President and Manager's Report

It is with great pleasure that we present this report for the twelve months ending 30 June 2017, a period which saw tennis in the NT continue to take considerable steps forward. This report will also be Warren's last as the President of Tennis NT, a role he has played since 2008.

2016-17 was also the second year of Tennis NT's Strategic Plan (2016-2020) which continues to guide the organisation through what are exciting times for the sport in the NT. We will reflect on progress in the six areas of this plan throughout this report.

It is also prudent to touch on the robust financial position of Tennis NT which holds the organisation in good stead moving forward. For the 2016-17 financial year Tennis NT recorded an operating surplus of \$84,220 (external to the Marrara Facility Project) which follows a surplus of \$33,624 in 2015-16. The Tennis NT Board has been diligent in ensuring the organisation is well placed moving into a period where both the sport and Tennis NT as an organisation will experience significant change.

Along with the various highlights that will be strewn throughout this report, 2016-17 also saw Tennis NT make significant steps in the area of Indigenous Tennis which is really exciting for the sport. With Darwin set to host the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival annually from 2018 this area is certainly a priority for Tennis NT and the progress that has been made is pleasing.

PARTICIPATION

Consistent with Tennis NT's Vision – 'More People Playing Tennis' – there was again a considerable focus on increasing participation in tennis across the NT.

During the 2016 membership year it is somewhat disappointing to record a nine percent decrease in club based members. With some key departures during the past eighteen months the challenge of continued growth, along with ongoing system issues, was always going to be difficult, as such it is a testament to Tennis NT's affiliates that club registration levels remained quite high.

Another key focus area nationally has been Tennis in Schools, with the aim of engaging primary school students in tennis more regularly. With tennis being the number one delivered sport in schools across the country it is of no surprise that over 4000 school aged children participated in schools tennis across the NT during 2016-17. Whilst this number is pleasing, and will hopefully continue to grow, the great challenge we have as a sport is the successful transition of children

from positive experiences at school, to becoming a tennis person for life.

2016-17 also saw Tennis NT proactively engage the Sanderson Middle School in furthering tennis opportunities in the Northern Suburbs of Darwin.

We look forward to working with our various stakeholders on the continued development of tennis participation with both schools and remote programs being earmarked as focus points for 2017-18.

PLACES TO PLAY

The introduction of a major facility in Darwin has long been of strategic importance to the sport, as such it was pleasing to finally turn sod at Marrara in May 2017. Whilst the importance of the actual construction of the \$16.7m facility is significant, Tennis NT also sees the importance of leveraging the facility to ensure it has a longstanding impact on tennis across the NT. This will continue to be a focus as we near the highly anticipated opening of the facility in May 2018. It would be remiss of us not to acknowledge the various stakeholders active in this project including AECOM (Project Managers), MODE Design (Architects), Halikos (Builders) and of course the NT Government and Tennis Australia.

The NT Facilities Strategy (2015) continues to guide our work in facility development and management across the NT. The importance of appropriate, safe and accessible facilities is well known, as such various projects in different areas of the NT will continue to receive focus.

COACHES

Attracting and retaining quality coaches continued to be a challenge for the industry throughout 2016-17 with the instability of our coaching network creating ongoing challenges to the sustainability of tennis.

Tennis NT continued to provide opportunities for the coaches engaged with affiliated clubs with a Junior Development Coaching Course being offered, two Community Coaching Courses (Alice Springs and Darwin), along with different opportunities to coach representative teams interstate.

Tennis NT appreciates the ongoing commitment of coaches within the NT and recognises that whilst as a sport we need to explore alternate ways to deliver the tennis, the need for coach development continues to be of high importance to both Tennis NT and its clubs.

TALENT DEVELOPMENT

It's often not until you take a step back and consider the range of results our players and teams achieve

when you realise that the NT really does punch above its weight nationally. This is highlighted by the NT placing sixth in the Bruce Cup, strong performances at the Foundation Cup and Super 10's team's events and a number of individual results at prominent interstate tournaments.

With changes occurring nationally to the Talent Development space at the beginning of 2017, Tennis NT's previously decentralised model changed with the Extension Training Program being replaced by a tier structure consistent with other states and territories.

Tennis NT's objective in this space is to achieve 'One National Champion we are proud of', as such we will continue to strive to provide the best opportunities for talented athletes. This includes ongoing consultation with various stakeholders and the exploration of additional opportunities such as the Essington International Tennis Academy which was formed in 2017.

TOURNAMENTS & COMPETITIONS

It was another strong year for participation in NT tournaments with a 10% increase in tournament experiences during the reporting period. This reflects the strong tournament culture across the NT and is a testament to the hard work done by the various tournament directors and officials across the NT.

Again, a highlight on the calendar was the Alice Springs International, run for the seventh time in Alice Springs. The work done by everyone involved in this event doesn't go unnoticed as is a big reason behind the longevity of the event.

