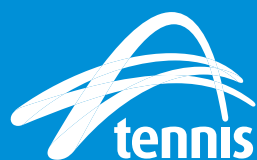

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TENNIS SA PRESIDENT REPORT

ON BEHALF OF THE TENNIS SA BOARD, I AM PLEASED TO PRESENT THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR THE 2015 - 2016 FINANCIAL YEAR.

I can report the Board met each month during the year and discharged its governance obligations with diligence and enthusiasm. I thank my fellow Board members for their outstanding commitment, in an entirely voluntary capacity, to the sport of tennis in South Australia. I also thank Kerry Morrow who has already contributed significantly since joining what I consider a very stable and balanced Board.

Throughout the year, the Board continued to explore ways of developing the sport through encouraging greater levels of participation, as well as nurturing talented young players in their quest to become elite players. The Tennis SA Board has always seen these objectives as being complementary. It was for this reason the Board enthusiastically embraced the concept of World Tennis Challenge (WTC) in 2008, because it incorporated both elite player competition and encouraged greater levels of active players of all ages and standards. The participation component of WTC, which we refer to as the 'Be Active Challenge', attracted very high numbers again this year. The Board was delighted with this support which saw the courts of metropolitan Adelaide overflowing with players. This was matched by excellent attendances at the WTC during the evenings of 12-14 January. WTC was conceived by past players, Mark Woodforde, Roger Rasheed, Darren Cahill and former Tennis SA Chief Executive, Alistair MacDonald. Mark Woodforde remained involved in 2016 leading player procurement

and as Tournament Director he is a very important ambassador for the event. I also thank our major sponsor the South Australian Government via Events South Australia, key sponsor Health Partners and corporate supporters and the public for ensuring the event's success in 2016.

We were honoured to have Lleyton Hewitt as the star attraction for the sixth Ken McGregor Foundation luncheon, held during this year's WTC event. It was an outstanding success with another near sell-out crowd at Adelaide Oval. It was particularly pleasing to be able to hand over Ken's winners trophy from the 1950 US Open Mixed Doubles to his family after Tennis SA were able to source it. As part of the continual need to refresh the WTC, the 2016 event fielded 3 teams consisting of a current ATP male player, a legend male player and a legend female player. Whilst Lleyton Hewitt featured by taking the place of the injured Thanasi Kokkinakis, there is no doubt the Legend Ladies – Aranxta Sanchez Vicario, Iva Majoli and Marion Bartoli - also thrilled the crowds. The Board has been delighted by a an even greater involvement from Tennis Australia, which saw the 2016 WTC television production delivered by the Tennis Australia media team and broadcast live on Foxtel, a daily highlights package on Seven Two and also distributed to a record number of countries around the world. This shared interest can only strengthen the success of the event which is valued highly by the Board.

The National Academy in South Australia is continuing to produce elite young tennis players and Milo Bradley's direction as Head Coach is proving invaluable. Milo has shown great enthusiasm for working directly with our affiliates to increase the flow of talented young players

into elite squads. Milo, Rohan Fisher and the support coaches continue to develop many players whose success nationally and internationally in their respective age groups is highly encouraging and beyond the expected numbers given South Australia's relatively small population. It was a touch bitter-sweet to lose Rohan from the program as he has recently taken up a promotion with Tennis Australia in Melbourne – Rohan has been key to the success of many of the players produced through our National Academy over a very long period of time and we wish him well. I congratulate everyone involved in the National Academy and commend the results of our young players.

We were excited by the performances of Thanasi Kokkinakis and Luke Saville throughout the year. It was most fitting that maybe SA's greatest legend of all, Lleyton Hewitt, managed to perform in front of local crowds before finishing his professional career shortly after at the Australian Open. We congratulate Lleyton on a superb career on the court and wish him all the best with his transition to off court activities now that he has taken on the pivotal Davis Cup Captain role which it seems is perfectly moulded for him. The Board is mindful Tennis SA is essentially "owned" by our member Associations. The Board, in various forums, met with Association representatives throughout the year, with the aim of supporting their endeavours at grass roots levels. Overall, participation in tennis remains at high levels compared with other sports, although there is a continuous move away from the traditional Saturday competitions to more socially oriented competitions.

The continued support by Tennis Australia with ANZ Tennis Hot Shots and Fitbit Cardio, is certainly essential to our efforts at increasing participation and Tennis SA is pleased to be assisting Clubs and Associations to implement these

programs, particularly through the efforts of our Participation Leaders. Additional funding recently from Tennis Australia has allowed us to double the number of Participation Leaders and hence offer Associations and Clubs even more direct service in their endeavours to grow tennis.

Registered player numbers have continued to increase and I thank all affiliates for their assistance in this objective in the face of the difficulties faced with a number of issues in Tennis Australia's roll-out of the new "My Tennis" system. Registration progress was further boosted by the second year of Tennis Australia's Tennis Connect initiative providing financial incentives to both Tennis SA and our affiliates and which is encouraging even greater levels of player registration.

At the May General Meeting, the Council conferred Life Membership on our immediate past President, Bill Cossey.

It is undoubtable that this recognition of Bill's enormous dedication to tennis in SA through 19 years service on the Board of Tennis SA, with over 10 years as President, is richly deserved and we look forward to presenting Bill with his Life Membership in the near future. We maintained our efforts in assisting the improvement of Club and Association facilities (including tennis courts, lights and clubhouses). The Board has been greatly impressed by the momentum generated by the Facilities Development Unit, including Lynton Franzi, Tennis SA staff and Sport Dev. Considerable funds invested by Tennis Australia, the South Australian Government and local Councils in tennis facilities across the state - are essential for increasing levels of participation.

Administration of all sporting bodies in South Australia at this time is not without its challenges. The economic circumstances of the past several years has been difficult and we continue to seek ways of improving our operations and strengthening our finances. Tennis Australia's provision of increased grants to all States has enabled us to increase our efforts to assist Clubs

and Associations with their player participation objectives including a large commitment to junior tennis via Hot Shots.

