We are delighted to provide this report for the year ending 30 June 2016, another big year for Territory Tennis.

Late in 2015 Tennis NT adopted a new Strategic Plan for the 2016-2020 period. This plan encompasses six areas which form the basis of our reporting below.

Along with the adoption of a new Strategic Plan, tennis in the NT also experienced a number of notable highlights in 2015-16. This includes another increase in participation levels, the hosting of the NT's first Davis Cup tie and the announcement of a new \$16.7m facility in Darwin.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY AREA 1: PARTICIPATION "Provide opportunity to participate in tennis as a sport for life"

In line with Tennis NT's vision: 'More people playing tennis', there was an active focus in 2015-16 on working with key stakeholders from across the NT to increase participation in tennis. Central to this focus is the Participation Leader position (formerly Community Tennis Officer). During the year both Erin Bormann and Sam Condon played crucial roles in the space, working with various stakeholders including schools and clubs.

Tennis NT's operates a calendar year reporting period for registered club participants and it is pleasing to note that tennis experienced a 9.6% increase in 2015, following a 10.5% increase in the previous year. It was also pleasing to see an increase in three out of four of Tennis NT's regions during the reporting period. As was the case in 2015, the Alice Springs Tennis Association topped the registered participants list with 1022.

Participation programs across the NT include a number of National, NT and club based initiatives. The ongoing success of ANZ Tennis Hot Shots and National Schools Programs continue to provide a great foundation for the development of tennis. It is pleasing that we are then able to compliment these programs within the NT through specific Tennis in Schools Programs and the Power and Water Regional Development Program which has been crucial in developing sustainability in regional areas of the NT.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY AREA 2: PLACES TO PLAY "Managed hierarchy of facilities"

In August 2015 Tennis NT formally adopted the NT Facilities Strategy, a Strategy formulated independently by Inside Edge Sport and Leisure Planning. The Strategy was devised following extensive consultation and provides the basis for development for the next 10 years.

The development of a major facility has long been the key strategic priority for the sport in the NT. Following years of work in developing business cases, assessing the needs of such a facility and engaging key stakeholders, Tennis NT was thrilled to announce the development of a \$16.7m facility to be constructed within the Marrara Sporting Complex. Having the President of Tennis Australia – Steve Healy, and Pat Rafter in Darwin to make the announcement with the NT Government was great for the sport. The hard work begins now to ensure that the facility is developed appropriately with the best interests of the sport in mind.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY AREA 3: COACHES "Increased capacity of coaches to develop tennis"

Coaches are crucial to the overall development of tennis in the NT and attracting and retaining quality coaches is one of the major challenges we face. It was pleasing to have six Territory coaches receive their Club Professional Coaching Certificate at the 2015 Presentation Dinner. The NT was also fortunate enough to begin a Junior Development Coaching Course in Darwin with six participants.

A key development opportunity for NT coaches continues to be the opportunity to travel interstate with NT selected teams. In 2015 coaches accompanied teams to the QLD Regional Teams Event, the December Showdown, the Super 10s National Finals and the Foundation Cup.

The development of a range of coaches across the NT will continue to be of strategic importance to Tennis NT and this development will continue to be a focus of the Coach and Talent Development Manager – Pat Coburn.



STRATEGIC PRIORITY AREA 4: TALENT DEVELOPMENT

"One National Champion that we are proud of"

Throughout 2015-16 Tennis NT has maintained a decentralised player development model underpinned by the Territory Academies Program.

Despite the challenges faced in the NT, the NT has achieved some positive results on the court. This included NT players Liam Franklin and Michael Shepheard winning the 14u doubles at the Platinum Rod Laver Championships.

Also of particular note in 2015-16 were the results achieved by the NT in interstate tours, highlighted by a runner-up performance in the NT's first Foundation Cup, and a fourth place finish in the 2015 Queensland Junior Teams Carnival. Tennis NT will continue to focus on appropriate interstate opportunities for NT athletes.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY AREA 5: TOURNAMENTS & COMPETITIONS

"Attract and retain highly engaged competitive players"

It was a strong year for participation in NT tournaments with a 6.2% increase in tournament experiences during the reporting period.

From an international point of view the NT had a big year through the hosting of the sixth Alice Springs Tennis International, along with the Davis Cup tie in Darwin. The great work that continues to be done by a passionate group of Alice Springs Officials was again a feature in these international events.