With regards to competitions, the success of both the Junior and Senior Leagues sponsored by People's Choice continued in 2016-17 with positive feedback across the board. Tennis NT, in conjunction with key stakeholders, has identified the need to develop the competitions space and will be engaging a consultant to assist in this review during 2017-18.

Moving forward the tournaments and events space will look considerably different due to both the introduction of the Marrara facility, and changes to school holiday structures in the NT. This is both exciting and challenging for the sport as we look to continue to provide quality tournament experiences, as well as focus on showcasing our sport more broadly through high profile events.

PROMOTION & ENGAGEMENT

Creating greater awareness of tennis and forming strong stakeholder relationships will be a significant

focus for Tennis NT moving forward due to the unprecedented opportunity the Marrara facility will provide. Two exciting components of this include engagement through the Indigenous Tennis Program, as well as Asian Engagement. Work in both of these areas has commenced, largely off the back of the employment of an Indigenous Program Manager and a partnership with the Essington School Darwin.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Finally, and most importantly, we would like to thank the many coaches, volunteers, administrators, officials, players and parents who are the backbone of tennis in the NT. The continued work you put in in order to provide a quality sport for all is invaluable.

We have also benefitted greatly from the ongoing support provided by both Tennis Australia and the Northern Territory Government. Without their significant support we wouldn't be in a position to plan so enthusiastically for the future of the sport.

Tennis NT's sponsors, who are listed in this report, also need recognition. The long standing partnerships we have with these organisations are of considerable benefit to the sport.

The hard work of the Tennis NT Board often goes unnoticed, however without the vital role they play in steering the sport tennis wouldn't be where it is today.

Last of all, the unbridled passion and commitment of Tennis NT's staff throughout 2016-17 is highly appreciated and yet again commended. The work of the entire team, comprising of Erin Bormann, Pat Coburn, Ben Canton and newcomers Jo-Anne Karaitiana and Joe Kelly, hold the sport in strong stead.

Growing the game for everyone

Tennis is and always will be the sport for everyone. If you can pick up a racquet, it does not matter your race, gender, ability, age or sexual orientation, tennis will welcome you with open arms. Our sport

has long been displaying the values of equality, inclusion and diversity.

We believe our sport, and indeed sport in general, is a very powerful vehicle for social change in this world. Earlier this year I had the privilege of addressing the 2017 Women's Empowerment Principles Forum at the United Nations in New York in a bid to further promote gender equality in sport and across all business sectors.

We have a lot to be proud of in Australian tennis, nonetheless, there is still more that can be done and we are determined to continue our pledge to influence real change.

This year has seen a renewed focus on the positive role that tennis plays in the community and no event highlighted this more than the 2016 Newcombe Medal and the Australian Tennis Awards. The night showcased community stories from around Australia and culminated with Dylan Alcott being awarded the highest honour in Australian tennis. Kathy Brummit from Katherine proudly flew the flag for the Northern Territory, taking home the Volunteer Achievement Award on the night.

Introducing the game

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots introduced record numbers of children to the game this year with 384,584 taking part in the program nationally – up 80 percent on 2015-16. The Northern Territory alone managed a 66 percent increase of registered ANZ Tennis Hot Shots participants with 4342 playing in 2016-17.

The Schools Partnership Program stimulated a lot of the growth which led to ANZ Tennis Hot Shots

being recognised as the number one delivered Australian Sports Commission Sporting Schools Program in Australia. There are currently more than 2000 schools nationwide participating in the School Partnership Program as part of their health and physical education curriculum.

Another highlight of this past year was former Grand Slam champions Todd Woodbridge and Alicia Molik leading an ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Racquet Roadshow during April-May 2017 to celebrate the delivery of 80,000 racquets to first year primary school students. They visited more than 35 schools, travelling more than 10,000 kilometres to meet 15,000 kids and drive awareness of the initiative and the Schools Partnership Program.

The competitive arm of the program, previously known as leagues, was revamped into ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Match Play this year. There are now more than 15,000 children taking part at 380 venues nationwide, with 432 schools registering to deliver it in the past 18 months. The Northern Territory currently has 18 schools involved.

South Australia's Thanasi Kokkinakis along with Daria Gavrilova signed on as ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Match Play Ambassadors to help inspire the next generation of champions.

Opening up tennis

The Book a Court program continues to open up tennis across Australia by allowing casual players to book and pay for courts online.

Book a Court program was first piloted in 2015-16 and has been installed in 56 venues nationwide. This year there have been 37,834 bookings from 7255 unique players generating \$249,029 in online payments unlocking new revenue streams for all clubs involved.

During this pilot phase of the program much focus has gone into identifying best practices to ensure a smooth roll-out over the coming years.

Inspiring others

We continue to grow the game and engage more fans through the promotion of our leading athletes.

The Australian Pro Tour is a great example of how we provide a platform to bring elite tennis to more towns and communities countrywide.

Running from September to April and attracting strong fields, the series offers more than USD \$1.1 million in prize money and 15,000 valuable ranking points as added incentive.