We were also pleased with the State's involvement with the emerging Tennis Australia "Asia-Pacific Tennis League" in which South Australian club based teams played matches in both Adelaide and Perth in a new "South Western" conference, leading to national finals during the second week of the Australian Open in January. The tennis is of an extremely high standard and our team - Prospect Flames women - acquitted themselves well against very tough opposition in Melbourne.

We continued to liaise with the State Government and other parties regarding the potential upgrade of the Memorial Drive Tennis Centre. A Business Case, funded by the State Government, investigated our options with the preferred option being a complete redevelopment through a new multi-purpose Indoor Stadium and reconfiguration of the outside courts supplemented by new show and match courts. We continue to work with all parties in order to look at different avenues to realise this bold vision and I expect to report on the progress of this work in next year's Annual Report.

Tennis SA's relationship with the SA Government through the Minister for Recreation and Sport and Office of Recreation and Sport has been maintained at excellent levels. On behalf of the Board, I thank Paul Anderson, previous Executive Director of the Office of Recreation and Sport and Minister Leon Bignell for their outstanding support.

We have enjoyed excellent support from our major sponsor, Health Partners, and our landlord, the City of Adelaide. I record my sincere appreciation to all of the organisations which have supported us throughout the year. Tennis SA's lease with the Adelaide City Council for the Memorial Drive Tennis Centre expired on 30 June 2015. Discussions with the Council for a long term lease extension (42 years) are well advanced and expected to be finalised shortly.

I thank Tennis Australia for

continuing to provide funding for a number of our activities and to work so constructively with us. The new Management Team at Tennis Australia have been particularly welcoming and we are really confident the stronger partnership for the betterment of our sport will result.

This adds to our relationship with the President of Tennis Australia, Steve Healy, and his Board who have been a pleasure to work with over recent years.

With four years of operation for Steve Baldas as Chief Executive Officer, the Board continues to be impressed with Steve's performance. Particularly with the relationships he has built with our many stakeholders and with other sporting bodies with an interest in partnering with Tennis SA in various ways. These relationships are crucial to our success in the development of our sport as well as with WTC.

I place on record the sincerest thanks and appreciation of the Board to Steve and his staff. The team "covers an enormous amount of ground" in a year and their dedication to the development of tennis is exceptional. The team is extremely highly regarded and the sport of tennis is very fortunate to be the beneficiary of their efforts. I also thank our past players and affiliated Associations and Club representatives with whom we have been able to work so positively with each year.

CEO MESSAGE

INNOVATE AND GROW

The innovative DNA that has long been infused into the organisation was realised in a very physical sense in the 2015-2016 financial year through our ongoing quest to innovate in all aspects of our business – not just for the sake of it, but also for increased depth and connection with players, fans, partners and broadcasters alike. Significant quality and efficiency improvements also arise from the focus and effort injected into these concepts.

There are many varied examples of our willingness to explore new and different ideas. They range from a strong focus on Hot Shots growth (particularly in schools and competitions), major new facilities, groundbreaking digital and broadcast content, commercial partnerships that add content value as well as financial benefit, and to a holistic approach to athlete wellbeing in player development. These are reaping dividends through tennis participation, revenue, quality of our content and elite athlete performance.

A special highlight has been the work that Tennis SA did to secure support for the first stage of the Memorial Drive redevelopment project. Announced in June 2016, it will transform Adelaide's sporting precinct and ensure the heritage of Memorial Drive is retained for years to come.

Another highlight was the inaugural

Festival of Tennis which was officially opened by 22-time Grand Slam Champion, Todd Woodbridge in November 2015 and saw more than 1500 participants take part in eight events at four venues over seven days.

Our sport

The ANZ Tennis Hot Shots program continues to provide the foundation for the successful growth of our sport. This entry program has become the envy of many, with much of its latest growth coming from an intensely focused effort in primary schools aimed at honing the program to provide maximum ease of implementation for teachers, parents and students alike – ensuring it has a relevance to their lifestyle, educational needs and skill set.

A recent International Tennis Federation survey on tennis participation in France, Germany, India, Japan, Poland, Sweden, UK, USA and Australia found we had the highest percentage of our population playing tennis with 2.1 million people playing once a year and 1.2 million playing 10 or more times. The standout statistic was that 290,000 people started playing in the last 12 months – Hot Shots is clearly doing its job.

It is more evidence that we are on the right track and we have further increased our resources in this space to continue this upward surge with the aim of delivering greater numbers of children from an initial

Hot Shots experience into Hot Shots competitions and ongoing tennis experiences.

Nationally, an eight per cent increase in year-on-year Hot Shots numbers included 213,883 participants, that figure significantly boosted by the 1439 schools now delivering the program through a partnership with the Australian Sports Commission Sporting Schools Program. Additionally, 249 schools nationwide participated in a new School Play Program that was introduced to help support competition within schools.

This commitment to acquiring and retaining new participants in our sport was complemented by a coordinated effort across the nation involving many clubs, associations and Member Associations to improve the competitive and social tennis experience for current players – whether it be in reducing administration or piloting the new Book-a-Court initiative.

Facilities growth

Nationwide support for the construction and redevelopment of facilities included a funding commitment approaching \$2 million dollars in 2015-16. This contributed to a total stakeholder investment of \$34.4 million, allowing 327 new or resurfaced courts to be funded through the National Court Rebate. An additional 187 ANZ Tennis Hot Shots courts were also funded across the country.



Our team

The collective body of work completed by our dedicated team in the last 12 months has been nothing short of phenomenal. It is a credit to their professionalism and passion as we strive for constant improvement and reinvention.

Our work to improve Tennis Connect is continuing and has been supported by a new Project Management Office. This is one of the many actions being taken to improve the delivery, access to and tracking of our sport.

The co-operation between our tennis community and the commitment to keep putting our sport first has shone through. Players at all levels, coaches, volunteers, administrators, officials and fans continue to make tennis special in Australia. Thank you to all of you for your love of our sport and your efforts to keep making it so enjoyable and successful.

Our future

Our future looks bright but not without its challenges.

Our great sport suffered some severe hits this year such as the allegations of widespread match-

fixing made to coincide with start of our premier event, the Australian Open. Rest assured the allegations were taken extremely seriously and any accusations were and will be followed up with intense rigour both domestically and internationally.

