It is with great pleasure that we present this report for the twelve months ending 30 June 2018, another year of development for the sport across the Northern Territory.

It is also where we reflect on the achievements and commitment displayed by many people within our tennis community. In November 2017 Tennis NT Warren Martin vacated the Tennis NT Presidency after nine years in the role. Warren's tireless efforts to progress the sport across the Territory in this time are greatly appreciated and we thank Warren on behalf of the broader tennis community for this service.

2017/18 was a year of change across the organisation with the focus required on the Marrara development, coupled with the growth of Indigenous programs and a raft of local and National initiatives providing both challenges and opportunities. This is further explored throughout this report.

It is pleasing to be presenting another strong year financially for the organisation with an operating surplus of \$75,388 reported for the twelve months. This follows a surplus of \$84,220 in 2016/17. It is noted that the aforementioned changes to the organisation will mean that prudent financial management will continue to be a focus of Tennis NT.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

We would like to thank the many people that make up the backbone of the sport across the NT. Without the work of the coaches, administrators, volunteers, officials, players and parents in our environment, the sport wouldn't be the same so we thank you for your ongoing work.

We have also benefitted greatly from the ongoing support provided by both Tennis Australia and the Northern Territory Government. The significant support provided by both parties is invaluable and allows Tennis NT to confidently pursue the growth of the sport knowing that there is likeminded support from key partners.

Tennis NT values our various sponsors and partners, who are listed in this report, all of which are integral in assisting us in our journey. The longstanding partnerships we have with these organisations are of considerable benefit to the sport and show us that tennis has the ability to engage a diverse group of stakeholders.

2017/18 has been a big year for the staff of Tennis NT with growth, new faces and a change of office all



presenting new experiences across the team. The passion and commitment to tennis shown across the team continues to be a standout and enables us to strive for the development of tennis in the various areas of the sport.

Finally we would like to acknowledge the hard work and commitment of the Tennis NT Board throughout 2017/18. In a year of change and growth the countless volunteer hours committed by the Board continue to hold us in good stead. The Board has also continued a strong focus on the various elements of Tennis NT's strategic plan which is into its third year. The six areas of this plan are outlined below.

PARTICIPATION

Provide opportunity to participate in tennis as a sport for life

Throughout 2017/18 a strong focus remained on providing all Territorian's with the ability to participate in tennis.

Whilst the 2017 calendar year club membership figures show a small decrease in participation, it was pleasing to see increases in school participation, as well as participation in Tennis NT's Indigenous Program. In combination these figures show that more people across the NT are experiencing tennis and that modern trends in how sports are consumed are also being experienced with tennis.

A key pillar of tennis' approach to increasing participation is always through introductory programs which continues to be through the ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Program. Having Hot Shots offered in all affiliated venues throughout 2017/18 through skilled and dedicated coaches provides a solid platform for tennis, as such it is pleasing to see this focus across the NT.

The traction tennis received in schools across the NT during the year was a real highlight. In all, 48 NT schools formally connected to tennis through the National Schools Partnership Program. When surveyed these schools indicated that a total of 11,373 students participated in school based tennis programs during the year. These programs, coupled with school gala days and interschool competitions are crucial to the ongoing attraction of junior participants to the sport.



Tennis NT's Indigenous Program continued to excel in 2017/18 with advancements made in different areas of the NT. With over 800 participants experiencing tennis during the year as part of the program, strong partnerships being formed with regional councils and schools and formal education being delivered to key stakeholders, our aim to make the program sustainable is progressing well.

What has also been exciting to see is the uptake of tennis in remote areas which is dispelling the myth that tennis isn't a sport that will be pursued in remote areas of the NT. Finally, having Ash Barty being named as Australia's Indigenous Tennis Ambassador during a visit to Darwin and the Tiwi Islands was a great thrill and further illustrates the progress being made in the area.

PLACES TO PLAY Managed hierarchy of facilities

Bringing a major facility to Darwin has long been seen as the major missing link for the sport in the NT, as such it was exciting to see the gates open at the Darwin International Tennis Centre in June 2018. Having events and tournaments commence at the facility in June was good to see, however the challenge for the sport now is leveraging the facility to grow engagement in the sport. We look forwards to working with Tennis World, and all affiliates, in achieving this ambition.