Australia's Thanasi Kokkinakis (SA) and Jordan Thompson (NSW) beat Gilles Muller (LUX) and Sam Querrey (USA) to take out the men's doubles title in their first tournament as a pairing at the Brisbane International.

Australia's John Peers and Henri Kontinen (FIN) claimed their maiden Grand Slam doubles title at Australian Open 2017 while Dylan Alcott (AUS) won the quad wheelchair singles title for the third consecutive year in front of a huge crowd on Rod Laver Arena, the first time a wheelchair final was played on centre court at any Grand Slam. Rising superstar Daria Gavrilova won her way to the fourth round, the best performance of all main draw Australians.

Grand Slams to Grassroots

The growth of our world class events continues to allow us to generate revenue to reinvest back into the sport.

In the pursuit of becoming the world's greatest sports entertainment event, this year we increased our overall Australian Open entertainment, food, and tennis offerings and it paid dividends. A record 728,763 fans visited Melbourne Park during Australian Open 2017, smashing the previous record of 720,363 set in 2016. For the first time there were 503,382 attendees in the tournament's first week, breaking the half million barrier.

While on the court, in arguably the most anticipated men's singles final in tournament history, Roger Federer won an unprecedented 18th Grand Slam title, overcoming nemesis Rafael Nadal in a five-set thriller. The 35-year-old Swiss maestro returned from a six-month injury lay-off to become the second oldest Grand Slam champion in the Open era, a victory that thrilled his many fans. It followed an historic women's

final showdown between American sisters Venus and Serena Williams.

Serena took the spoils, claiming a 23rd Grand Slam title to become the most prolific Open era champion. News the 35-year-old was pregnant with her first child emerged several months later, making the achievement even more remarkable.

Investing into growth

The success of our events has allowed us to reinvest back into the sport and this year there has been 176 projects funded through the National Court Rebate Program. The total project value exceeded \$34 million and resulted in 342 new or resurfaced courts, including 155 ANZ Tennis Hot Shots mini-courts.

More than \$100,000 was distributed as part of the second round of AO Community Grants program in 2017. More than 30 recipients will use these grants to undertake projects that will deliver tennis opportunities to deserving communities in inclusive and engaging ways. This demonstrates how tennis can have a positive impact on local communities and be used as a vehicle to connect and engage individuals who face barriers to participation.

Our vision for the future

Much work has taken place behind the scenes as we work together across the nation bringing to life our strategic plan to make tennis the activity of choice in Australia.

As we continually push to connect more people to tennis, the next few years are particularly exciting for our sport. We believe that by continuing to deliver world-class entertainment with tennis at the core, we can drive revenue to reinvest back into growing the sport.

We look forward to continuing a great partnership and working with you to achieve our vision.

Heritage

Tennis NT was established in 1980 under the incorporated name of the Northern Territory Tennis Council. The organisation changed its incorporated identity in 2005 to Tennis NT Incorporated and trades simply as Tennis NT. Its establishment was the shared vision of the founding President, Mr Max Horton OAM and a small group of interested tennis players. Their vision foresaw the need for a 'parent body' to assume a role of guidance along with the benefits of establishing relationships with the Northern Territory Government and Tennis Australia.



Participation Report

National Programs

Participation Leaders

One of the many resources utilised in the Northern Territory in order to drive promotional activities is the Participation Leader position. The provision of this role also assists in the creation of necessary relationships within all areas, such as schools, clubs and communities in order to achieve the stable and sustainable growth witnessed from year to year.

The Participation Leader is the first point of call for Territory Clubs when it comes to programs and initiatives centred around participation in tennis. This includes but is not limited to ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, Fitbit Cardio Tennis, Schools Programs, the Power and Water Regional Development Program and Community Play.

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots (ANZTHS), incorporating smaller courts, smaller racquets and low-compression tennis balls, is the fun and easy way to learn tennis.

In 2016-17 there were six registered ANZTHS deliverers in the Northern Territory providing programs participants. These deliverers have assistant coaches working under them delivering Hot Shots at their clubs and in school programs. There were 23 Assistant coaches used throughout the Territory during this period.



Tennis in Schools

Tennis Australia's Partnership and Play School Tennis Programs

During 2016-17 the Australian Government's Sporting Schools Program continued to fund Territory schools to actively promote sport as part of their PE lessons. The Schools would apply for funding through the program, and then select its sport of choice. Tennis Australia offers two programs as part of the Sporting Schools initiative, based on the ANZ Tennis Hot Shots program. The Partnership and Play Programs are made up of fun tennis activities which support skill acquisition and movement all whilst 'playing the game' in a meaningful way.

34 NT Schools signed up to the National Schools Partnership Program

4,342 children registered to Hot Shots through the Schools Program

Transition Racquets

Tennis Australia and ANZ give schools that have registered to the Partnership program the opportunity to apply for free 19 inch racquets for each of their transition students. Although the timing or the offer was not ideal for Territory schools there were still 10 schools receive a total of 564 free racquets. During the Pro Tour event in Alice Springs there was an additional 45 racquets handed out. This meant that 3 Alice Springs, 4 Palmerston, 1 Katherine, and 4 Darwin Schools all received a portion of the 611 total racquets.



