating to see how they go about it," AO Tournament Director **Craig Tiley** enthused.

"Not only that, but also how the likes of **Daniil Medvedev, Stefanos Tsitsipas, Alexander Zverev, Taylor Fritz** and co - who all have had some great results here attempt to break their domination.

"Alcaraz has captured the hearts of tennis fans around the world – he's not only an extraordinary player, but his infectious energy and fierce competitiveness have made him a fan favourite. He's won Roland Garros and Wimbledon this year, and we can't wait to see what he does here in Melbourne.

"Meanwhile, Novak is a legend here and he thrives in this environment. We know he'll be hunting for his 11th title and doing everything in his power to lift the trophy again."

Tiley was equally upbeat about the women's draw.

"Aryna Sabalenka is gunning for an AO three-peat on the back of a 14-match winning streak and has 20-2 singles record at Melbourne Park in the last four years, not to mention a Grand Slam doubles title here in 2021. Fair to say she enjoys Rod Laver Arena," he said.

"Both defending champions, Sabalenka and Sinner, have had an incredible year, bookending the season with wins at the Australian Open and the US Open. To capture two Grand Slam titles in a season is no small feat, and they will both come into Melbourne even stronger for AO 2025."

"By contrast, **Iga Swiatek's** best AO result was when she made semis in 2022 and she will be determined to go further. And as the reigning world number one for the last 123 weeks, she is very well-placed to do so.

"But then you also have **Coco Gauff**, winner of Beijing last week, and China's Olympic gold medallist and AO 24 finalist **Quinwen Zheng** in contention. There's a real sense of excitement around Zheng, she's had a brilliant season, has a real chance to be a major force in the women's draw, and will come into Melbourne with a massive fan base among our Chinese community, as well as a lot of confidence.

The incredible array of talent in the mix includes Slam winners like **Naomi Osaka, Elena Rybakina** and **Barbora Krejcikova**, not to mention those who've reached finals and semis, like **Ons Jabeur, Emma Navarro, Karolina Muchova, Jasmine Paolini** and even an emerging star like teenager **Mirra Andreeva**.

"I'm looking forward to watching Paolini who's reached the second week of all four majors, including back-to-back finals at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon. Her energy and enthusiasm make her great fun to watch and she'll no doubt have loud support from the Italian fans.

There's just so much quality and depth in the field," Tiley said.

Aussie tennis on the rise

Australia's men have enjoyed a record-setting year on the tour and are set to shine in front of their home crowd at AO 2025.

Alex de Minaur leads the charge after a breakthrough year that saw him crack the top 10 for the first time.

"Alex is a true Aussie inspiration. He's had an incredible year, shown tremendous resilience through injury and I have no doubt he'll be ready with his trademark grit and determination and bring everything he has to the AO in January," AO Tournament Director **Craig Tiley** said.

Alexei Popyrin's career-best win over Djokovic at the US Open was one of the highlights of 2024, and he now finds himself ranked inside the top 25.

"Alexei's victory over Novak was one for the ages. He's been in incredible form, and it's exciting to see him rise in the rankings," Tiley said.

"Jordan Thompson has played his way into the top 30 and could see himself seeded at a Grand Slam for the first time. It was great to see him team up with **Max Purcell** to win the US Open doubles title and they'll be coming into the Aussie summer in great form.

"The sheer depth of the Australian men is remarkable, with **Chris O'Connell, James Duckworth, Rinky Hijikata, Thanasi Kokkinakis, Aleksander Vukic,** and **Adam Walton** all in the top 100 and making their mark.
Having 10 men in the top 100 – that's the strongest we've been in a long time, and the future looks bright.

"It's been great to hear Nick Kyrgios touting his return to the court, and that his training is on track for the summer. He brings a big game and bigger energy to the AO – he's truly an excitement machine – and we can't wait to see him back."

Tiley is also excited by the state of women's tennis in Australia, with several young Aussie stars making notable progress in 2024.

"Olivia Gadecki has powered into the top 100 after reaching the final in Guadalajara and is now Australia's No.1 woman, and Ajla Tomljanović joined her there after her recent WTA title in Hong Kong, and she continues to make an impressive comeback from injury.

"Promising young talents like 18-year-old **Maya Joint, Talia Gibson,** and **Taylah Preston** continue to rise through the ranks, while it was also exciting to see 16-year-old **Emerson Jones** hit the world No.1 junior ranking – the first Aussie girl to do so since **Jelena Dokic** in 1998 – and reach the junior girls' finals at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon.