We always have and always will take the integrity of tennis seriously. That's why we are part of a global all-sport agreement to review integrity. As such we have made significant new investment in tennis integrity including our own Tennis Integrity Unit.

Financially we continue to build our reserves and plan to invest strongly in the protection of the Australian Open and intensify our investment in the sport with plans for greater funding to resource and deliver tennis across the nation.

We look forward to an exciting 12 months ahead.

TENNIS SA CEO REPORT

ON BEHALF OF THE STAFF OF TENNIS SA, I AM PLEASED TO PRESENT MY FOURTH CEO REPORT IN MY FIFTH YEAR OF SERVICE FOR 2015-16.

The purpose of Tennis SA is to showcase, promote, develop and manage the game of tennis in South Australia.

Here is an overview of what has been achieved over the last year.

Tennis SA was extremely proud to secure \$9.79 million in funding for the first stage of the overall redevelopment of Memorial Drive Tennis Centre, the home of Tennis SA. This initial stage will create a new 500 seat show court, two match courts, plus an additional 10 Australian Open standard hard courts and an elite six clay court facility, to complement the existing 12 grass courts. This project is critical to enable Tennis SA to achieve its goals relating to participation, performance and profile of the sport. Many thanks to the Hon Christopher Pyne, Federal Member for Sturt, for his support on the project.

For the eighth straight year, Tennis SA once again held a successful World Tennis Challenge (WTC) held at Memorial Drive Tennis Centre. Nine high profile tennis players came to Adelaide for a three-night exhibition event generating an economic return of over \$5.3 million to South Australia's tourism industry.

The WTC is a talent driven event and included eight former top 10 ranked players and six Grand Slam champions; Goran Ivanisevic, Mats Wilander, Mark Philippoussis, Marion Bartoli, Iva Majoli, and Arantxa Sanchez -Vicario. Current players included Lleyton Hewitt, Marin Cilic and Fernando Verdasco.

The WTC was part of the Emirates Australian Open Series for the second year running. Tennis Australia now handles the broadcast distribution resulting in the WTC broadcasted in 80 territories, 100 countries, and live streamed in 30 countries. Another broadcast

first was WTC highlights packages broadcast nationally on free-to-air by 7TWO.

A huge thank you to Mark Woodforde, Tournament Director for the WTC, for his energy and passion for promoting the sport of tennis in SA. Mark continues to build the WTC into one of the biggest and best exhibition tennis events in the world. Tennis SA would also like to thank David Hearne, Kirsty Mosley, Mary Chapple, Jenny Macpherson and the rest of the Tennis SA team that worked on this year's WTC. I am constantly amazed at what Tennis SA has been able to achieve with such a small team. Sadly, we said goodbye to Kirsty Mosley and Mary Chapple who left this year and we wish them well in the new careers.

During the WTC, Tennis SA also runs the very successful Tennis SA Legends' Lunch attended by 440 people. The event exists to raise funds for the Ken McGregor Foundation to support aspiring young SA players wanting to pursue a professional career. Thanks again to MC Mark Soderstrom, who works so hard to make it the best sporting lunch of the year here in Adelaide.

In addition to the WTC, Tennis SA ran the WTC Be Active Challenge to increase participation in tennis. Over the past seven years the WTC Be Active Challenge has seen in excess of 20,000 people participate in the associated events. A big thank you must go to our corporate partners of the Be Active Challenge, those being Health Partners, Coca Cola Amatil, Coopers, White Marquee, Maughan Thiem, and Intercontinental amongst others.

One of the major events within the WTC Be Active Challenge was the City of Onkaparinga ATP Challenger 2016, hosted by Tennis SA affiliate Happy Valley Tennis Club for the second time. Finals Day was a spectacular event that began with 200 people on site for the WTC Kids Tennis Day. Many thanks must go to Co- Tournament Directors Dylan

Hicks and Breanna Hassam, Event Managers Simon Longhurst and Jim Dickson, as well as Jason Simmons from Tennis Australia and ATP Supervisor Scott Ray, who all did a magnificent job in running the event.

Our High Performance team led by Milo Bradley and Rohan Fisher continue to have remarkable results with our young tennis talent. Thanasi Kokkinakis continued to climb the world rankings before a shoulder injury derailed his year just before the Australian summer of tennis. In the juniors, a significant highlight of the year was Eddie Vo winning the 12/u National Grass Court Championships played in Adelaide for the first time.

Congratulations to Rohan Fisher who was awarded the City of Adelaide Sports Awards Coach of the Year. Rohan has been instrumental in managing SA's first National Academy at Tennis SA over the past 10 years. It was with great sadness that we bid Rohan farewell as he took the role of National Women's Development Manager in Melbourne, but we wish him well for the road ahead.

The High Performance area welcomed former Australian player Sandon Stolle as the new National Academy Coach. Stolle reached a career-high doubles ranking of world No. 2, winning the 1998 US Open men's doubles championship. Tennis SA also was elated to promote Dr Alistair Murphy to Physical Performance Academy Manager - SA. Murphy is a specialist in exercise rehabilitation who will work alongside Stolle to continue to foster Australian talent.

Ty Allen, Manager of Tournaments and Competitions, does an excellent job in managing competitive tennis here in SA. In a major change, Tennis SA took over running State League in 2016 with the aim of increasing the profile and prestige of the competition. The Glenlea women's team won the 2015 State League final against Memorial





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Drive Tennis Club. In the men's final Broadview won against Collingrove. Congratulations to all players involved on an amazing season.

Tennis SA hosted its inaugural Festival of Tennis at Memorial Drive, in November 2015. A total of eight events, with more than 1500 participants, showcased the player pathway from participation to performance. 22-time Grand Slam champion Todd Woodbridge officially opened the festival. The Australian Open trophies travelled around Adelaide over the week getting 'selfies' before settling at Memorial Drive for the final day.

Off the courts, one of the highlights was the second Tennis SA Tournaments and Competitions Workshop. Over 30 people attended to think of innovative and creative ways to build competition in SA. Many thanks to Nicola Cowley from BRM Holdich for her professional manner in hosting the day.