Participation Report

Interschool's Tennis Competition

During Term 4 2016 Tennis NT hosted a Red Ball Gala day at AWOF Sports. Schools that had participated in a Tennis program that year were invited to the participation event. The event catered for both the grade 3 and 4 students alongside the older grade 5 and 6 children. The day was a great success and a fantastic end to, what was for some, their first ever experience of competitive tennis.

Tennis 360

Gardens Tennis, Tennis Palmerston and AWOF Sports continued with the Tennis 360 data collection during the reporting period. These three clubs recorded their participation stats over the course of any chosen week. The data is then put into a table creating an easy and assessable way to evaluate how each club is performing in different participation areas. This data is then presented to the Tennis NT Board and assists Tennis NT in making informed strategic decisions. Having a solid base of historic data allows us to assist the clubs work strategically towards achieving their goals and creating sustainable business plans for 17/18.

Foundation Program (Pilot)

The transition of children from schools tennis, into organised tennis such as clubs is one of the biggest challenges tennis faces when trying to grow our numbers. In attempting to create greater transition, Tennis NT has introduced the Foundation Program across the Top End. Initially the program was piloted at the Sanderson Middle School with participants being provided with an equipment pack and six sessions (across six weeks) for \$100. 30 children participated in the trial.

The program revolves around having engagement with parents / guardians with a 'learn through play' theme without proactive coaching. The intent behind this approach is to further on the initial interest shown by children at school, providing further opportunity to choose tennis as a sport of choice. Overall this pilot program showed there was a great level of interest for this sort of program, eight of the children that took part have now transferred to the more traditional Hot Shots sessions. Analysis of this pilot program will determine its expansion and how it links with clubs.

Player Registrations

Tennis in the NT faced some challenges during 2015/16 with many influential coaches / operators leaving the NT. Overall there was a decrease within the Northern Territory of 9% following on from the increase of 9% in 2015/16. Tennis NT will continue to work with all regions and assist the clubs in an effort to regain the growth trends across the Territory.

Power and Water Regional Development Program

During the 2016/17 financial year Tennis NT has worked with its stakeholders, partners, and affiliates in promoting tennis through the Power and Water Regional Development Program. The Program has supported ongoing tennis delivery in key Regional Centres, as well as sporadic programs in remote areas. During the reporting period the Program supported MOU's with Tennis Alice Springs (Matt Roberts) and for three months the Katherine Tennis Club (Sam Murch). The basis of the MOU's is to provide tennis services that drive greater participation in tennis.

The Southern region recorded an increase in participation numbers during the membership year (2016 Calendar Year) whilst the Central and Northern Regions both experienced decreases due to the lack of a full time coach presence. Tennis NT continues to work with the hard working committees in these regions to ensure tennis remains viable.

As previously reported, a number of schools in regional areas are part of the National Schools Partnership Program and this continued to be an area of focus for Tennis NT. This program provides schools with the required resources (equipment, coaching manuals etc) to ensure tennis can be delivered in the absence of a qualified coach. In addition to these programs targeting regional centres Tennis NT again delivered tennis into remote communities with Belyuen, Maningrida and Groote Eylandt all engaging in the program.

Tennis NT acknowledges the ongoing support of Power and Water. This is a longstanding partnership that continues to benefit tennis across the NT.





Indigenous Tennis

In early June 2017, Tennis NT welcomed Joe Kelly into the newly formed Indigenous Program Manager position. The primary focus of the role is to develop a pathway in tennis for Indigenous youth from across the NT, with the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival being delivered annually in Darwin from 2018, the cornerstone of the pathway. Tennis NT's ambition is to engage with the various stakeholders in the space, including the NT Government, Regional Councils and remote communities, in developing a sustainable tennis pathway.



Participation Report

Initial consultation and planning indicate that to ensure the program is sustainable the following key pillars will form the basis of the program:

- The introduction of organised tennis activity
- Tailored education programs for key community members such as teachers and community sport officers
- The delivery of inter and intra community competition
- Regional talent camps for targeted athletes
- The National Indigenous Tennis Carnival

Tennis Industry Leaders Workshop

Tennis NT hosted its annual Tennis Industry Leaders Workshop offsite at the Crab Claw resort on 1-2 March 2017. The workshop is convened to provide a forum specifically for Northern Territory tennis centre managers. David Phillips, Tennis Australia's Professional Development Coordinator (Coach Education) once again made the trip up in order to facilitate a variety of discussions building upon the various areas the delved into last year. This included a range of topics across the six areas of Tennis NT's Strategic Plan and the upcoming completion of the Marrara Tennis Complex.

Workshop attendees also discussed an array of topics aimed at guiding operations in the Northern Territory through the upcoming year. Topics included the Tournaments, school programs, the Foundation Program, Top End Competitions, and the new Marrara Tennis Complex.