Locally the NT played host to the inaugural People's Choice NT Premier League, an inter-club competition for the NT's best players. Congratulations went to Alice Springs as the inaugural winner. Darwin also played host to the 90th NT Open Championships, one of the longest running annual sporting events in the NT.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY AREA 6: PROMOTION & ENGAGEMENT

"Greater awareness of tennis through strong relationships"

Both the hosting of the Davis Cup in July 2015, and the positive announcement surrounding the Marrara

development have helped the sport maintain a high level public profile. This, in addition to the great work done by our affiliated clubs, will ensure that tennis remains at the forefront in Territory sport.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Tennis in the NT benefits from the work of a number of key stakeholders that need acknowledgement. First of all a big thanks to Tennis NT's affiliated clubs who tirelessly drive the development of the sport. We look forward to continuing our work together.

We have also been the benefactor of great relationships with Tennis Australia and the Northern Territory Government. Without their support tennis wouldn't have the bright future we're planning for in the NT.

Tennis NT's sponsors, who are listed in this report, also need acknowledgement. The long standing partnerships we have with these organisations are of considerable benefit to the sport. The work of the Tennis NT Board has again been of a high level in 2015-16. We benefit from this hard work immensely and look forward to continued success at Board level.

Innovate and grow



The innovative DNA that has long been infused into the organisation was realised in a very physical sense in the 2015-2016 financial year through our ongoing quest to innovate in all aspects of our business – not just for the sake of it,

but also for increased depth and connection with players, fans, partners and broadcasters alike. Significant quality and efficiency improvements also arise from the focus and effort injected into these concepts.

There are many varied examples of our willingness to explore new and different ideas. They range from a strong focus on Hot Shots growth (particularly in schools and competitions), major new facilities, groundbreaking digital and broadcast content, commercial partnerships that add content value as well as financial benefit, and to a holistic approach to athlete wellbeing in player development. These are reaping dividends through tennis participation, revenue, quality of our content and elite athlete performance.

A special highlight has been the work that Tennis NT did to deliver the Davis Cup quarterfinal tie against the Kazakhstan in July 2015. It was a great three-day tennis spectacle, held on a magnificent grass court in Darwin. Another highlight was the support secured for the development of the Marrara Sporting Complex.

Our sport

The ANZ Tennis Hot Shots program continues to provide the foundation for the successful growth of our sport. This entry program has become the envy of many, with much of its latest growth coming from an intensely focused effort in primary schools aimed at honing the program to provide maximum ease of implementation for teachers, parents and students alike – ensuring it has a relevance to their lifestyle, educational needs and skill set.

A recent International Tennis Federation survey on tennis participation in France, German, India, Japan, Poland, Sweden, UK, USA and Australia found we had the highest percentage of our population playing tennis with 2.1 million people playing once a year and 1.2 million playing 10 or more times. The stand out statistic was that 290,000 people started playing in the last 12 months –Hot Shots is clearly doing its job.

It is more evidence that we are on the right track and we have further increased our resources in this space to continue this upward surge with the aim of delivering greater numbers of children from an initial Hot Shots experience into Hot Shots competitions and ongoing tennis experiences.

Nationally, an eight per cent increase in yearon-year Hot Shots numbers included 213,883 participants, that figure significantly boosted by the 1439 schools now delivering the program through a partnership with the Australian Sports Commission Sporting Schools Program. Additionally, 249 schools nationwide participated in a new School Play Program that was introduced to help support competition within schools.

This commitment to acquiring and retaining new participants in our sport was complemented by a coordinated effort across the nation involving many clubs, associations and Member Associations to improve the competitive and social tennis experience for current players – whether it be in reducing administration or piloting the new Book-a-Court initiative.

Facilities growth

Nationwide support for the construction and redevelopment of facilities included a funding commitment approaching \$2 million dollars in 2015-16. This contributed to a total stakeholder investment of \$34.4 million, allowing 327 new or resurfaced courts to be funded through the National Court Rebate. An additional 187 ANZ Tennis Hot Shots courts were also funded across the country.

Our team

The collective body of work completed by our dedicated team in the last 12 months has been nothing short of phenomenal. It is a credit to their professionalism and passion as we strive for constant improvement and reinvention.

Our work to improve Tennis Connect is continuing and has been supported by a new Project Management Office. This is one of the many actions being taken to improve the delivery, access to and tracking of our sport.

The co-operation between our tennis community and the commitment to keep putting our sport first has shone through. Players at all levels, coaches, volunteers, administrators, officials and fans continue to make tennis special in Australia. Thank you to all of you for your love of our sport and your efforts to keep making it so enjoyable and successful.

Our future

Our future looks bright but not without its challenges.

Our great sport suffered some severe hits this year such as the allegations of widespread match-fixing made to coincide with start of our premier event, the Australian Open. Rest assured the allegations were taken extremely seriously and any accusations were and will be followed up with intense rigour both domestically and internationally.

We always have and always will take the integrity of tennis seriously. That's why we are part of a global all-sport agreement to review integrity. As such we have made significant new investment in tennis integrity including our own Tennis Integrity Unit.

