



PROJECT SUCCESS STARTS WITH STRATEGIC ASSESSMENT

Gloucester District
Tennis Association is
a 15 court venue,
with nine clay courts
and six synthetic
grass courts, located
in Mid-Northern
NSW.

Gloucester Tennis is well on its way to creating a healthy, stable and inclusive 15 court venue into the future, thanks to a refreshed strategic outlook and commitment to change.

Working closely with Tennis NSW, Gloucester Tennis developed its first Business Plan, identifying the key goals and objectives to enable a great tennis experience for the local community, through the provision of a modern and sustainable facility.

Testament to the hard work of the committee, the club was successful in securing more than \$250,000 in NSW Government funding, through the February 2021 Club Grant (Infrastructure Grant) to fulfil its immediate project priority.

The project priority is to use the funds to resurface six clay courts and upgrade to LED Lighting on nine courts with new poles and wiring, a total project value of \$260.193.

















In March 2020, Gloucester Tennis completed a Tennis NSW Venue Sustainability Rating (VSR) audit. The results indicated the venue was not sustainable under the current condition and operation. This triggered the start of a journey for Gloucester Tennis to explore short-term goals and long-term objectives.

Steve Munn, President of Gloucester Tennis said, "In the past the club has relied on tournaments, grants and sponsorship to maintain the current facility. We had to think differently about our membership, infrastructure and asset renewal, as well as further collaboration with Council."

Through the development of a Business Plan, Gloucester Tennis established goals around a new junior program, new coaches, ways to attract new tournaments and provide social venue hire to complement required infrastructure upgrades. The audit identified the immediate focus for the venue was to improve the asset to increase participation, resulting in the project priority - to resurface six courts (clay) and upgrade to LED Lighting on nine courts with new poles and wiring.

Gloucester Tennis worked on **getting project ready** to be able to apply for grant funding, with the support of a Tennis NSW Tennis Development Officer. Key steps included:

- Refinement of a Business Plan with research into community needs and the local demand for tennis; and alignment to Council plans and core values
- Development of a presentation to engage Council on the Business Plan and project goals
- · Finalisation of a project plan
- · Exploration of funding opportunities
- · Approval for the project from Mid Coast Council