The continuation of these workshops is crucial in order for Tennis NT to ensure a committed and united approach to the delivery of tennis across the Territory.

Tennis Sanderson

In April 2017 Tennis NT employed Jo-Anne Karaitiana as a Development Coach. The appointment was made in the absence of alternate arrangements at the facility and in response to Tennis 360 numbers, and anecdotal information, which indicated to Tennis NT that the Northern Suburbs of Darwin were underserviced in terms of organised tennis. Tennis NT has formed a partnership with the Sanderson Middle School which provides use of three of the five courts at the school. It is Tennis NT's intention to provide coaching services, particularly to juniors, at the facility linking with the high number of primary schools in the area.

Tennis Seniors NT

In March 2017 the newly re-formed Tennis Seniors NT (TSNT) became as Associate Member of Tennis NT. The organisation, whose predominant purpose is to promote the continued playing of tennis by players over 35 years of age, is a member of Tennis Seniors Australia and has a growing presence in the Metro Region. Tennis NT looks forward to working with TSNT is furthering tennis for senior's participants.

Places to Play

Marrara Facility Project

In May 2017 construction of the \$16.7m tennis facility at Marrara commenced following a thorough process which began in July 2016. This process began with the engagement of AECOM as Project Manager's before the management of a tender for a design team and the subsequent engagement of MODE Design. The detailed design of the facility took place with key input from various stakeholders before a select tender to local companies to build the facility which saw Tennis NT provide Halikos Construction with the contract. The facility is earmarked to open in May 2018 with a





focus from Tennis NT on both the successful delivery of the project, along with devising appropriate plans to maximise the impact this exciting project could have on tennis in the NT

The facility will include:

- Fifteen ITF compliant Plexipave courts, all fully lit with one covered;
- One Championship Size show court, fully covered with approximately 500 fixed seats;
- Six ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Courts (under same cover as show court);
- Office space for Tennis NT and Football Federation NT;
- Café and operating facilities;
- A flexible conference/ meeting space; and
- Additional car parking

Book A Court Pilot Program

Book a Court is an online court booking and payment platform for affiliated tennis clubs. It's easy to use for both players and club administrators, which means more time on court for everyone! When players book a court online they're sent a PIN for direct access to their court, or if there is no connected pin pad available, the player is provided with alternative instructions to access the court. Tennis Palmerston is the NT's only fully operational Book a Court system. During the reporting period they have had the following results:

Total Bookings: 668

Total Revenue: \$1,544

42 Individual players have booked a court

Tennis Australia is placing significant emphasis on providing greater access to venues across Australia, as such Book A Court is a priority. Tennis NT will continue to work with clubs, and Tennis Australia, in the expansion of this program.



A National Talent Model

2016-17 was a time of change for talent development in the NT with changes nationally being the catalyst for change to Tennis NT's club centred model. The new Talent Model saw 12 and under players developed through their club program plus one session with Tennis NT to monitor their development. Tiers with supporting criteria were established for players 13 to 15 years to access continued engagement with the National Talent program. Under the program players reaching tier one or two could be provided a full training program (4 squads and 2 strength and conditioning sessions) with tier three (2 squads) and four supplementing their club program.

The National Talent Program commenced in Darwin in February 2017. To fit our environment a 16+ category was added. 11 players were engaged in the program.

As a National program all activities of players in the 13 to 15 space were reported on Tennis Australia's Athlete Management System. The National approach to Talent has also resulted in a dramatic increase in staff engagement across States in the pursuit of a collective philosophy.

The concept of a National program was further enhanced for Territory players and parents with the transitioning of Liam Franklin (2 x winner of the Austin Ashe Trophy) into the Queensland National Academy as a tier 2 athlete at the commencement of the 2017 school year.

The Essington School Darwin

Tennis NT demonstrated its commitment to long term Talent Development by expanding its workforce and engaging with The Essington School Darwin in developing the Essington International Tennis Academy. The Academy comprises of regular coaching during school hours for selected students, as well as other talent development services including strength and conditioning. Tennis NT is also working with the school on connections with South East Asia's international schools network to explore further opportunities for athletes.

Club Talent Days

Tennis NT's Coach and Talent Development Manager (CTDM) delivered camps or talent days at each of its affiliated clubs with a qualified coach. In all 43 players and 4 coaches were impacted by these camps. In each instance, the CTDM worked with club coaches in both the planning for and delivery of the camp, including the theme of each day.



Super 10s

Super 10s was again a highlight of the talent year. The seasons held in Darwin and Palmerston collectively attracted 32 individual players including 6 from Katherine. These seasons were followed by the Super 10s match play camp which involved 4 coaches and 16 players including 2 from



Katherine and 1 from Alice Springs. From the camp 8 players and two coaches were selected to form the NT teams that participated in the 2017 Super 10s National Finals.