The NT Facilities Strategy (2015) has continued to guide our work in facility development and management across the NT. Given the small number of tennis venues in the NT, achieving quality outcomes in all facilities and presenting an inviting shopfront for the sport will always be of high importance. Tennis NT looks forward to working with all affiliates in continuing to develop this space.

COACHES

Increased capacity of coaches to develop tennis

Attracting and retaining coaches has long been a challenge in the NT and indeed across the country. Tennis NT acknowledges that the coaching network is critical to the stability and growth of the sport in the NT, as such we feel fortunate to have a high quality group of senior coaches driving the sport.

Tennis NT continued to provide opportunities for entry level coaches with foundation coaching courses



conducted and a range of development opportunities facilitated internal and external to club environments. These opportunities, along with different opportunities to coach representative team's interstate, will continue to be a focus for Tennis NT.

Tennis NT would also like to congratulate Pat Coburn on successfully completing Tennis Australia's High Performance Coaching Course during 2017/18. Pat has long been a leader in the coaching space and this is a significant achievement given the small number of coaches who are invited to undertake the course nationally.

TALENT DEVELOPMENT

One National Champion that we are proud of

2017/18 was a fantastic year for talent development with a number of significant results continuing to show that the NT is a great place develop talented players. Among others, of note are the following results:

- Peter Politis and Michael Shepheard winning the Darwin Junior ITF Doubles Title

Tennis NT acknowledges that success in this space relies heavily on various stakeholders and that the commitment of coaches, parents and players is all paramount to national success. With changes continuing to occur Nationally in this space Tennis NT looks forward to working with our affiliates in ensuring that talented NT players have the best opportunities in line with our strategic objective.

TOURNAMENTS & COMPETITIONS

Attract and retain highly engaged competitive players

Exploring the future of competition tennis in the NT was a focus of Tennis NT during 2017/18 with considerable amounts of work going into the development of a blueprint that will guide us moving forward. Tennis NT acknowledges that growing this space is crucial to the sustainability of tennis venues and that a united approach to this is required to have a real impact.

A highlight on the tournaments calendar was the Alice Springs Tennis International, run for the eighth time in Alice Springs. The support this event has received from

the Alice Springs tennis community is testament to everybody involved in the sport in Alice Springs. The involvement of Alice Springs based officials in this event, and many others, continues to be a highlight for our tennis community.

Like other areas of the sport, tournaments are often subject to change be it through new venues, changing demographics or the overall management of tournaments. Being such a crucial component of the sport, Tennis NT is invested in continuing to work with those who manage tournaments to ensure that they provide the appropriate experience for the volume of players who engage across the NT.

PROMOTION & ENGAGEMENT Greater awareness of tennis through strong relationships

The changing face of tennis within the NT will provide the sport with new areas in which to engage others and promote the sport moving forward. Tennis NT has continued to engage and explore partnerships in various areas with opportunities in Indigenous Tennis and Asian Engagement being good examples of areas that have been facilitated by our changing environment.

BUILDING ON STRENGTH

Tennis is among the most successful sports in Australia in terms of participation and engagement rates. It is also the focus of the sporting globe each summer with world-class events such as the Australian Open.

Earlier this year, we conducted a comprehensive participation review with the aim of leveraging the current success of Aussie tennis for the next phase of ongoing growth in the sport.

During the last six months, I've travelled around the country as part of the extensive consultation with all key stakeholders. It has been a personal highlight of mine to be able to work on this review with the people involved in delivering our sport day in and day out across the country - the people responsible for building tennis into the success that it is today.

A THRIVING COMMUNITY

Both in Australia and in Victoria, more people are enjoying the sport than ever. The 930,000-plus total participants who experienced tennis throughout the nation in 2017-2018 represented a 34 percent increase on the previous year. In NT alone, there were a staggering 15,118 participants in this period.

Increasingly, a lifelong connection to tennis begins with ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, the junior development pathway that also underpins Tennis Australia's hugely successful School Partnership Program. Growth in schools has been particularly strong and the NT can be particularly proud that 48 primary schools are now official partner schools of this innovative program.

At a time when providing healthy activity for young people is a priority, opportunities to participate have never been stronger.

OPEN TO EVERYONE

Passionate that tennis should be a sport for everyone, our values of equality, inclusion and diversity are ever-present. Regardless of ability, gender, race, age or sexual orientation, players are always be welcome.

Accessibility is also a priority in a more literal sense, as the expanding Book A Court program demonstrates. Providing casual players with the means to book and pay for courts online, the program is now available in 100 venues throughout the nation.