In Ty's team, Dylan Hicks ran SA's largest organised team's event, the Winter Pennant. Thanks again to Mike Daws who chaired the Winter Pennant committee for the fourth year running. Breanna Hassam's work as the Competitive Play and Programs Coordinator is fantastic and she continues to set records for numbers in her ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Competitive Playing Programs.

The Tennis SA Participation Team members Andrew Wilson and Anne-Marie Handke, bring experience and knowledge to help Clubs improve and grow. ANZ Hot Shots is the key driver of new players to our sport with over 14,000 registered Hot Shots participants which provides a huge number of potential lifelong participants every year. A huge amount of credit must go to Brett Hidson, Manager of Participation

and Places to Play, for his leadership and professionalism in running his team.

One of the highlights for the Participation Team was the Tennis SA Club Development Conference held in August 2015. The day was a success with great engagement from over 60 Association and Club representatives covering a variety of relevant topics. Tennis SA would like to acknowledge the hard work done by Andrew Wilson and Brett Hidson in setting the day up.

Ian Barry and Warren Foote joined Tennis SA as new Participation Leaders in July 2016. Both built instant relationships with their respective club in a short period of time. However, Warren accepted a new Tennis SA role in January as the Coach Development Manager (SA), and Ian decided to pursue a new career outside of tennis. Tennis SA was pleased that Marek Carls was appointed as our new Participation Leader, taking over the North West region, previously lead by Warren Foote.

Affiliation reform is now into its fourth year and SA ended the year with over 17,000 registered players. Tammie Wightman did a great job as the main point of contact with our affiliated Associations and Clubs and they appreciated her hard work ethic.

A key venue development project Tennis SA was involved in was the commencement of the new \$8.9 million Playford City Tennis Centre which is set to provide a significant boost to sporting facilities in the northern suburbs. The complex will feature 16 plexi-pave courts, eight hot shot courts, two community courts and a new clubhouse. The tennis complex was designed in collaboration with the local Bicentennial Tennis Centre, Tennis

SA and Tennis Australia.

Tennis SA continued to deliver world-class coach education and professional development opportunities to our coach members and the wider tennis community. Warren Foote took over responsibility of this area to develop coaching in SA and has done a fantastic job. These courses include those for already qualified coaches, trainee members, ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, Fitbit Cardio Tennis, and introduction to ANZ Tennis Hot Shots course for volunteers, assistant coaches, or coaches.

I would also like to thank our new Tennis SA President, Kent Thiele, Vice President Philip Roberts, and the rest of our Tennis SA Board for their work throughout the year. Tennis SA welcomed our newest Board member, Kerry Morrow, and her experience as an accomplished lawyer brought immediate value to Board meetings.

Tennis SA is grateful for the support from the SA State Government and the Office for Recreation and Sport for their continued support of Tennis SA. In particular, I thank Leon Bignell, Minister for Recreation and Sport for his passion and interest in tennis.

NEW INITIATIVES FOR 2015/2016

MEMORIAL DRIVE REDEVELOPMENT VISION

The \$9.786 million Stage 1 project announced in June 2016 will transform Adelaide's sporting precinct and ensure the heritage of Memorial Drive is retained for years to come.

The redevelopment vision includes a new outdoor show court and two new match courts, a state-of-the-art National Academy training venue, a Walk of Champions and resurfacing of current match courts.

FESTIVAL OF TENNIS

Tennis SA introduced the Festival of Tennis with the inaugural event officially opened by 22-time Grand Slam Champion, Todd Woodbridge in November 2015.

After seven days, eight events, four venues and over 1500 participants, the event that showcased the competitive pathway from participation to performance was hailed as a roaring success and we look forward to the second edition in 2016.

STATE LEAGUE

In 2015/16 Tennis SA officially took on the management of the State League Competition from Metro Lawn Tennis Association, who have run the event for five summer seasons.

The men's competition consisted of eight teams with four making the finals. With six teams making up the women's competition.

NATIONAL GRASS COURT CHAMPIONSHIPS

In 2016 South Australia hosted the 12's and 14's National Grass Court Championships at Memorial Drive. The event saw the best 32 boys and 32 girls in the 12's and 14's age groups come from across Australia to compete.

FOUNDATION CUP REGIONAL FOCUS

The Foundation Cup continues to be the ideal vehicle to impact on Regional players and coaches. We have developed the pathway which links try outs, training and tournaments within the player's regional area, to a training camp at Tennis SA mid-year, before the State event is played later in the year.

COMPETITION SUSTAINABILITY FORUM

In 2016 Tennis SA hosted a Competition Forum to review recent Tennis SA implemented services and products. Competition Committees and a small group of affiliate representatives provided feedback on product and participation trends in regards to competition sustainability and how this will impact participation and competition administration in the future.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE

Tennis SA introduced its annual Club Development Conference, held in August 2015 with 55

Tennis SA affiliated attendees.

The conference was an opportunity for Tennis SA and our affiliates to jointly discuss opportunities and resolve challenges directly affecting our affiliates.

FEMALE PARTICIPATION FOCUS GROUP

A working group has been established based on feedback from last year's Club Development conference. The aim is to highlight the importance of female participation and seek feedback on how to create activities that will reduce barriers and encourage more participation.

NEW INITIATIVES FOR 2015/2016

FEMALE COACHING SCHOLARSHIPS

In an ongoing drive to increase the number and quality of female tennis coaches nationwide, four SA women now have access to additional funding to pursue their Tennis Australia coaching qualifications at all levels, from ANZ Tennis Hot Shots to elite performance pathways.

ONLINE RESOURCES PROJECT

A working group has been established based on feedback from last year's Club Development conference. The focus of the group is to prioritise and determine key resource requirements and templates specific to tennis which are easily accessed via the Tennis SA website.

AFFILIATION

Tennis SA maintained the simple annual fee, based on the number of tennis courts at the club. 269 bodies affiliated with Tennis SA in 2015/16, including 217 clubs, 29 associations, 19 sporting complexes and 4 schools.

Tennis SA and our affiliates registered a total of 17,297 club members (17,511 in 2014/15). Our Participation Leaders conducted 303 face to face visits with affiliates during the financial year to develop important relationships within the tennis community that resulted in a total of 28,883 unique registrations for 2015/16 (29,355 in 2014/15).