Athlete Tournament Support

Tennis NT supported individuals on tour by sending coaches to all three National events plus the Bruce Cup. In the reporting year this included the October 2016 Australian Clay Court Championships in Canberra (NT CTDM plus 6 players), the October 2016 Bruce Cup in Albury (NT CTDM plus 1 private coach and 14 players) the December 2016 Australian Championships in Melbourne (NT CTDM plus 2 private coaches and 8 players) and the March Australian Grass Court Championships in Berri (1 Private coach and 4 players). The best result during these Platinum events was Jett Leong finishing 5th in the 12 boys singles at the 2016 Australian Championships in Melbourne.

Athlete Training Support

From July to December 2016 Tennis NT conducted the Club Extension Training Program (2 sessions per week) and the Girls Performance Training Program (1 session per week).

From February to June 2017 under the new National Talent Model Tennis NT conducted 4 weekly on court sessions for 13 to 15 athletes and 1 on court session for 12 and under athletes.

Parent Information Sessions

Tennis NT's CTDM ran two formal parent sessions during the year. One in Alice Springs (8 Parents) during November and one in Palmerston (13 Parents) during August. Multiple meetings with individual parents were also held.

Looking Forward

Up until December 2016, Tennis NT had maintained a Talent Development Model that was centred around clubs, their coaches and the programs offered to talented athletes. This approach was monitored by Tennis NT's Athlete Development Committee through the parameters of the Territory Academies Program. The inherent instability of the Territory Tennis industry where coaches come and go and players swing from club to club had a detrimental impact on this approach.



Tennis Australia's National Talent Model has provided that change of direction. The challenge now is to keep the club coaches passionately and meaningfully engaged in their clubs talent development pathway so that the National Talent Model is fuelled with aspirational players that are full of potential to go on and become the Territories next National Champion.

Acknowledgements

The continuing support of the Tennis NT's affiliated clubs in the Talent Development space needs to be acknowledged. Without exception they have generously and enthusiastically provided their facilities, whenever asked.

Tennis NT would also like to acknowledge the support of those Territory Coaches who are going above and beyond expectations to enhance the development of our next group of nationally competitive players.



Coach Education

During the 2016-17 year three Territory coaches completed their Tennis Australia Junior Development Coaching qualification along with eleven coaches from Alice Springs (August 2016) and ten from Darwin (April 2017) completing their three day Community Coaching Certificate. Two Introduction to ANZ Tennis Hot Shots courses were also conducted with eleven participants in Darwin in August 2016 and six participants in Katherine in March 2017.



Coach Development

Tennis NT provided 56 unique coach development opportunities. These ranged from group workshops to reports on individual players through to individual coach mentor sessions encompassing both their coaching and business practices. The individual nature of many of these coach development opportunities allowed messages to be tailored specifically to the challenges each coach faces.

2017 Australian Grand Slam Coaches Conference

Six coaches from the Northern Territory tennis coaching fraternity travelled to the 2017 Australian Grand Slam Coaches Conference held in Melbourne just prior to the Australian Open.



The Northern Territory continues to have great representation from its small tennis community and Tennis NT acknowledges these coaches for their personal commitment and their desire for knowledge.



Talent Development Coaches

Tennis Australia has continued to invest in this selected network of coaches who specialise in the development of athletes under the age of fourteen. This group of coaches who are recognised for their proven ability to develop young players continue to be provided with additional professional development opportunities including travel grants.

Ultimately the purpose of this engagement is to build stronger relationships and partnerships with private coaches to improve the quality and quantity of athletes.

While the NT started the reporting year with three TDC's all three either left the NT or didn't apply for renewal.

Tennis Australia Coach Membership

NT coaches continue to engage with Tennis Australia's Coach Membership with the following numbers registering in 2016-17.

2016 Australian Teams Championships

Tennis NT fielded teams in the boys 12 and 14 and the girls 12 age groups. The boys 12's finished 9th of 12 teams while the boys 14s finished 11th of 12 teams and the girls 12's finished 9th of 12.









2016 Queensland Junior Teams Carnival

Tennis NT was represented in all divisions of the 2016 Queensland Junior Teams Carnival. The event held in December 2016 comprised mixed teams of 6 players in the 11s, 13s, 15s, and 17s age groups.

The 11s placed 11of 16, the 13s 12 of 16, the 15s 14 of 16 and the 17s 10 of 12. Participation in the Queensland Junior Teams Carnival provides a lot more representative opportunities enabling many Territory players to experience their first interstate tennis competition at an appropriate standard. Being able to provide some of our older athletes with the opportunity to represent the Territory was a particular bonus.





2016 School Sport Australia Bruce Cup

The Northern Territory team travelled to Albury for the 2016 Bruce Cup. The team finished sixth out of the eight teams participating. Jett Leong finished fourth in the individual singles event. The Team was supported by *Manager* Tara Keenan-Russell, *Coach* Jordyn Howarth and *Assistant Coach* Tennis NT CTDM Pat Coburn.

Tennis NT continued to support school sport in trials, skill sessions, gala days and the 12 and under school sport exchange. For the fourth consecutive year Tennis NTs CTDM Pat Coburn took on the formal role of Assistant Coach to the Bruce Cup team. Along with being heavily involved in the lead up training Pat was able to provide specific tennis advice and support to both the team and support staff while benefitting from experiencing firsthand the student management strategies and practices employed by the school sport teachers.