NATIONAL PRIDE

Our record-breaking world class events not only inspire the tennis community at every level, but also help grow the game in a positive sense as revenue is invested back into the sport.

More than one million fans flocked to see the world's best players compete at Australian Open and Australian Open Series events last summer.

The Australian Open celebrated 30 years at Melbourne Park in January, with a record 743,667 fans experiencing new heights in hospitality and off-court entertainment, alongside captivating tennis. A fortnight of fiercely-contested matches showcased astonishing ability and unrelenting passion from the game's superstars.

It culminated in two stunning finals as Caroline Wozniacki claimed her first Grand Slam title with a three-set victory over Simona Halep and Roger Federer seized a record-extending 20th major title with a five-set win over Marin Cilic.





A TEAM EFFORT

Growth – whether it be in participation numbers, revenue or the achievements of our players – would not be possible without the collective efforts of our passionate team members throughout Australia.

As our hard-working staff showcased the company values of excellence, humility, loyalty and team-work, there was a special point of pride when Jayne Hrdlicka was voted Tennis Australia's first female President and Chair in October. It was another inspirational turning point as the Australian tennis community comes together to achieve new heights in every endeavour.

Thank you, your staff and Board, for your tremendous contribution to those achievements.

Heritage

Tennis NT was established in 1980 under the incorporated name of the Northern Territory Tennis Council. The organisation changed its incorporated identity in 2005 to Tennis NT Incorporated and trades simply as Tennis NT. Its establishment was the shared vision of the founding President, Mr Max Horton OAM and a small group of interested tennis players. Their vision foresaw the need for a 'parent body' to assume a role of guidance along with the benefits of establishing relationships with the Northern Territory Government and Tennis Australia.

National Programs

Participation Leaders

One of the many resources utilised in the Northern Territory in order to drive promotional activities is the Participation Leader position. The provision of this role also assists in the creation of necessary relationships within all areas, such as schools, clubs and communities in order to achieve the stable and sustainable growth witnessed from year to year.

The Participation Leader is the first point of call for Territory Clubs when it comes to programs and initiatives centred around participation in tennis. This includes but is not limited to ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, Fitbit Cardio Tennis, Schools Programs, the Power and Water Regional Development Program and Community Play.

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots (ANZTHS), incorporating smaller courts, smaller racquets and low-compression tennis balls, is the fun and easy way to learn tennis.

In 2017-18 there were six registered ANZTHS deliverers in the Northern Territory providing programs participants. These deliverers have assistant coaches working under them delivering Hot Shots at their clubs and in school programs. There were 23 Assistant coaches used throughout the Territory during this period.



Tennis in Schools

Tennis Australia's Partnership and Play School Tennis Programs

During 2017-18 the Australian Government's Sporting Schools Program continued to assist Territory schools to actively promote sport as part of their PE lessons. Schools apply for funding through the program and then select its sport of choice, Tennis Australia offers two programs as part of the Sporting Schools initiative, based on the ANZ Tennis Hot Shots program. The Partnership and Play Programs are made up of fun tennis activities which support skill acquisition and movement all whilst 'playing the game' in a meaningful way.

Participation Report

Interschool's Tennis Competition

During Term 4 2017 Tennis NT hosted a Red Ball Gala day at Gardens Tennis Clubs. Schools that had participated in a Tennis program that year were invited to the participation event. The event catered for both the grade 3 and 4 students alongside the older grade 5 and 6 children. The day was a great success and a fantastic end to, what was for some, their first ever experience of competitive tennis.

Tennis 360

Gardens Tennis, Tennis Palmerston, Tennis Sanderson and Tennis Alice Springs continued with the Tennis 360 data collection during the reporting period. These three clubs recorded their participation stats over the course of two designated weeks during the school term. The data is then placed into a table creating an easy and assessable way to evaluate how each club is performing in different participation areas. This data is then presented to the Tennis NT Board and assists Tennis NT in making informed strategic decisions. Having a solid base of historic data allows us to assist the clubs work strategically towards achieving their goals and creating sustainable business plans for 17/18.

Player Registrations

Tennis in the NT faced some challenges during 2015/16 with many influential coaches / operators leaving the NT. Overall there was a decrease within the Northern Territory of 9% following on from the increase of 9% in 2015/16. Tennis NT will continue to work with all regions and assist the clubs in an effort to regain the growth trends across the Territory.