Financially we continue to build our reserves and plan to invest strongly in the protection of the Australian Open and intensify our investment in the sport with plans for greater funding to resource and deliver tennis across the nation.

We look forward to an exciting 12 months ahead.



Participation Report

Tennis Australia's Participation Leaders

One of the many resources utilised in the Northern Territory in order to drive promotional activities is the Participation Leader position (previously referred to as Community Tennis Officers). The provision of this role also assists in the creation of necessary relationships within all areas, such as schools, clubs and communities in order to achieve the stable and sustainable growth witnessed from year to year.

The Participation Leader is the first point of call for Territory Clubs when it comes to programs and initiatives centred around participation in tennis. This includes but is not limited to ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, Fitbit Cardio Tennis, Schools Programs, the Power and Water Regional Development Program and Community Play.

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots (ANZTHS) is tennis especially for children. It incorporates smaller courts, smaller racquets and low-compression tennis balls that don't bounce too high. All of this makes learning tennis easy and best of all, fun. There are three stages – Red, Orange and Green – all of which help develop children's skills and confidence.

In 2015-16 there were seven registered ANZTHS deliverers in the Northern Territory providing programs participants. The ANZTHS deliverers were:

Tennis Australia, gives all Partnership Program schools the opportunity to apply for a Tennis Hot Shots shirt for each participant if their details are registered online. 1789 Territorians took advantage of this offer, which first required their school to be registered in the partnership program, to receive a Tennis Hot Shots shirt during the year.

At the beginning of each calendar year Partnership schools are encouraged to apply for the free transition tennis racquets. Berry Springs received 88 free junior racquets for their new transition students during the 15/16 financial year.

ANZTHS also continues to be used as the community engagement program attached to major events such as the Pro Tour.



Participation Report

Community Play

Community Play is all about enjoying tennis with friends and being a good sport. Parents (or guardians) are empowered to assist on court with scoring and reinforcing the "Be a good sport" messages.

The Gove Peninsula Tennis Club (GPTC) continued on as a Community Play venue during 2015-16 through the work of enthusiastic, hard-working committee members who give up their time to run coaching sessions and match play throughout the week.

School Programs

Forty different schools had a minimum of four tennis sessions during the financial year – this equates to approximately twenty percent of all NT schools.


Tennis Australia's Partnership and Play School Tennis Programs

During 2015-16 the Australian Government implemented its Sporting Schools program. This program was put in place to have more children active through school organised activities. The Schools would apply for funding through the program, and then select its sport of choice. For schools that selected Tennis the local coach would then be put in contact with the school, create a timetable, and facilitate the tennis sessions. Schools that signed up to these programs were offered a free equipment pack from Tennis Australia which included nets, racquets, balls, line markers, and a carry bag. Schools can then use the provided resources to deliver the program on their own, or further use the funding to pay for the club coach to take the sessions.

Tennis Australia offers two programs as part of the Sporting Schools initiative, based on the ANZ Tennis Hot Shots program. The Partnership and Play programs are made up of fun tennis activities which support skill acquisition and

movement all whilst 'playing the game' in a meaningful way. Through both programs, students will become confident and competent which is important when trying new sports. Both the Partnership and Play programs facilitate active play and are inclusive. Tennis can be participated in by both boys and girls of all ages and abilities. The aims of the programs are to support schools with sustainable health and physical education programs whilst also increasing the participation and activity levels of students.

Tennis Australia's National Schools Partnership Program (NSPP) continued strongly this year, through the quality connections formed by the clubs & coaches. There was also an increase in NSPP numbers to seventeen with many schools renewing their memberships from the previous year.



The ongoing support of Tennis Australia allowed for schools to continue receiving equipment packs and manuals which allows any teacher to confidently run sessions within their schools. The Playback rebate, which began in 2013, saw schools most schools once again awarded \$100+ to spend on tennis equipment of their choosing once they resigned for the new financial year.

Free Tennis sessions

Building on the previous year's ANZTHS six free lunch time sessions, schools were again offered the opportunity for six free tennis lessons to be delivered by a club coach during class. Tennis NT's Participation Leader facilitated the relationship between a school and their closest local club. Coaches then attended the school for six sessions within class time. This has provided greater opportunity for the students to experience tennis and has shown a higher cross-over from school sessions to club sessions than the lunch time only sessions. All Primary Schools based in Darwin, Palmerston, Alice Springs, Katherine, Groote Eylandt and Gove were all contacted and given the opportunity to take part. A total of 31 schools took advantage of this introductory program, with an additional nine schools already signed up to the Partnership Program, informing Tennis NT they were facilitating their own sessions.