2017 Australia Made Foundation Cup

The Foundation Cup is a team's event for boys and a girl's from regional Australia. Teams of 4 compete in separate male and female divisions. The NT and Tasmania compete against regional teams from NSW, Vic, Queensland, SA and WA. The NT boys teams finished third while the NT girls finished 5th. In the boys team Peter Politis was in great form remaining undefeated in singles.



2016 Super 10s National Finals

The Northern Territory sent male and female teams of 4 players and a coach to the Super 10s Australian State finals played at Melbourne Park during the last 5 days of the Australian Open. The boy's team finished 7th and the girl's team 5th in the eight team competition.

Tournaments & Competitions Report

Events Calendar

The Northern Territory had another busy tournament schedule with 1 Australian Pro Tour tournament, 9 Australian Money Tournaments, 11 Junior Tour tournaments and 10 Junior Development Series tournaments.

Australian Pro Tour

The Pro Tour is a series of professional tennis events that act as a bridge between junior events and the ATP/WTA Tour. These events provide an opportunity for players to earn their first World Ranking Points.

Pro Tour events are staged predominantly in regional areas across Australia. The Northern Territory held a single Men's only event in Alice Springs that saw 65 competitors compete.

Australian Money Tournaments (AMTs)

AMTs are semi-professional tournaments introduced by Tennis Australia in 2006. They are designed to create quality match play opportunities and help with the transition of post junior athletes.

The Northern Territory conducted 1 Platinum; 2 Gold; 1 Silver and 5 Bronze AMTs.

Of the 9 AMT tournaments, 14 events offered Australian Ranking Points and prize money. 309 competitors entered which is a decrease of 10.69% over the previous reporting period.

Junior Tournament (JT)

The JT is an umbrella tour that provides a competition pathway for aspiring junior players. These tournaments offer Australian Ranking points across the 12/U, 14/U and 16/U age groups.

The Northern Territory conducted 1 Gold; 1 Silver and 8 Bronze JT tournaments during the reporting period.

Of these 10 JT tournaments, 54 events offered Australian Ranking Points for both boys and girls across the three age groups. 1,033 competitors entered which was an increase of 12.77% over the previous reporting period.

Junior Development Series (JDS)

The JDS sits under the JT in the Competition Pathway and is designed for beginner to intermediate players, giving them their first tournament experience. These tournaments are conducted around Australia.

Now in its fifth year the JDS attracted 730 competitors over the 12 tournaments that were on offer across the Northern Territory. This is an increase of 19.28% compared to the previous reporting period.





Competitor Analysis

The following table identifies the number of competitors at each level of tournament. A total of 2,137 Competitive opportunities were accessed. This was an increase of 10.04% over the previous reporting period.

The NT Age Championships JT Gold and Darwin Age Titles JT Bronze were conducted back to back and attracted 238 competitors (an increase of 10.2% compared to 2015-16).

Following this Australian Open, both Gary Bigg and Virginia have achieved high enough grading to apply for International events, which will hopefully see them heading overseas to showcase their Officiating talent on yet another the world stage.

Alice Springs continues to lead the way within the NT with their exuberance and dedication not only to officiating, but to helping to grow the pool of officials within the Northern Territory. Without their knowledge, experience and passion, it would be a much harder sell to encourage the up and coming officials throughout the Territory.

Promotion & Engagement

Tennis NT's website continues to be utilised as an effective means of publishing information relevant to Tennis NT, it's partners and services offered, along with the promotion of programs and events.



Social Media

Tennis NT continues to successfully use social media to engage with and provide information to its members, along with engaging with the various clubs Facebook pages through upcoming events, tournaments and news stories.

This platform continues to prove a crucial element to keeping fans engaged, while appealing to a wider audience with constant and relevant updates.

Tennis NT's Facebook likes rose by 23% this financial year coming from 31 different countries. 57% of Tennis NT's followers are females with the most popular demographic following Tennis NT being Females aged between 35 – 44 years old (19%).

Throughout the year Tennis NT's posts reached a total of 39 different countries, this is done via shares and likes, and will continue to grow as the total number of likes keeps increasing. Tennis NT's Twitter continues to grow and engage a wider audience, with 95 followers at the end of the reporting period, an increase of 11.76% compared to last period.



Media

Regular and event specific circulation of media releases to Territory media outlets proved to be beneficial in gaining exposure for tennis, particularly during tournaments.

512 articles were accounted for during the 2016-17 period, an increase of 116.13% from the previous year. They were extracted from the pages of the *NT News, Sunday Territorian, Darwin & Palmerston Sun, Katherine Times, Centralian Advocate and Resident Magazine.*

Local and international tournaments, particularly the 91st SKYCITY NT Open Championships and the Pro Tour Event in Alice Springs, provided the highest exposure opportunities within the print media.