Northern Territory Tennis Regions

Tennis Sanderson

In 2017/18 Jo-Anne Karaitiana continued to deliver coaching at Tennis Sanderson until the end of May 2018 when the Darwin International Tennis Centre Opened and coaching was shifted there. Tennis Sanderson in the reporting period was able to:

- Offer ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, group coaching, squads, semi-privates and private lessons every weekday afternoon and Saturday morning
- Have over 30 ANZ Tennis Hot Shots players participating on Saturday mornings
- Introduced 82 players to the game of tennis through ANZ Tennis Hot Shots and the foundation program at Tennis Sanderson
- Created a girls only squad for the current tournament level players in Darwin
- Added 4 coaches in Natalie Roe, Oscar Ferdinands, Rosie Henderson and Kyle Granger to the coaching team at Tennis Sanderson
- Built the facility to have over 70 participants per term
- Re-engaged previously inactive players



Places to Play

Darwin International Tennis Centre

In June 2018 construction of the \$16.7m tennis facility at Marrara was completed and the keys were handed over to Tennis NT. It began with a soft opening with Darwin Clubs invited to bring their Friday night match play to the Darwin International Tennis Centre on Friday June 1st. The new centre is home to:

- Fifteen Plexipave courts, all fully lit with one covered
- One Championship Size show court, fully covered with 500 fixed seats
- Eight under cover ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Courts
- Office space for Tennis NT
- Café and operating facilities
- Conference & meeting space with up 200 capacity
- Additional car parking



Book A Court Program

Book a Court is an online court booking and payment platform for affiliated tennis clubs. It's easy to use for both players and club administrators, which means more time on court for everyone! When players book a court online they're sent a PIN for direct access to their court, or if there is no connected pin pad available, the player is provided with alternative instructions to access the court. The Northern Territory currently has to venues with a fully operational Book a Court system, Tennis Palmerston and the Darwin International Tennis Centre.

Tennis Australia is placing significant emphasis on providing innovation in access to tennis venues across Australia, as such Book A Court will continue to be a priority. Tennis NT will continue to work with clubs and Tennis Australia, in the expansion of this program.

Participation Report

Indigenous Tennis Program

Tennis NT's Indigenous Tennis Program (ITP) has made a real impact over the past 12 months through targeting specific communities in remote NT and forging strong partnerships with Regional Councils and their schools. Through their support we have been able to deliver on our commitment in providing consistent community visits, this has allowed us to deliver the rapport required to establish the trust of the Regional Councils, schools and community members.

During 2017/18 Tennis NT's Indigenous Tennis Program visited 18 remote communities throughout the NT, delivering tennis to 884 Indigenous youth.

The program has been successful in delivering the following:

- Organised and structured tennis activities through the school and after school programs of each community.
- Through in school programs Tennis NT has been able to capture the data using school enrolments.
- Through our partnership with Roper Gulf Regional Council, 7 sport and rec officers completed the Foundation Coaching Course in early April in the community of Beswick. The first coaching course delivered by Tennis Australia to take place in a remote region of Australia
- Through our working relationship with the Department of Education, we were able to conduct our inter community challenge at their Health, Sports & Athletics Carnivals with a cluster of communities attending these events.
- Two Regional Talent camps were held during the reporting period, one being held in Katherine where 30 students from schools of the Roper Gulf Region attended and the other in Darwin with students from Wurrumiyanga Community (Tiwi Islands).



A National Talent Model

2017-18 was a time of consolidation for athlete development in the NT. With Tennis Australia's Talent model in full swing Semester 2 2017 started with three athletes between 13 and 15 years meeting Tier 2 and one meeting Tier 3 criteria. These priority players were supplemented by two Tier 4 invites, one player in the 16 years + category and eleven in the 12 years and under program.

Regular sessions were planned and delivered by Tennis NT CTDM Pat Coburn with session plans being recorded on Tennis Australia's AMS system and then distributed to NT club coaches at the end of each week. Programs varied for each player depending on age and Tier classification starting from one on court session for most of those in the 12's program through to 4 on court and 2 strength and conditioning sessions for those in Tier 2.

The first training semester of 2018 saw two athletes in Talent (13 to 15 years) meeting Tier 2 and two meeting Tier 3 criteria. These were supplemented by four Tier 4 invites, two player in the 16 years + category and twelve in the 12 years and under program.