Interschool's Tennis Competition

This year saw 9 teams with a total of 36 players compete in Tennis NT's Interschool competition. The Northern Suburbs and Palmerston had schools take part with Good Shepherd Lutheran College narrowly winning the competition ahead of Nightcliff Primary. Unfortunately Good Shepherd was unable to take its spot at the national event and Nightcliff Primary took this opportunity after being the second placed team. Nightcliff then finished 8th, beating the teams from Tasmania and New South Wales. The students were also lucky enough to meet Alicia Molik and Thanasi Kokkinakis.



Participation Report

Tennis 360

A new data collection method was implemented towards the end of the 2015-16 financial year – Tennis 360. The three clubs who chose to participate record their participation stats over the course of a chosen week. The data is then put into a table creating an easy and assessable way to evaluate how each club is doing in different participation areas. The data was split into different age groups, sex, and coaching types and occurred roughly every four weeks.

Building a solid base of historic data will assist the clubs work strategically towards achieving their goals and creating a sustainable business plan for 16/17. The three clubs that nominated to take part in this data collection in 2015-16 were AWOF Sports, Gardens Tennis, and Tennis Palmerston.

Book A Court

Book a Court is an online court booking and payment platform for affiliated tennis clubs. It's easy to use for both players and club administrators, which means more time on court for everyone! When players book a court online they're sent a PIN for direct access to their court, or if there is no connected pin pad available, the player is provided with alternative instructions to access the court.

Player Registrations


An increase in registrations was once again reported across the Southern Region. With further growth witnessed in the Central Region. It is also pleasing to see a 24.4% increase in player registrations across the Metropolitan Region. Overall growth was seen within the Northern Territory with a 9.6% increase following on from an increase of 10.54% in 2014/15. Tennis NT will continue to work with all regions in an effort to continue growth trends across the Territory.

Power and Water Regional Development Program

In order for our coaches to continue to provide considerable investment into regional tennis development outside of the metropolitan area, Tennis NT continued its successful partnership with Power and Water. This partnership is appreciatively acknowledged.



The partnership is managed by identified program objectives documented in separate Memorandum of Understandings (MOU).

An MOU is a crucial part of ensuring that there is a strong focus on Regional and Remote tennis. As such, the MOU for the Southern (Tennis Alice Springs – Matt Roberts) Region was renegotiated with the Regional Development Officers at the beginning of 2015-16. Tennis NT also worked with the Central (Katherine Tennis Club – Sam Murch) Region in order to develop a quality MOU to help drive growth within the region.

As previously reported both The Central and Southern Regions demonstrated increases in total player registrations. There was another decrease in the Northern Region, however with no centre operator the club was able to maintain a solid membership.



Tennis NT has continued to support Tennis Gove, and the outlying areas of the Northern Region, including Groote Eylandt. During May, Sam Condon (Participation Leader) from Tennis NT hosted the 2016 Groote Eylandt Inter-Schools Challenge. This trip involved a variety of school-based clinics across the three schools (Alyangula, Angurugu and Umbakumba) as well as hosting the Schools based tournament in Alyangula. They eventual winners Alyangula also proudly represented the Northern Region in the School Sport NT Tennis Championships, in which they won the Team Spirit Sportsmanship award.

During June 2016, Sam Condon also travelled across to the Gove Peninsula Tennis Club to work within the club, parents and committee members alike. Sam delivered an 'Intro to ANZ Hot Shots Coaching Course'. This course introduced and broadened the eight participant's perspectives of activities, based around the four stages of Hot Shots to build each child's tactical and technical skills. Along with this course, Sam also did an array of school clinics with schools around the area. Tennis NT would like to recognise Les Mitchell for his help and continued support of running the Gove Peninsula Tennis Club.



Tennis Industry Leaders Workshop

Tennis NT hosted its annual Tennis Industry Leaders Workshop offsite at Lake Bennett Resort on 2-3 March 2016. The workshop is convened to provide a forum specifically for Northern Territory tennis centre managers. Three of the NT's four regions were represented as thirteen participants made the trip for the first ever offsite Workshop.



David Phillips, Tennis Australia's Professional Development Coordinator (Coach Education) once again made the trip up in order to facilitate a variety of discussions building upon the various areas the delved into last year. This included a range of topics across the six areas of Tennis NT's Strategic Plan.

Workshop attendees also discussed an array of topics aimed at guiding operations in the Northern Territory through the upcoming year. Topics included the Tournaments, Officials, the Intra-Territory Travel Grant Program and Top End Competitions.

The continuation of these workshops is crucial in order for Tennis NT to ensure a committed and united approach to the delivery of tennis across the Territory.



A Club Centred Approach

During the 2015-16 reporting year Tennis NT had a club centred approach to player development monitored through the NT Academies program. Due to divergent philosophies and coach changes only Tennis Palmerston and AWOF Sports were in a position to complete their end of calendar year Academy report.