INCLUSIVE TENNIS

Tennis SA supported a variety of Inclusion programs throughout 2015/16. Most notably was the a Blind Tennis program Held in conjunction with the School for Vision Impaired SA, the State Intellectual Disability Championship, the wheelchair pathway program, multi-cultural tennis program in conjunction with Grange Lawn Tennis Club, the Australian Deaf Games, and a variety of introductory senior tennis programs under the "5 for 10" and "rusty racquets" banners.

NATIONAL ACADEMY INCLUSION

A first for the South Australian Tennis Academy is the inclusion of its first para athlete, Henry de Cure.

Henry had great success as a junior wheelchair tennis player and is now looking forward to the Academy's assistance in support of his dream to compete at the Tokyo 2020 Paralympics'.

NATIONAL ACADEMY STAFF EXPANSION

A boost in experienced staff numbers, including the appointment of former Australian Tennis professional, Sandon Stolle, and external service providers to assist in physical development on and off the court within the National Academy is set to create even greater support for SA's emerging young players.

BOOK A COURT PILOT

The Book a Court and Gate Access systems provide court users the opportunity to book and pay for courts online and increase the ease of access. As part of the Tennis Australia pilot program, Tennis SA installed the systems at the State Training Facility at Tennis SA, Memorial Drive.





PARTICIPATION

A KEY FOCUS OF THE TENNIS SA STRATEGIC PLAN 2012-2016 IS TO INCREASE PARTICIPATION - MORE PEOPLE PLAYING MORE OFTEN. THE TENNIS SA TEAM, IN PARTNERSHIP WITH STAKEHOLDERS, HAS DELIVERED AND FACILITATED GREAT SUCCESS THROUGH A VARIETY OF PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES.

PARTICIPATION LEADERS

In July 2015, Tennis SA welcomed the addition of Participation Leaders, Ian Barry and Warren Foote, who joined former Community Tennis Officers (CTOs) Anne-Marie Handke and Andrew Wilson in the newly formed Participation Team. During the year, we acquired Marek Carls, who replaced Warren Foote, who in turn moved over to the Coach Development Manager position.

The role of the four Participation Leaders is to be the first point of call to assist affiliates and coaches in their region, and support a variety of groups in promoting tennis participation through a number of activities.

Our Participation Leaders conducted 303 face to face visits with affiliates during the financial year to develop important relationships within the tennis community that resulted in a total of 28,883 unique registrations for 2015/16 (29,355 in 2014/15).

AFFILIATION & MEMBERSHIP

Tennis SA, with full support and significant investment from Tennis Australia, is pleased to continue the simple annual fee, based on the number of tennis courts at the club. 269 bodies affiliated with Tennis SA in 2015/16, including 217 clubs, 29 associations, 19 sporting complexes and 4 schools.

Tennis SA and our affiliates registered a total of 17,297 club members (17,511 in 2014/15). The 'per court' affiliation fee model now allows clubs to offer more flexible and innovative options, and encouragement to record all club participants.

TENNIS CONNECT

The Tennis Connect program was launched in October 2014 with a focus on building and consolidating the database of tennis participants. The project combines upgrading and introduction of new technology and incentives that encourage engagement with Tennis.

Unfortunately the implementation of the upgraded membership database and communications system (MyTennis v2) and the new competition management system (League Manager and Match Centre) in October 2015 resulted in significant stress on our volunteers and staff when administrating their respective organisations. Tennis SA acknowledge this and thank all volunteers and the collective users of each system for their patience, understanding and support to ensure as much could be done.

With this mind, Tennis SA firmly believe that the systems have improved and therefore we wish to encourage all clubs and associations to maintain their enthusiasm and use the systems moving forward. These systems, along with the Book a Court, Club Websites and the coaching resources system (Bounce) will all eventually reduce stress and time for volunteers while providing a more pleasurable experience all users.



CLUB DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE

Tennis SA introduced its annual Club Development Conference, held in August 2015. The conference was an opportunity for Tennis SA and our affiliates to jointly discuss opportunities and resolve challenges directly affecting our affiliates. A key follow up has been the establishment of working groups to address key issues of Club Development Resources and Female Participation.

Participation staff along with club and local council representatives have been brought together to review specific research and provide recommendations for action, which will be presented at the next Club Development Conference.

Also, the conference has been supported by forums held in Victor Harbour and Artherton, with wonderful aligned support from the Office for Recreation & Sport STARCLUB Field Officers.

FREE TENNIS DAYS

In 2015 clubs from every corner of Australia hosted Free Tennis Days, opening up their clubs to the local community and encouraging people of all ages and abilities to pick up a racquet and have a hit. 20 South Australian clubs registered to host a Free Tennis Day, whereby the clubs earned points for their town, with extra points earned for every person in attendance on the day. All clubs were then ranked and aligned to a men's or women's singles player at the 2016 Australian Open.

Two Wells Tennis Club drew the Women's Singles Champion - Angelique Kerber, resulting in the club hosting the Australian Open trophies at an event of their choice. The club and Tennis SA are currently working together to stage another Free Tennis Day in October 2016 to celebrate the win and promote their lead into the 2016/17 summer season.

TENNIS PROGRAMS IN SA

ANZ TENNIS HOT SHOTS

ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, using smaller courts, smaller racquets and low compression balls, is the fun and easy way to learn tennis – and a growing number of young participants are enjoying its benefits. In the 2015/16 year, Tennis SA registered 15,916 Hot Shots participants (16,882 in 2014/15).

The national promotion of the program and the output from the 283 deliverers in SA (Coaches, Schools and Volunteers in the Community Play Program) all contributed to this excellent result.

As reported in the Tournaments and Competitions Report, Hot Shot Leagues and Tournaments were staged as a continuation of the Hot Shots skills based programs. These provide an outstanding transition from skill development and confidence building in children into competitive formats in non-threatening environments.

FAST4 TENNIS

FAST4 Tennis, an exciting new way to experience the sport, gained popular appeal following its worldwide launch in January 2015. FAST4 Tennis was showcased across the country through the Australian Open Series, including the World Tennis Challenge in Adelaide. FAST4 Tennis has continued to be implemented into SA clubs and venues, with the Broadview and Henley South Tennis Clubs headlining pilot programs in November and December 2015. For the official roll out of the program, 12 Tennis SA clubs and venues ran FAST4 Tennis competitions that has attracted approximately 400 participants.