For the 2nd Semester 2017 Liam Franklin (boarding at Brisbane Boys College) continues to train with the NA Brisbane as a Tier 3 athlete.

Club Talent Days

Tennis NT CTDM delivered camps or talent days at each of its affiliated clubs with a qualified coach. In all 34 players and 4 coaches were impacted by these camps.

Super 10s

Super 10s was again a highlight of the talent year. The seasons held in Darwin and Palmerston collectively attracted 27 individual players including 2 from Katherine. These seasons were followed by the Talent 10s match play camp which involved 4 coaches and 16 players including 2 from Katherine and 2 from Alice Springs. From the camp 8 players (7 Darwin and 1 Alice Springs) and two coaches were selected to form the NT contingent that participated in the 2018 Talent 10s National Camp.



Athlete Tournament Support

Tennis NT supported individuals on tour by sending coaches to all three Platinum events plus the Bruce Cup. In the reporting year this included the October 2017 Australian Clay Court Championships in Canberra (NT CTDM plus 7 players plus 1 private coach), the October 2017 Bruce Cup in Shepparton (NT CTDM plus 14 players) the December 2017 Australian Championships in Melbourne (NT CTDM plus 10 players plus 2 private coaches) and the April 2018 Australian Grass Court Championships in Adelaide (Tennis NT CTDM plus 6 players and 1 private coach). The best result during these events was Jett Leong winning the Bruce Cup individual singles event in Shepparton and Nicolas Tremblay winning the 12 Boys Doubles title at the Australian Grass Court Championships in Adelaide (partner Cooper Errey Vic).

Looking Forward

It's important to acknowledge our outstanding on court performances in the reporting period. This has included 3 wins in interstate Gold level singles events (Jett Leong Bruce Cup Singles event, Vic Junior Hardcourt Championships 14 singles and Peter Politis TCA Victoria Age Championships 14 singles) along with Nicolas Tremblay's win in the Platinum 12 boys doubles at the Australian Grass Court Championships.



While we celebrate these achievements we also know that past glory is quickly forgotten. Future success is owned by our emerging players and with scarce resources necessitating choices, we look forward to discussions with our local coaching fraternity and Tennis Australia's Performance Department around our player development structure and future resource allocation to deliver the Northern Territory's next wave of on court success.

Acknowledgements

The continuing support of the centre managers in the Athlete Development space needs to be acknowledged. Without exception they have generously and enthusiastically provided their facilities, whenever asked. To the coaches that go above and beyond expectations to enhance the development of our next group of nationally competitive players, we thank and admire you.

Lastly we would like to thank those within our Territory Tennis community that have provided our coaches the crucial personal support they have needed to continue their work.



Coach Education

During the 2017-18 year foundation coaching courses were held in Darwin (8 participants in December) and Beswick (7 participants in April).

In January Tennis NT's CTDM Pat Coburn graduated from Tennis Australia's High Performance Coaching Course.

Coach Development

Tennis NT continued to provide unique coach development opportunities. These ranged from group workshops to reports on individual players through to individual coach mentor sessions encompassing both their coaching and business practices. The individual nature of many of these coach development opportunities allowed messages to be tailored specifically to the challenges each coach faces.

2018 Australian Grand Slam Coaches Conference

For the first year since its inception no NT registered coaches attended the 2018 Australian Grand Slam Coaches Conference held in Melbourne just prior to the Australian Open.

Talent Development Coaches

The Talent Development Coaches program is the vehicle through which Tennis Australia invests in its network of highly skilled private coaches. During the reporting year Sam Giess (Gardens Tennis Club) met criteria and was able to take advantage of the travel subsidies on offer attending all the Clay Harcourt and Grass National Championships. In addition to travel grants this group of coaches who are recognised for their proven ability to develop young players continue to be provided with additional professional development opportunities.

Tennis Australia Coach Membership

NT coaches continue to engage with Tennis Australia's Coach Membership with the following numbers registering in 2017-18.

Qualified / Business – 10 Trainee – 16

2017 Australian Teams Championships

Tennis NT fielded teams in the boys 12 and 14 and the girls 12 age groups. The boys 12's finished 8th of 12 teams while the boys 14s finished 6th of 11 teams and the girls 12's finished 11th of 12 teams. Peter Politis playing at number one in the 14 boys produced some outstanding tennis coming back from a set down on all three occasions to win his singles rubber against Vic, NSW and WA.