Camps and Talent Days

Tennis NT CTDM delivered camps or talent days at each of its affiliated clubs with a qualified coach. In all 44 players and 8 coaches were impacted by these camps.

Four selected camps were also held throughout the reporting period. These were the NT Davis Cup Camp in July 2015 attended by 6 players. The Super 10s Selection Camp held in September 2015 and attended by 16 players and 4 coaches, the Bruce Cup Camp held in October 2015 and attended by 14 players and the "Girl Power" camp in March 2016 attended by 16 female players and a female coach.



Super 10s

Super 10s was again a highlight of the talent year. Darwin (26 participants) Palmerston (20 participants) and Alice Springs (20 players) all hosted Super 10s seasons. This was followed by the Super 10s camp where players (16 players and 4 coaches) from these regions were joined by players from Katherine. From the camp 8 players and two coaches were selected to form the NT teams that participated in the 2016 Super 10s National Finals.





Athlete Tournament Support

Tennis NT supported individuals on tour to Platinum events by sending the Tennis NT CTDM. In the reporting year this included the 2015 Rod Laver Championships (12 players and one private coach), the October 2015 Bruce Cup Individual event (14 Players and one Private Coach), the Australian Hard court Championships during the December 2015 Showdown (4 players) and the Australian Grass Court Championships in Adelaide during April 2016 (7 players and one Private Coach). The best result during these Platinum events was Liam Franklin and Michael Shepheard winning the boys 14 doubles at the 2015 Rod Laver Championships.



Athlete Training Support

Tennis NT conducted the Club Extension program and the Girls Performance Training Program throughout school terms.



The Club Extension Program comprised the requirement for private coaches to provide Athlete Improvement Plans, for Clubs to provide continuing access to suitable squad sessions and for the players to commit to strength and conditioning sessions run by the NTIS. The program offered two 90 minute squad sessions per week, was run from weeks 2 to 9 each term and involved 8 players. A term fee of \$150 was charged refunded to the player if they accepted selection into an NT representative team at the end of the year.

The Girls Performance Training Program was an attempt to attract female players that had participated at a representative level in the past back onto the court. The only requirement for the program was previous State representation. The program ran one hour per week.



Parent Information Sessions

Tennis NT CTDM ran two formal parent sessions during the year. One in Alice Springs (6 Parents) during November and one in Darwin (12 Parents) during September. Multiple meetings with individual parents were also held.

Looking Forward

Tennis NT's obligation to its major supporters, the NT Government and Tennis Australia, is to implement a development pathway along which Territory juniors are given every chance to reach their playing potential. We also have an obligation to provide an environment where our coaches and business operators can grow, develop and prosper. It is within these confines that athlete development finds itself bound.

In recent years a decentralised approach to player development as requested by the clubs has been governed through the Tennis NT Academies Program (NTAP). While this approach received initial support from club operators its success relied on each individual club coach remaining passionate and committed to achieving player development outcomes within the guidelines provided as part of the NTAP. This suitability of this approach is monitored by Tennis NT's Athlete Development Committee, and in turn by the Tennis NT Board.



Acknowledgements

The continuing support of the centre managers in the Athlete Development space needs to be acknowledged. Without exception they have generously and enthusiastically provided their facilities whenever asked.

Tennis NT would also like to acknowledge the support of those Territory Coaches who are going above and beyond expectations to enhance the development of our next group of nationally competitive players and ultimately our next National Champion.

Coach Education

During the 2015-16 year five Territory coaches completed their Tennis Australia Club Professional qualification and six candidates started their Tennis Australia Junior Development Coaching qualification. In total there were 27 TA Coach Members registered in the NT.



Introduction to ANZ Hot Shots course were held in both Alyangula (4 candidates) and Gove (4 candidates).



Coach Development

Tennis NT provided 49 unique coach development opportunities. These ranged from group workshops to reports on individual players through to individual coach mentor sessions encompassing both their coaching and business practices. The individual nature of many of these coach development opportunities allowed messages to be tailored specifically to the challenges each coach faces.

2016 Australian Grand Slam Coaches Conference

Six coaches from the Northern Territory tennis coaching fraternity travelled to the 2016 Australian Grand Slam Coaches





Athlete Development Report

Conference held in Melbourne just prior to the Australian Open.

The Northern Territory continues to have great representation from its small tennis community and Tennis NT acknowledges these coaches for their personal commitment and their desire for knowledge.



Talent Development Coaches

Tennis Australia has continued to invest in this selected network of coaches who specialise in the development of athletes under the age of fourteen. This group of coaches who are recognised for their proven ability to develop young players continue to be provided with additional professional development opportunities including travel grants.

Ultimately the purpose of this engagement is to build stronger relationships and partnerships with private coaches to improve the quality and quantity of athletes.