Radio stations, *Hot 100*, *Mix 104.9* and *ABC Radio* provide consistent coverage in their local sports reports when briefed with media releases. Radio interviews were also conducted with ABC's *Grandstand, Darwin Mornings* and *Saturday Breakfast*.





Constitution & Annual General Meeting

Tennis NT is a not-for-profit incorporated association registered in the Northern Territory. The association's purpose is to:

- Support the growth and development of tennis in the NT
- Make a positive contribution to the national and international community
- Provide progressive opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to participate
- Develop and improve infrastructure
- Ensure access is available and appealing to consumers' via media outlets

Tennis NT's 2016 AGM was held on Sunday 20 November 2016 with 14 people in attendance. Elections for two Director Positions were held with Matthew Campbell and Kate Lee elected.

Tennis NT's Constitution was also modified at the 2016 AGM with members voting unanimously in favour of the Special Resolution.

Board of Directors

The Tennis NT Board comprises five Directors including a President and a Vice-President. In accordance with the Constitution the election of positions is rotational to ensure continuity of corporate knowledge. The Constitution also allows for the appointment of up to two independent Directors, appointed by the Board.

Notes to and forming part of the Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2017

Note 1

Summary of Accounting Policies

The accounting policies adopted by the Association are stated in order to assist in a general understanding of the Financial Statements. These policies have been consistently applied except as otherwise indicated.

Reporting entity

The Association is not a reporting entity because in the Board's opinion there are likely to exist users who are able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs, and these accounts are therefore "special purpose accounts" that have been prepared solely to meet the requirements of the Constitution and the Associations Act.

Accounting policies

The Financial Report has been prepared under the historical cost conventions and does not take into account changing money values except to the extent that they are reflected in the revaluation of certain assets.

In order for the Financial Report to present fairly the state of affairs of the Association and the results of the Association for the year, Australian Accounting Standards have been adopted to the extent disclosed in this note.

Government Grants

Government Grants are brought to account as income when the Association receives them.

Government Grants of a reciprical nature are transferred to an appropriate liability account, and bought to account as income as the funds are spent.

Assets

Asset purchases that have a life of greater than one year are capitalised and depreciated over the period of the estimated useful life of the asset. The etimated useful life for the assets purchased is three years for computer and IT equipment and five years for plant and equipment.

Employee Entitlements

The amounts expected to be paid to employees for their pro rata entitlement to annual leave and long service leave are accrued annually at current pay rates.

Income tax

The Association is of the opinion that it is not subject to income tax.

Note 2

Investment

The investment is currently held at People's Choice Credit Union, previously named Australian Central Savings & Loans.

Note 3

Darwin Regional Tennis Centre Construction Funds

This is capital grant funding received from the Northern Territory Government for construction of the Darwin Regional Tennis Centre. The funding is to be used solely for the project and in accordance with the agreement made between the Government and Tennis NT. The funds are brought to account as income as and when they are spent.

Note 4

Prepaid Expenses

This represents insurance allocations to the next financial year – both Workers Compensation insurance and the National Insurance Program, and the monthly office rent paid in June for the period covers from 1 July to 31 July 2017 and July travel expenses.

Note 5

Accrued Income

This represents Interest on Westpac Term Deposit, Entry fees for NT & Darwin Age tournaments ans an accural for a MyTennis Clip from Tennis Australia.



Note 6

Property, Plant and Equipment

There was no Property, Plant and Equipment purchased in 2016-17.

Note 6a

Less: Accumlated depreciation-Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, Plant and Equipment was fully depreciated during 2016-17

Note 7

Income Received in Advance

National Insurance Program receipts from Affiliates to be allocated to the next financial year in line with the related cost. Indigenous coaching program grant from Tennis Australia and Department of Tourism & Culture. Competition Income Tennis Australia. Carbine Club Sponsorship and Yarralin Primary School Sporting schools sessions.

Note 8

Income Received in Advance - Government Grants

This will be brought into Government Grant income as the Darwin Regional Tennis Centre Construction funding is spent. (Refer to Note 3)

Note 9

Officials Development Fund

In 2010, Tennis NT was successful in securing \$2,845.60 of 'unclaimed monies' from the dissolved *Northern Territory Tennis Umpires Association*. This group ceased to function during the period 1996-97 and the remaining funds held in their bank account were surrendered by the bank in 2004 to the *Australian Securities and Investments Commission*. The money is held in trust for Officials Development.

An additional amount of \$7,154.40 has been raised and endorsed by the board in September 2014.

Note 10

TCA-NT Scholarship Fund

In 2006, TCA-NT dissolved and instructed that its residual funds be given to Tennis NT on the provision that the funds be held in trust as a scholarship fund, specifically for coach education and development.

This has been increased to \$20,200 endorsed by the board in September 2014.

Note 11

Facility Development Fund Reserve

In 2014, Tennis NT Board endorsed and committed \$200,000 to the Facility Development Fund for the development of facilities throughout Northern Territory. An amount of \$24,028 has been spent up to this period.