FITBIT CARDIO TENNIS

Fitbit Cardio Tennis packs a high intensity fitness workout into a fun tennis class. This innovative fitness based tennis program was offered by 59 SA Coaches in 2015/16.

INCLUSION

Tennis SA supported a variety of Inclusion programs throughout 2015/16. Most notably was the a Blind Tennis program in conjunction with the School for Vision Impaired SA, the State Intellectual Disability Championship, the wheelchair pathway program, multi-cultural tennis program in conjunction with Grange Lawn Tennis Club, the Australian Deaf Games, and a variety of introductory senior tennis programs under the “5 for 10” and “rusty racquets” banners.

TENNIS IN SCHOOLS

Throughout the ATP Challenger, the Kids on Court program saw 52 junior members from Happy Valley, Port Noarlunga and Noarlunga Tennis Clubs participate in Hot Shots sessions, Toss the Coin ceremonies and as Player Escorts for all centre court matches.

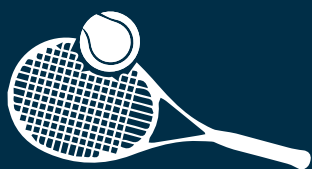

PLACES TO PLAY

Tennis SA has continued to develop stronger relationships directly with venue owners, most of which are Local Councils, to form more meaningful partnerships in venue development and to better leverage Tennis's funds with the aim of developing beautiful shop-fronts for the sport. In 2015/16, Tennis SA has overseen in excess of \$6.2 million total value of tennis venue development in South Australia, with the most significant projects completed within this period being:

- Seacliff Tennis Club
- Victor Harbor Tennis & Netball Club
- Denman Tennis Club
- Redhill Tennis Club

In addition to the completed projects, Tennis SA also welcomed the announcement by the City of Playford to commence construction on a new \$8m tennis centre in Elizabeth.

Venue development in South Australia has continued to be generously supported through the National Court Rebate Scheme, to which many clubs and operators are sincerely grateful for this direct financial support. \$113,500 was provided in 2015/16 to Tennis SA affiliates through the scheme.

In order to create meaningful partnerships and alignment with the owners and operators of tennis

venues in South Australia, the SA Places to Play team has formally aligned the objectives for successful tennis venues - Accessibility, Accountability, Community Benefit and Sustainability - with strategic projects that will deliver improved participation in tennis in safe, vibrant and sustainable venues, that satisfy the requirements of Local Government and their communities. Most notable projects commenced in 2015/16 include a tennis venue and participation strategy for the Mount Gambier & District Tennis Association and a tennis venue sustainability audit in the City of Marion.

BOOK A COURT AND GATE ACCESS

The Book a Court and Gate Access systems provide court users the opportunity to book and pay for courts online. Access is via a 'pin pad' installed at the venue's entrance whereby court users apply their active PIN which has been issued through the Book a Court system, allowing access to previously locked courts for the time of their booking.

As part of the Tennis Australia pilot program, Tennis SA installed the system at the State Training Facility at Tennis SA-Memorial Drive. Thank you to the Adelaide City Council for their support in implementing this system.

TOURNAMENTS

2015/16 WAS ANOTHER IMPORTANT YEAR FOR TOURNAMENTS AND COMPETITIONS IN SOUTH AUSTRALIA. AUSTRALIAN RANKINGS TOURNAMENT PROVIDED ASPIRING JUNIOR AND SENIOR PLAYERS THE OPPORTUNITY TO PIT THEMSELVES AGAINST THE BEST FROM ACROSS SOUTH AUSTRALIA WITHIN THEIR RESPECTIVE AGE GROUPS

JUNIOR TOURNAMENTS (JT)

In total there were 21 Junior Tour tournaments played in the 2015/16 period in South Australia an increase of three events from 2014/15. Tournament entry numbers were steady across the year across with average junior entries at 141 (up from 138 in 2014/15).

Gold level events were run at Tea Tree Gully and Seaside Tennis Clubs.

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT SERIES

In 2015/16, Tennis SA increased the number of tournaments to 19, held over a variety venues across metro and regional areas.

Sitting directly between ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Tournaments

and the Junior Tour, the JDS has continued to find its space in the tournament pathway, with consistent entry numbers seen across the board.

AUSTRALIAN MONEY TOURNAMENT (AMT)

In South Australia ten AMT's were held throughout 2015/16 with three of these events held at Platinum level \$10,000 events. In total over \$60,000 in prize money was earned by players from Australia and overseas. The average number of participants per tournament was 108. Six different venues hosted AMT's with Tennis SA hosting two events at Memorial Drive.

The Platinum tournaments held at Seaside and Tea Tree Gully in January as part of the Be Active

Challenge attracted strong fields while the third consecutive AMT Platinum held at the Bicentennial Tennis Club in February again attracted a strong field with over 20 internationally ranked players competing for the \$10,000 in prize money and Australian Ranking Points.

2016 12/U AND 14/U NATIONAL GRASS COURT CHAMPIONSHIPS

The event saw the best 32 boys and 32 girls in the 12/u and 14/u age groups come from across Australia to compete in one of only three National Junior Championships held each year.

Tennis Australia and Tennis SA combined to run the event and provide a fantastic South

NYSTAR PORT PIRIE TENNIS INTERNATIONAL (PRO TOUR)

The Nyrstar Port Pirie Tennis International is the longest running Pro Tour in Australia making its 25th appearance in 2016, awarding \$25,000 (USD).

In 2016, Casey Dellacqua and Ash Barty were the biggest names involved in the event with the pair making their doubles comeback at Port Pirie.

Unfortunately no South Australia men or women were able to progress past the second round of singles main draw. In the men's singles event it was New South Welshman Christopher O'Connell who proved too strong for impressive youngster Blake Mott, taking out the men's singles title

In the women's singles Austrian young gun Barbara Haas won a thrilling three set battle over Aussie Arina Rodionova. Tennis SA would like to thank the Port Pirie & District Tennis Association in their ongoing servicing of this

well ran event and sponsors Port Pirie City Council and Nyrstar for their continued support.