Benita Bittner (Gardens Tennis) Matt Dudley (AWOF Sports) and Matt Roberts (Tennis Alice Springs) all enjoyed the benefits of being a Tennis Australia Talent Development Coaches during the reporting year.



2015 Australian Teams Championships

Tennis NT fielded teams in the boys 12 and 14 age groups. The boys 12's finished 12th of 14 teams while the boys 14s finished 8th of 12 teams.



2015 Queensland Regional Junior Teams Carnival

Tennis NT was represented in all divisions of the 2015 Queensland Regional Teams Carnival. The event held in December 2015 comprised mixed teams of 6 players in the 11s, 13s, 15s, and 17s age groups.

The 11s placed 6 of 16, the 13s 15 of 16, the 15s, 8 of 16 and the 17s 5 of 14. Participation in the Queensland Junior Teams Carnival proved a great success with players and coaches finding the competition to be challenging while still appropriate. Being able to provide some of our older athletes with the opportunity to represent the Territory was a particular bonus.



2015 School Sport Australia Bruce Cup

The Northern Territory travelled to Hobart for the 2015 Bruce Cup. The team finished seventh out of the eight teams participating. Liam Franklin finished third in the individual singles event. The Team was supported by *Manager* Megan Politis *Coach* Helen Lamech and Assistant Coach Tennis NT CTDM Pat Coburn.

Tennis NT continued to support school sport in trials, skill sessions, gala days and the 12 and under school sport exchange. For the third consecutive year Tennis NTs CTDM Pat Coburn took on the formal role of Assistant Coach to the Bruce Cup team. Along with being heavily involved in the lead up training Pat was able to provide specific tennis advice and support to both the team and support staff while benefitting from experiencing firsthand the student management strategies and practices employed by the school sport teachers.





2016 Australia Made Foundation Cup

2015 was the first year that Tennis NT entered teams in the Australia Made Foundation Cup. The Foundation Cup is a team's event for boys and girls from regional Australia. Teams of 4 compete in separate male and female divisions. The NT and Tasmania compete against regional teams from NSW, Vic, Queensland, SA and WA. The NT boys team finished runners up to a strong Qld team while the NT girls finished 6th. It was a real thrill for the boy's team to make a National final. The stand out was the doubles pairing of Liam Franklin and Kenneth Prete that finished the event undefeated.





2016 Super 10s National Finals

The Northern Territory sent male and female teams of 4 players and a coach to the Super 10s Australian State finals played at Melbourne Park during the last 5 days of the Australian Open. The boy's team finished 7th and the girl's team 6th in the eight team competition.

Events Calendar

The Northern Territory had another busy tournament schedule with 1 Australian Pro Tour tournament, 9 Australian Money Tournaments, 11 Junior Tour tournaments and 10 Junior Development Series tournaments.

Australian Pro Tour

The Pro Tour is a series of professional tennis events that act as a bridge between junior events and the ATP/WTA Tour. These events provide an opportunity for players to earn their first World Ranking Points.

Pro Tour events are staged predominantly in regional areas across Australia. The Northern Territory held a single Men's only event in Alice Springs that saw 68 competitors compete, a 23.64% increase on the previous year.

Australian Money Tournaments (AMTs)

AMTs are semi-professional tournaments introduced by Tennis Australia in 2006. They are designed to create quality match play opportunities and help with the transition of post junior athletes.

The Northern Territory conducted 1 Platinum; 2 Gold; 1 Silver; 3 Bronze and 2 White AMTs.

Of the 9 AMT tournaments, 18 events offered Australian Ranking Points and prize money. 346 competitors entered which is an increase of 28.15% over the previous reporting period.

Junior Tournament (JT)

The JT is an umbrella tour that provides a competition pathway for aspiring junior players. These tournaments offer Australian Ranking points across the 12/U, 14/U and 16/U age groups.

The Northern Territory conducted 1 Gold; 1 Silver; 2 Bronze and 7 White JT tournaments during the reporting period.

Of these 11 JT tournaments, 57 events offered Australian Ranking Points for both boys and girls across the three age groups. 916 competitors entered which was an increase of 10.76% over the previous reporting period.

Junior Development Series (JDS)

The JDS sits under the JT in the Competition Pathway and is designed for beginner to intermediate players, giving them their first tournament experience. These tournaments are conducted around Australia.

Now in its fourth year the JDS attracted 612 competitors over the 10 tournaments that were on offer across the Northern Territory. This is a massive 50.37% increase compared to the previous reporting period.





Competitor Analysis

The following table identifies the number of competitors at each level of tournament. A total of 1,942 Australian Ranking Point opportunities were accessed. This was an increase of 24.57% over the previous reporting period.