"It's been a great year for Aussie tennis, we have a solid group of established players along with some amazing young talent coming through, and we're excited to see what they can do in front of a home crowd."

Australia's success on the global stage was not limited to the singles court.

"Matt Ebden and John Peers' Olympic gold victory in Paris was a truly special moment and I'd like to congratulate them both again," Tiley said. "We all enjoyed the emotion of their stunning, come-from-behind win, and the celebration with their families was unforgettable.

"Matt started the year with the Australian Open doubles title, teaming with Rohan Bopanna. **Jordan Thompson** and **Max Purcell** reached the doubles final at Wimbledon, and it was fantastic to see them go one better in New

York, winning the US Open ... and with that win Jordan became the seventh Australian to capture a Grand Slam men's doubles title within the past three years."

Thompson's Grand Slam breakthrough achieves an incredible 45-year milestone, marking the first time since 1979 that seven different Australians won a Grand Slam doubles title within a three-year period.*

The Australian Open will present another Grand Slam first in 2025, with the introduction of qualifying for the wheelchair event. Each wheelchair tennis division, men's, women's and Quads, will have a four-player qualifying draw with two players progressing to the main draw.

The **Junior Wheelchair Tennis Championship** will make its debut at Australian Open 2025, marking a historic moment in the tournament's history. Eight junior athletes will compete in this milestone event from 21 to 25 January, paving the way for future generations in wheelchair tennis.

Queensland teenager **Ben Wenzel** made history at the US Open in September, becoming the first Australian junior wheelchair player in history to capture a Grand Slam title when he and his Dutch partner Ivar van Rijt were crowned the US Open 2024 boys' wheelchair doubles champions.

Tennis continues to grow in popularity, with more than 1.48 million Australians participating in the sport from July 2022 to June 2023, and 2,300 affiliated tennis clubs and venues nationwide.

Australian Open reveals AO LIVE music lineup for 2025

The Australian Open has unveiled an exciting music lineup for 2025 under its new entertainment banner, **AO LIVE**.

AO LIVE will feature a packed schedule of live music across the AO precinct over three weeks including bands, solo performers and DJs, culminating in three massive days of entertainment from 23 to 25 January in John Cain Arena, under **AO LIVE Presents**.

Globally renowned artists including **Benson Boone**, **Kaytranada**, **Kesha and Armand Van Helden** will headline AO LIVE Presents in the tournament's biggest music lineup leading up to the finals weekend.

"Music and live entertainment have always been central to the AO and what sets us apart from other sporting events," Australian Open Tournament Director **Craig Tiley** said.

"AO LIVE is an evolution of the AO's music offering and will see live music and entertainment across the whole precinct in January, from fan-favourite performers in Garden Square to in-demand DJ's spinning anthems on Grand Slam Oval. AO LIVE has entertainment covered for all tastes and is all-inclusive on a Ground Pass ticket.

"To bring home the tournament, AO LIVE Presents will put on three spectacular nights featuring international artists at the end of week two taking us into the finals."

The huge success of Finals Festival over the past three years has proven there is great demand for high-profile music acts alongside the tennis, and recent sold-out megatours have shown that fans still have eyes for big name shows in Melbourne arenas.

Tickets for **AO LIVE Presents** start from \$89 which also includes Ground Pass access for the whole day, presenting great value for fans.

First up on 23 January, pop sensation **Benson Boone** will take to the stage. The American singer-songwriter has skyrocketed to stardom with more than 1.9 billion global streams to his name. Benson made headlines with his memorable performance at the MTV Video Music Awards earlier this year, where he earned four nominations and took home the award for Best Alternative Video.

World-renowned DJ and producer **Kaytranada** performs on Friday 24 January. The Grammy Award-winning Canadian artist is a household name in music globally, having opened for The Weeknd's 'After Hours Til Dawn' Tour in 2022 and performed at Coachella 2023. With two Grammy Awards and five nominations under his belt, Kaytranada's blend of house, hip-hop, and electronic beats is set to ignite the dancefloor.

The final day of AO LIVE Presents will coincide with the Women's Finals on Saturday 25 January, delivering a full day of festival-style entertainment. Kicking off at 2PM, the event will feature performances from multiple artists, culminating in a grand finale featuring pop icon **Kesha** and legendary DJ **Armand Van Helden** to close out the three-day affair.