ANZ TENNIS HOT SHOTS TOURNAMENTS

The Hot Shots London Slam was held at Henley South Tennis Club in July 2015. Complete with strawberries and cream, a record number 59 children participated dressed all in white for the event. The blue team took home the win, with Daisy Ward as best dressed.

The Hot Shots New York Slam was held at Broadview Tennis Club in September 2015. The star spangled banner was in full display with the green team emerging victorious on this occasion and Thomas Antoniadis taking home the best dressed award.

The Hot Shots Paris Slam was held at East Torrens Kensington Gardens Tennis Club in May 2016. Complete with French flags and croissants, this event was a hit. The orange team took the win, with Thomas Antoniadis (Milos Raonic) and Lilly Dolinsky (Martina Navratilova) winning the best dressed competition.

The final event for 2015/16 returned to Henley South Tennis Club for the Hot Shots London Slam. The green team was triumphant and Ella Lehmann won the best dressed competition.

CITY OF ONKAPARINGA ATP CHALLENGER (PRO TOUR)

In November 2015, the inaugural City of Onkaparinga ATP Challenger was named the runner up Significant Event of the Year at The KPMG Celebration of South Australian Sport Awards. The success of this event was as a direct result of the hard work and effort put in by Event Managers Jim Dickson, Simon Longhurst and Sue Hoppo, as well as their amazing team of volunteers at the Happy Valley Tennis Club.

Meanwhile, the second City of Onkaparinga ATP Challenger was held in January 2016 at the Happy Valley. The event is part of the ATP Challenger Tour and the Australian Pro Tour, and forms a crucial part of the lead in events to the Australian Open.

51 players took part, including 21 Australians and 30 internationals, in a field that included 16 players inside the world's top 200.

After a week of beautiful weather, American Taylor Fritz (World No. 1 junior) was crowned the City of Onkaparinga ATP Challenger 2016 champion, defeating top seed Dudi Sela. In the doubles Matteo Donati (ITA) and Andrey Golubev (KAZ) mounted a spirited comeback to take the title over second seeds Denys Molchanov (UKR) and Aleksandr Nedovyesov (KAZ).

COMPETITIONS AND OFFICIATING

STATE LEAGUE

In 2015/16 Tennis SA officially took on the management of the State League Competition from Metro Lawn Tennis Association. Metro Lawn had done a terrific job of revitalising the State League competition over five summer seasons.

The men's competition consisted of eight teams with four making the finals. Broadview were able to win a tight match against Collingrove held at Memorial Drive and take out their first State League title in 20 years.

The women's competition consisted of six teams. In the women's Grand Final, the Glenlea side proved too strong for their Memorial Drive opponents.

Melanie Clayton from Memorial Drive won the ladies State League Player of the year and Kurtis Wilson from Broadview took out the men's award.

WINTER PENNANT

Tennis SA hope all teams who are competed in the 2016 Tennis SA Winter Pennant season are enjoyed their Tennis.

The 2016 season consists of 264 teams competing each week over 14 rounds. All participating clubs are to be commended for the excellent

sportsmanship and the spirited competition that is being shown throughout the season.

Tennis SA would also like to thank its clubs for being patient with new competition software League Manager and Match Centre.

Tennis SA would like to acknowledge The Winter Pennant Committee in the hard work they do behind the scenes to set up and run the largest tennis competition in South Australia. The committee consists of (Chairman) Mike Daws, Elaine Caldana, Gloria Dennis, Jean Haynes and June Raven.

OFFICIATING

In 2015/16 the following accredited courses were run in South Australia:

- 2 Court Supervisor courses
- 2 Lines Umpire level D courses

These courses were well attended and were followed by training and assessments resulting in:

- 8 new Line Umpires
- 1 new Level C Chair Umpires
- 6 new Court Supervisors

Many South Australian officials continued their progression and development through officiating. Stuart Nancarrow became an accredited level A Referee while

Marija Lentic continued her development as a Chair Umpire at local events as well as chair umpiring at events interstate. Graham Stone has serviced a large amount of events as a court supervisor and is heading towards being an accredited referee.

TOURNAMENT SERVICING

Tennis SA were able to meet service requirements at all Australian Rankings tournaments to a higher level. The biggest area of improvement in tournament servicing is the ability of Tennis South Australia to service tournaments with Chair Umpires and Lines at a 70% rate efficiency.

HIGH PERFORMANCE TEAM

Rohan Fisher left the National Academy program after 10 years to become the National Women's Tennis Manager.

Sandon Stolle as National Academy Coach has taken over the coaching position of Rohan.

Natalia Irvine (National Academy School Teacher) recently left our team.

Colin Ebelthite, has moved from a coaching role to State Regional Development Coach.

Kylie Baker and Emily Hartley have joined the team replacing Steve Bannon and Karina Savage as National Academy Psychologist and Nutritionist, respectively.

The team now includes external providers Kieran O'Sullivan and Ty Sundstrom as massage therapists, Russell Chan as Yoga instructor, and Rachel Jones as State Physical Performance Intern assisting Tom Mabon in physical development of the state squad athletes.

KEN MCGREGOR FOUNDATION

COACH DEVELOPMENT

In a role that remained vacant for six months, business as usual resumed in January 2016. Coach membership in South Australia remained steady with 279 by the end of the 2015-16 year the qualified coach numbers were similar at 138 in total.

Coach Development continues to provide the pathway for coaches, volunteers and teachers to acquire education and Certificates that are recognized across industries as part of the Vocational education and Training (VET) sector.

Tennis Australia continue to maintain the highest possible standard in professionalism by having all qualified coaches compliant with a recognized First Aid qualification and Police clearance as a compulsory requirement of coach membership.

This ensures that tennis as a sport continues to provide a safe environment for children and adults to play the game we love.

Tennis SA continues to provide ongoing Professional Development opportunities for the coaches of South Australia across a number of different topics to cater for the needs of the membership base.

COACH MEMBERS

A small increase in the numbers of qualified and non-qualified coaches who are the backbone of the participation and performance

programs in clubs across the state. These coaches help deliver the Tennis Australia programs such as Community Play, ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, Fitbit Cardio Tennis and the National Schools Partnership Program at both the Primary and High School level.