Australian Pro Tour

The Alice Springs Tennis International was held from 28 September – 04 October 2015 for the sixth time at Tennis Alice Springs. The tournament is the first leg of the Northern Circuit on the ITF Futures calendar (Alice Springs, Toowoomba and Cairns) on the Australian Pro Tour.

Tennis NT would like to acknowledge the continued sponsorship of the Northern



Territory Government through the Department of Sport and Recreation, together with Alice Springs Town Council and local sponsors, the *ibis Styles Alice Springs Oasis* as the official hotel, *Emu Runs Tours* for providing tournament incidentals, together with the significant investment of Tennis Australia.

Seven countries were represented at the *Alice Springs Tennis International* including Australia, Japan, New Zealand, the United States of America, China, Malaysia & the Czech Republic. A record seven Northern Territory players entered into the qualifying draw to in 2015; they included Ethan Scobie, Nicholas Whyte, Jingjo Brown, Kylan Bishop, Jesse Russell, Joel Van Haaren & Evan Di Maria.

In a match that ensured the local talent would win a round of Qualifying, Alice Springs players Ethan Scobie and Nicholas Whyte met in the first round. It was a fight to the end, but eventually Whyte made it through after downing Scobie 6-4 7-5. Unfortunately the winning-streak didn't continue, with Whyte getting knocked out by fellow Australian Vuk Skadarka 6-3 6-2 in the second round.

Many thanks are extended to the small but hard working team of local volunteers and officials in Alice Springs. Special mention to the line officials, who managed to fully staff the event using local line unpires. NT Age Championships & Darwin Age Titles

The NT Age Championships JT Gold and Darwin Age Titles JT Bronze were conducted back to back and attracted 216 competitors (a decrease of 18.5% compared to last year). The decrease in numbers was likely impacted by the Rod Laver lead-in and Rod Laver tournaments in Queensland clashing with the Darwin Age Titles for the first time.

With Tennis Australia restructuring the four National Championships to eight State / Territory Championships, each State and Territory had to promote a prominent JT tournament to the Championship status. The NT Age Titles, now in its fourth year as a JT Gold seemed the appropriate tournament due to its attraction to interstate travellers, NT school holidays and its association with the Darwin Age Titles following it. The Darwin Age tournament was downgraded to JT Bronze to reflect the clash with the JT Gold Rod Laver Lead in.


Communications & Marketing

Tennis NT's website continues to be used as a means of publishing specific information about Tennis NT and its services, along with the promotion of programs and events.

2015-16 saw a 45.71% decrease in website 'hits' compared to the previous reporting period, which could be attributed to the growth in the prominence of social media across the sport.

Social Media

Tennis NT continues to successfully use social media to engage with and provide information to its members, along with engaging with the various clubs Facebook pages through upcoming events, tournaments and news stories.

This instant information has been crucial to keep fans engaged, while appealing to a wider audience with constant and relevant updates.

Tennis NT's Facebook likes rose by 51% this financial year coming from 28 different countries. 57% of Tennis NT's followers are females with the most popular demographic following Tennis NT being Females aged between 35 – 44 years old (16%).

Throughout the year Tennis NT's posts reached a total of 45 different countries, this is done via shares and likes, and will continue to grow as the total number of likes keeps increasing. Tennis NT now also has a Twitter handle, @TennisNT, which had 85 followers at the end of the reporting period.





Media

Regular and event specific circulation of media releases to Territory media outlets proved to be beneficial in gaining exposure for tennis, particularly during tournaments.

237 articles were accounted for during the 2015-16 period, an increase of 152.13% from the previous year. They were extracted from the pages of the *NT News, Sunday Territorian, Darwin & Palmerston Sun, Katherine Times, Centralian Advocate and Arafura Times.*

Local and international tournaments, particularly the 2015 Davis Cup tie in Darwin and Pro Tour Event in Alice Springs, provided the highest exposure opportunities within the print media.

Radio stations, *Hot 100*, *Mix 104.9* and *ABC Radio* provide consistent coverage in their local sports reports when briefed with media releases. Radio interviews were also conducted with ABC's *Grandstand, Darwin Mornings* and *Saturday Breakfast*.





Constitution & Annual General Meeting

Tennis NT is a not-for-profit incorporated association registered in the Northern Territory. The association's purpose is to:

- Support the growth and development of tennis in the NT
- Make a positive contribution to the national and international community
- Provide progressive opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to participate
- Develop and improve infrastructure
- Ensure access is available and appealing to consumers' via media outlets

Tennis NT's Constitution was last modified and adopted at Tennis NT's Special General Meeting held 20 February 2014.

Tennis NT's 2015 AGM was held on Sunday 8 November 2015 with 24 people in attendance, including twelve delegates with voting rights. Elections for the President position and two Director positions were held with Warren Martin (President), David De Silva (Director) and Alicia Boyle (Director) all elected.