2017 Queensland Regional Junior Teams Carnival

Tennis NT was represented in all divisions of the 2017 Queensland Junior Teams Carnival. The event held in December 2017 comprised mixed teams of 6 players in the 11s, 13s, 15s, and 17s age groups.

The 11s placed 7 of 16, the 13s 9 of 16, the 15s 16 of 16 and the 17s 14 of 14. Participation in the Queensland Junior Teams Carnival provides vital representative opportunities and enables many Territory players to experience their first interstate tennis competition at an appropriate standard. Providing our older athletes the opportunity to represent the Territory is a particular bonus.



2017 School Sport Australia Bruce Cup

The Northern Territory team travelled to Shepparton for the 2017 Bruce Cup. In our most competitive performance ever the team won 42% of rubbers finishing sixth out of the eight teams participating. Jett Leong went undefeated at number one boy and won the individual singles event. Patrick Findlay finished fourth in the individual event and Nicolas Tremblay won the consolation event. The Team was supported by *Manager* Ewa Finch *Coach* Megan Politis and Assistant Coach Tennis NT CTDM Pat Coburn.

Tennis NT continued to support school sport in trials, skill sessions, gala days, the 12 and under school sport exchange and the Bruce Cup. In exchange our coaches benefit from experiencing firsthand the student management strategies and practices employed by the teachers involved in school sport.

Coach & Talent Development Report



2018 Australia Made Foundation Cup

The Foundation Cup is a team's event for boys and a girl's from regional Australia. Teams of 4 compete in separate male and female divisions. The NT and Tasmania compete against regional teams from NSW, Vic, Queensland, SA and WA. In a terrific performance by the NT teams the girls team finished 2nd and the boys team finished 3rd. Jemma Gossow (5 from 7 singles) Trephina Campbell (6 from 7 singles) Tegan Genockey (5 from 7 singles) where outstanding contributors in the girls team while Jett Leong (6 from 7 singles) and Nicolas Tremblay (5 from 7 singles) led the way for the boys.



2018 Talent 10s National Camp

The Northern Territory sent 4 boys and 4 girls to the newly modelled Talent 10s National Camp. No longer a State vs State competition, the camp format saw players from various states placed into teams to ensure they could compete at their level. With players mixing between states our players benefited by making many new friends and experiencing the different playing culture that came with each individual.

Events Calendar

The Northern Territory had another busy tournament schedule with 1 Australian Pro Tour tournament, 1 ITF Junior Grade 5 tournament, 8 Australian Money Tournaments, 10 Junior Tour tournaments and 11 Junior Development Series tournaments.

Australian Pro Tour

The Pro Tour is a series of professional tennis events that act as a bridge between junior events and the ATP/WTA Tour. These events provide an opportunity for players to earn their first World Ranking Points.

Pro Tour events are staged predominantly in regional areas across Australia. The Northern Territory held a single Men's only event in Alice Springs that saw 57 athletes competing.

Australian Money Tournaments (AMTs)

AMTs are semi-professional tournaments introduced by Tennis Australia in 2006. They are designed to create quality match play opportunities and help with the transition of post junior athletes.

The Northern Territory conducted 1 Platinum; 2 Gold; 1 Silver and 4 Bronze AMTs.

Of the 8 AMT tournaments, 16 events offered Australian Ranking Points and prize money. 374 competitors entered which is an increase of 21.04% over the previous reporting period.

Junior Tournament (JT)

The JT is an umbrella tour that provides a competition pathway for aspiring junior players. These tournaments offer Australian Ranking points across the 12/U, 14/U and 16/U age groups.

The Northern Territory conducted 2 Gold; 1 Silver and 4 Bronze JT tournaments during the reporting period.

Of these 7 JT tournaments, 71 events offered Australian Ranking Points for both boys and girls across the three age groups. 581 competitors entered which was a decrease of 43.76% over the previous reporting period.

Junior Development Series (JDS)

The JDS sits under the JT in the Competition Pathway and is designed for beginner to intermediate players, giving them their first tournament experience. These tournaments are conducted around Australia.

Now in its fifth year the JDS attracted 466 competitors over the 7 tournaments that were on offer across the Northern Territory. This is a decrease of 36.16% compared to the previous reporting period.