We have 59 coaches who are registered to deliver Fitbit Cardio programs and 283 ANZ Tennis Hot Shots coaches, primary schools and community play clubs registered across the state.

The roll out of the platform to deliver the Continuing Professional Development program will be pushed to 2016/17.

This requirement will mean that all qualified coaches need to maintain their current competency through a points based system by attending professional development opportunities to maintain their coaching currency.

COACHES

Tennis Australia coaching courses continue to remain relevant in the leisure industry by linking the VET sector with the Junior Development Coaching course providing successful participants with a Certificate III in Sports Coaching, and the Club Professional Coaching course now a Certificate IV in Sports Coaching.

In 2015/16, more than 180 people attended coaching courses facilitated by Tennis SA despite the

position being unfilled for many months.

53 people attended the ANZ Intro to Hot Shots courses offered throughout the year (36 volunteers from regional SA from three courses benefited from the program).

The four day Community Coach Course saw an increase in popularity with 30 people attending the course which is the second entry level course for coaches.

In 2016 one Junior Development Course (Cert III Sports Coaching) has seen nine participants involved with the course concluding in July 2016.

A Club Professional Coaching course has also been offered in 2016 with eight coaches involved concluding in December this year.

The National Partnership Program in conjunction with ACHPER has seen 50 teachers attend four training courses which allow these teachers to deliver ANZ Hot Shots in schools all over South Australia, importantly linking with local clubs and Tennis Australia qualified coaches.

The work of David Grainger who facilitated many of these courses must also be acknowledged, his enthusiasm, passion and high standards continues to ensure that the coaching stocks in South Australia remain at the highest possible level.



TALENT DEVELOPMENT

TALENT DEVELOPMENT COACHES

South Australia's Talent Development Coaches totalled 11 this year. Through an extensive application process these coaches have a proven track record of developing national-standard players. Coaches receive travel grants to assist and train their players participating in National events, attend professional development workshops (locally and interstate) and attend the annual coach conference. Within the next year a new 'Platinum' Talent Development Coach accreditation, awarding coaches that continually create high performance players within their environment.

TALENT DEVELOPMENT SQUADS (12/U)

The NIS (Nothing is Impossible Squad) is conducted year round on the clay courts for the best 12/u boys and girls. Invited players train with TA staff and Talent Development/private coaches whilst experiencing the high performance environment. This squad forms an important entry level into the high performance structure and players transition into the state and national academies from this program. This year 37 players were involved in the squads with 13 transitioning into the State squad program. The players also undertake regular stakeholder meetings with player, parents, coach and staff involved to assess technique, look at training schedule and develop a yearly tournament planner.

THE ROAD TO WTC (8/U)

In late 2015, four events were held across various Adelaide locations where players competed in orange ball events in different formats such as teams, doubles and singles round robin structures. The events focused on teamwork with coaches out on court to assist during matchplay and enhance player development tactically and technically with a large emphasis on fun and participation. Players born in 2007 or 2008 were eligible to compete and at the conclusion of these events eight players were selected to play in front of the crowd and professionals on Centre Court as part of the WTC.

SUPER 10'S

Super 10's continues to be a popular development opportunity for the state's best 10/u children with two seasons held annually in November and May. The 16 boys and 16 girls were selected post challenge day camps to play in four teams in the month long competition and each team had a TA qualified and experienced team manager who was able to coach the players as they were playing on the court. Parents had information sessions on development philosophies, tournament pathway and training schedules.

At the end of the November season, four boys and four girls were chosen to represent SA at the National Super 10's final during the second week of the Australian Open at Melbourne Park. The boys were crowned National Champions and the girls finished an excellent 5th place. The boys 1st position was SA's best result yet at the National Super 10's finals. Thank you to all our team managers throughout the seasons and to Jim Chaousis and Codie George who managed the two SA teams in Melbourne.

TALENT DEVELOPMENT CAMPS

Well over 300 children and 50 plus coaches had unique experiences at Talent Development Camps in the 8/u, 10/u and 12/u age groups in 2015/16, both metro and regionally. The camps are designed to engage and impact players, parents and private coaches across a variety of developmental themes. Throughout the camps players develop new skills on and off the court with themes such as mental strengthening, mental awareness, dealing with pressure, nutrition and teamwork just to name a few key areas and experiences that the players learn.

REGIONAL TALENT DEVELOPMENT CAMPS

The Foundation Cup continues to be the ideal vehicle to impact on Regional players and coaches.

This year Colin Ebelthite (State and Regional Coach) and Warren Foote (Coach Development Manager) visited each region to assist with trainings, coach/parent education sessions and drive the pathway.

The event, held at Berri-View Tennis Club, had close to 150

This event couldn't be possible without the tireless work of the Tennis SA Tournament and Competitions team, Gary Pinnington and the committee at the Berri-View Tennis Club.

MEDIA PARTNERSHIPS

Building and leveraging with our media partners continues to be a key priority for us and we are fortunate to have network of supportive media partners, including The Advertiser, Seven Network, Mix 102.3 and ESPN.

Working closely with these organisations provides us a strong platform to execute our strategic marketing campaigns and we greatly appreciate their support.

We extend our thanks to the local Adelaide media for their support and especially appreciate the assistance received from Foster Hill PR and Marketing on the management of World Tennis Challenge public relations.

DIGITAL COMMUNICATIONS

Over the last 12 months we have seen an increase of 21% Facebook and 105%* Twitter followers and doubled the average open rate to 40% for the monthly Club Ambassador enews.

The relaunch of the Tennis SA website in August 2015 aimed to provide a more user-friendly and multi-device platform to provide engaging content for our readers. Initially there was a drop in user visits, however despite the growth in social media, the website now maintains 5,000 visits on average per month.

Through the support of our Participation Leaders, the importance of current and informative websites has also influenced a number of our affiliated clubs to take advantage of the free website hosting provided by Tennis Australia.

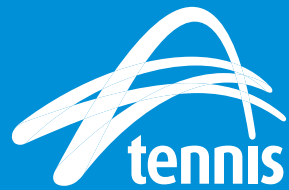
