Spring is in the air and everyone here at the museum are lacing up their running shoes in preparation for the race to January and the Apia International.

Since the Luncheon, the museum has been working on upgrading parts of the museum and deciding on the new exhibition for January. The volunteers have also had time to do some great work with the collection.

Furniture Upgrade

The Australian Tennis Museum library furniture has had an upgrade! The library furniture familiar to most of you was donated to the museum in the early 1990's and was brought out to the Tennis Centre when the museum had to leave White City. It has served the museum very well over that time but with an increase in tours, meetings and researchers all wanting to use the library we thought it was about time we invested in a more modern and versatile layout. This new set-up makes the library cabinets much more accessible and provides our meeting groups with a great atmosphere.



The best part, though, has to be the new trolley system for the chairs. This system allows us to pack most of the chairs up and store them when we do not have group tours. It makes the library cabinets more easily accessible for researchers and it also benefits the backs of the volunteers who no longer have to carry stacks of chairs around.



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New Acquisitions

Over the last few months a number of great items have been donated to the Australian Tennis Museum. Here are just some of them:



Fred Perry skirt c. 1945. Not only was Fred Perry a great tennis player (you have probably heard him mentioned a few times this year in reference to Andy Murray) but he was also a well known tennis-wear designer. His signature logo is a green laurel wreath which can be seen on the bottom left corner of this skirt. The museum already has a pair of Fred Perry shorts but this is our first skirt.

A donation from our lovely volunteer Barbara who has just been overseas at Wimbledon. These are debenture entry cards and tokens for three days of the 2012 Wimbledon Championships.





A donation from our Patron Ken Rosewall. This is a special guest entry pass to the All England Lawn Tennis Club issued in 1996.



Also donated by Ken Rosewall, these placecards were made to celebrate Wimbledon's Centenary in 1977. There are 6 placecards in the box with each showing an illustration of a different tennis player.





Evonne Goolagong Racquet c. late 1970's, early 1980's. A Dunlop racquet promoting Evonne Goolagong during the height of her career. The museum has a number of racquets endorsed by famous Australian players but this is our first one from Evonne Goolagong.

Aussies at the Olympics and Paralympics

It was another disappointing result for Australia at the Olympics this year, with both Sam Stosur and Bernard Tomic dropping out in the 1st round. Hewitt however showed excellent form and determination, reminding many people of his days in the world's top 20. He fell in the 3rd round to Novak Djokovic.

The Paralympic Games saw an Australian Team of 4 head over to London: Ben Weekes, Adam Kellerman, Daniela Di Toro (her 5th Paralympic Games) and Janel Manns. All players made it through to the 2nd round but only Kellerman managed to hold on into the 3rd before being defeated by Dutchman Ronald Vink.

Davis Cup Board Finds a Home

This Davis Cup board honours all the NSW players who have represented Australia in the Davis Cup. For a while it has been sitting in our 2nd store room waiting for a new home where it will be seen by all visitors who come to the Tennis Centre.

In the last week of August we finally found the perfect spot. This board now resides on a wall in the corridor right above the museum and next to the entrance of Tennis NSW.