Competitor Analysis

The following table identifies the number of competitors at each level of tournament. A total of 1,526 Competitive opportunities were accessed. This was a decrease of 26.95% over the previous reporting period. The perceived decrease was caused by the revamp of the calendar of events across the NT, which saw a few tournaments move from the first half of the year to the second, therefore placing them outside the current reporting period.

Australian Pro Tour

Darwin Open

In 2018, the Darwin Open dropped its junior events to but remained an AMT Gold, and was the first in a trio of events intended to entice interstate competitors to compete in the NTs mini-circuit, which culminated in the ITF Junior International.

The 92nd NT Open Championships, which was an AMT Platinum, JT bronze and JDS event, attracted 300 entries across 19 events. Overall event entries increased 13.64%.

Darwin Junior International

2018 saw the return of an ITF Junior event to Darwin with the Darwin Junior International (Grade 5) being hosted for the first time since 2009. The tournament was the last in the swing of 3 events which began the June-July tournament season.

NT Junior Championships & Darwin Junior Titles

The NT Junior Championships JT Gold and Darwin Junior Titles JT Gold were conducted back to back and attracted 304 competitors (an increase of 27.73% compared to 2016-17).

The NT Junior Championships, now in its sixth year as a JT Gold continues to be an attractive tournament for interstate travellers to attend, it is the on-going attractiveness of the escape from winter and quality tennis that has allowed the Darwin Junior Titles to receive and upgrade and also become a Gold JT event. The implementation of back-to-back Gold JT events has prevented the significant drop in numbers typically seen between the NT Junior and Darwin Junior events, with players opting to stay on and continue competing, rather than heading off to other states.

Standard Based Junior Development Series events were also conducted alongside these tournaments. 127 beginner to intermediate players (an increase of 30.92% compared with 2016-17) participated in numerous events including: Red, Orange & Green Ball singles and doubles, and 10&U Singles. These Standard Based events conducted at the same venue and at the same time allows for younger players to experience the culture of a tournament, the fun that can be had, and perhaps aspire to becoming a future tennis star. These events also allow older juniors to give back to the tennis community by assisting the beginner players in areas such a scoring and general match awareness.

As always, Tennis NT thanks the group of dedicated volunteers and officials without whom, the NT Junior Championships and Darwin Junior Titles would not run so smoothly.

Tennis NT's website continues to be utilised as an effective means of publishing information relevant to Tennis NT, it's partners and services offered, along with the promotion of programs and events.



Social Media

Tennis NT continues to successfully use social media to engage with and provide information to its members, along with engaging with the various clubs Facebook pages through upcoming events, tournaments and news stories.

This platform continues to prove a crucial element to keeping fans engaged, while appealing to a wider audience with constant and relevant updates.

Tennis NT's Facebook likes continued to rise again this financial year, showing an increase of 19% coming from a variety of different countries. 61% of Tennis NT's followers are females with the most popular demographic following Tennis NT being Females aged between 35 – 44 years old (21%).

Throughout the year Tennis NT's posts reached a total of 38 different countries, this is done via shares and likes, and will continue to grow as the total number of likes keeps increasing. Tennis NT's Twitter continues to grow and engage a wider audience, with 109 followers at the end of the reporting period, an increase of 14.73% compared to last period.

Instagram was a new addition to Tennis NT's social media repertoire in the first half of 2018 and through the promotion of it via various tournaments and events within June, it rapidly gained 126 followers. With a full reporting period ahead of it, it should continue to prove a useful method of communication to an ever-growing audience.



Media

Regular and event specific circulation of media releases to Territory media outlets proved to be beneficial in gaining exposure for tennis, particularly during tournaments.

482 articles were accounted for during the 2017-18 period, a decrease of 5.85% from the previous period. These articles were extracted from the pages of the *NT News, Sunday Territorian, Darwin & Palmerston Sun, Katherine Times, Centralian Advocate & The Standard (Warrnambool).*

International tournaments, particularly the Pro Tour Event in Alice Springs and opening of the Darwin International Tennis Centre, provided the highest exposure opportunities within the print media.

Radio stations, *Hot 100, Mix 104.9* and *ABC Radio* provide coverage in their local sports reports when briefed with media releases. Radio interviews were also conducted with ABC's *Grandstand, Darwin Mornings* and *Saturday Breakfast*.