Board of Directors

The Tennis NT Board comprises five Directors including a President and a Vice-President. In accordance with the Constitution the election of positions is rotational to ensure continuity of corporate knowledge. The Constitution also allows for the appointment of up to two independent Directors, appointed by the Board.

The Board of Directors is responsible for setting the strategic direction of the association and monitoring management's performance against the targets and priorities set.

Scope

My audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. My procedures included examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the financial report, and the evaluation of accounting estimates. These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion as to whether, in all material respects, the financial report is presented fairly in accordance with the basis of accounting described in Note 1 to the financial report and the requirements of the *Associations Act*. These do not require the application of all Accounting Standards.

The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.

Qualification

The Association only records amount received for fundraising, donations and function receipts when these amounts are banked, as it is not practical to establish control over such income prior to its initial entry. Notes to and forming part of the Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2016

Note 1

Summary of Accounting Policies

The accounting policies adopted by the Association are stated in order to assist in a general understanding of the Financial Statements. These policies have been consistently applied except as otherwise indicated.

Reporting entity

The Association is not a reporting entity because in the Board's opinion there are likely to exist users who are able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs, and these accounts are therefore "special purpose accounts" that have been prepared solely to meet the requirements of the Constitution and the Associations Act.

Accounting policies

The Financial Report has been prepared under the historical cost conventions and does not take into account changing money values except to the extent that they are reflected in the revaluation of certain assets.

In order for the Financial Report to present fairly the state of affairs of the Association and the results of the Association for the year, Australian Accounting Standards have been adopted to the extent disclosed in this note.

Government Grants

Government Grants are brought to account as income when the Association receives them. Unspent Grants are transferred to an appropriate liability account.

Assets

Asset purchases that have a life of greater than one year are capitalised and depreciated over the period of the estimated useful life of the asset. The etimated useful life for the assets purchased is three years for computer and IT equipment and five years for plant and equipment.

Employee Entitlements

The amounts expected to be paid to employees for their pro rata entitlement to annual leave and long service leave are accrued annually at current pay rates.

Income tax

The Association is of the opinion that it is not subject to income tax.

Note 2

Investment

The investment is currently held at People's Choice Credit Union, previously named Australian Central Savings & Loans.

Note 3

Darwin Regional Tennis Centre Construction Funds

This is capital grant funding received from the Northern Territory Government for construction of the Darwin Regional Tennis Centre. The funding is to be used solely for the project and in accordance with the agreement made between the Government and Tennis NT.

Note 4

Prepaid Expenses

This is made up of insurance allocations to the next financial year – both Workers Compensation insurance and the National Insurance Program, and the monthly office rent paid in June for the period covers from 1 July to 31 July 2016.

Note 5

Accrued Income

This is made up of Interest to June 2016 on People's Choice Credit Union Investment and Entry fees for NT & Darwin Age collected by Active Network however not received in the bank as at 30 June 2016.

Note 6

Loan Receivable

Alice Springs Tennis Association Incorporated received a loan of \$15,000 to assist its facility upgrade that was undertaken in 2010. A Loan Agreement has been exchanged. The Loan was repaid in full in September 2015.



Note 7

Property, Plant and Equipment

There was no Property, Plant and Equipment purchased in 2015-16.

Note 8

Income Received in Advance

National Insurance Program receipts from Affiliates to be allocated to the next financial year in line with the related cost. An Officiating Scholarship grant received from the Department of Sport and Recreation, to be utilised in 2016-17 financial year.

Note 9

Income Received in Advance - Govt Grants

This is to be brought into Government Grants income as the Darwin Regional Tennis Centre Construction funding is spent. (Refer to Note 3)

Note 10

Officials Development Fund

In 2010, Tennis NT was successful in securing \$2,845.60 of 'unclaimed monies' from the dissolved *Northern Territory Tennis Umpires Association*. This group ceased to function during the period 1996-97 and the remaining funds held in their bank account were surrendered by the bank in 2004 to the *Australian Securities and Investments Commission*. The money is held in trust for Officials Development.

An additional amount of \$7,154.40 has been raised and endorsed by the board in September 2014.

Note 11

TCA-NT Scholarship Fund

In 2006, TCA-NT dissolved and instructed that its residual funds be given to Tennis NT on the provision that the funds be held in trust as a scholarship fund, specifically for coach education and development.

This has been increased to \$20,200 endorsed by the board in September 2014.

Note 12


Facility Development Fund Reserve

In 2014, Tennis NT Board endorsed and committed \$200,000 to the Facility Development Fund for the development of facilities throughout Northern Territory. \$24,028 has been spent to the end of this reporting period.




