The museum saw 232 guests in attendance, this was only just shy of our record number of 238 when Pat Rafter was the special guest in 2006. The museum held a silent auction and raffle to help raise much needed funds to continue the work of preserving the history of Australian Tennis.

With Garry Wilkinson as the MC it was not a day to be missed! Garry quizzed Frank about his tennis past and revealed some interesting unknown stories, giving guests an incite into his extremely successful career.

## Special Guest, Frank Arthur Sedgman

Frank was born in Victoria on the 29th October 1927. He was introduced to tennis through his parents association with the Blackburn Tennis Club. His relationship with tennis great, Harry Hopman started through coaching clinics at Kooyong and played an important part in his tennis career.

In a four year span from 1949 through to 1952, Frank won 22 Grand Slam titles at the Australian, French, US Open

and Wimbledon. What makes these titles so special was his versatility; winning singles, doubles and mixed doubles.

Frank represented Australia in the Davis Cup from 1949 to 1952, with Australia winning both back to back titles in 1951 and 1952. Frank turned professional in 1953 and his first match was against tennis legend Jack Kramer.

Frank was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame 1979 and the Australian Tennis Hall of Fame in January 1996.

### Tennis Historians and Collectors Unite

Early in 2011, a small group of avid tennis historians and collectors formed a group called Tennis Heritage Australia (THA) to uncover, preserve and promote the development and history of tennis in Australia. It is a great story as most of you already know, however there are many facets to the history which have not been widely promoted or ever researched.

Individuals in the group have access to privately owned, tennis club and library collections comprising overseas and Australian tennis history books, early tennis magazines, newspaper clippings and tennis memorabilia including racquets, autographs, trophies to name a few.

The main objective is to establish a private and public database of collections held by institutions, clubs, libraries and individuals so that members of the public and other historians wishing to research a tennis topic can be directed to the appropriate sources. The group is pleased to support the development of material for tennis club newsletters and history books, websites such as,





## The Australian Golf Heritage Society Museum

Sports museums are beginning to become more prominent within the museum scene in Australia. With the Australian Tennis Museum at Sydney Olympic Park, National Sports Museum at the Melbourne Cricket Ground, the Bradman Museum in Bowral and the Sydney Cricket Ground Museum sports fans cannot only watch the action on the field but see the past come alive in vibrant and entertaining exhibitions. In Granville the Australian Golf Heritage Society Museum is ensuring the history of Australian golf is alive and well!

### History

The collection on which the Museum is founded was started in 1973 by golf professional Tom Moore. After visiting the United Kingdom, and witnessing first hand the extent to which heritage was respected and protected on the other side of the globe, Tom began collecting old golf clubs as a way to preserve Australia's golfing history. Tom's collection was formalised when he donated it to the Golf Collector's Society, which he helped form in 1995. The Golf Collector's Society changed its name to the Australian Golf Heritage Society (AGHS) in 2008 to give a more representative description of the Society's interests and scope.

### Collection

In 2000, the collection moved to its present location thanks to the kind offer by Golf Mart Granville of their first floor space. The collection documents the social, sporting and technical history of the sport of golf. It includes clubs, balls, bags, training equipment,

photographs, applied arts, art works, textiles, and "novelty" ephemera.

#### **Exhibitions**

Their permanent exhibition tells the story of golf in NSW and Australia. It looks at the development of the sport in Australia, the evolution of club design and manufacture, the changing rules and techniques, golfing icons and their stories, Australian women in golf, and golf in popular culture. From September 2011, the AGHS will host an temporary exhibition celebrating the centenary of the Professional Golfers Association of Australia, 1911 – 2011.

#### **Events**

The Museum is just one aspect of the AGHS's activities. The Society also runs a Historian's Group, aimed at golf historians, and publishes *The Brassie* three times a year. The Society also runs a yearly program of playing events, where members are challenged to play with old hickory shafted clubs (period dress encouraged!). Membership forms can be downloaded from their website.

### **Visiting**

The AGHS Museum is run predominantly by volunteers, and is open every Sunday from 10am – 4pm. Tours or special open days are available by appointment. Museum Manager Tom Moore can also arrange talks and workshops on the fine art of hand crafting golf clubs.