Constitution & Annual General Meeting

Tennis NT is a not-for-profit incorporated association registered in the Northern Territory. The association's purpose is to:

- Support the growth and development of tennis in the NT
- Make a positive contribution to the national and international community
- Provide progressive opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to participate
- Develop and improve infrastructure
- Ensure access is available and appealing to consumers' via media outlets

Tennis NT's 2017 AGM was held on Saturday 11 November 2017 with 36 people in attendance. Elections for two Director Positions were held with David De Silva and Charles Burkitt elected.

Board of Directors

The Tennis NT Board comprises five Directors including a President and a Vice-President. In accordance with the Constitution the election of positions is rotational to ensure continuity of corporate knowledge. INDEPENDENT AUDIT REPORT

TO THE MEMBERS OF TENNIS NT INCORPORATED

Scope

Notes to and forming part of the Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2018

Note 1

Summary of Accounting Policies

The accounting policies adopted by the Association are stated in order to assist in a general understanding of the Financial Statements. These policies have been consistently applied except as otherwise indicated.

Reporting entity

The Association is not a reporting entity because in the Board's opinion there are likely to exist users who are able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs, and these accounts are therefore "special purpose accounts" that have been prepared solely to meet the requirements of the Constitution and the *Associations Act*.

Accounting policies

The Financial Report has been prepared under the historical cost conventions and does not take into account changing money values except to the extent that they are reflected in the revaluation of certain assets. In order for the Financial Report to present fairly the state of affairs of the Association and the results of the Association for the year, Australian Accounting Standards have been adopted to the extent disclosed in this note.

Government Grants

Government Grants are brought to account as income when the Association receives them. Government Grants of a reciprocal nature are transferred to an appropriate liability account, and bought to account as income as the funds are spent.

Assets

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost or deemed cost less accumulated depreciation. Cost includes expenditures that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. The cost of constructed assets includes the cost of materials, direct labour, the initial estimate, where relevant, of the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located, and an appropriate proportion of production overheads. Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Depreciation is recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment.

The estimated useful lives in the current and comparative periods are as follows:

٠	Buildings	30 years
•	Courts & Court equipment	5-40 years
•	Plant and equipment	4-10 years
•	Land escaping	40 years
•	Computer equipment	3-5 years
•	Furniture and fittings	5-30 years

Employee Entitlements

The amounts expected to be paid to employees for their pro rata entitlement to annual leave and long service leave are accrued annually at current pay rates.

Income tax

The Association is of the opinion that it is not subject to income tax.

Note 2

Investment

The investment is currently held at People's Choice Credit Union, previously named Australian Central Savings & Loans.

Note 3

Darwin Regional Tennis Centre Construction Funds

This is capital grant funding received from the Northern Territory Government for construction of the Darwin Regional Tennis Centre. The funding is to be used solely for the project and in accordance with the agreement made between the Government and Tennis NT. The funds are brought to account as income as and when they are spent.





Note 4

Prepaid Expenses

This represents insurance allocations to the next financial year – for Workers Compensation insurance and the business insurance, as well as Darwin festival expenses.

Note 5

Property, Plant and Equipment

There was total additional Property, Plant and equipment of \$18,306,757 in relation to the redevelopment project during 2017-18.

Note 6

Income Received in Advance

Income received in advance of \$4,341 relates to entry fees received for tournaments run in July 2018.

Note 7

Income Received in Advance - Government Grants

Prior year income received inadvance brought into Grant income during 2017-18 financial year upon completion of Marrara project (Refer to Note 3).

Note 8

Officials Development Fund

In 2010, Tennis NT was successful in securing \$2,845.60 of 'unclaimed monies' from the dissolved *Northern Territory Tennis Umpires Association*. This group ceased to function during the period 1996-97 and the remaining funds held in their bank account were surrendered by the bank in 2004 to the *Australian Securities and Investments Commission*. The money is held in trust for Officials Development.

An additional amount of \$7,154.40 has been raised and endorsed by the board in September 2014.

Note 9

TCA-NT Scholarship Fund

In 2006, TCA-NT dissolved and instructed that its residual funds be given to Tennis NT on the provision that the funds be held in trust as a scholarship fund, specifically for coach education and development. This has been increased to \$20,200 endorsed by the board in September 2014.

Note 10

Facility Development Fund Reserve

In 2014, Tennis NT Board endorsed and committed \$200,000 to the Facility Development Fund for the development of facilities throughout Northern Territory. An amount of \$24,028 has been spent up to this period.
