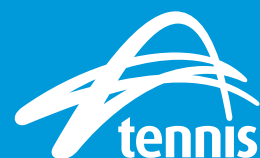

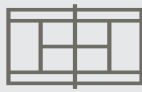

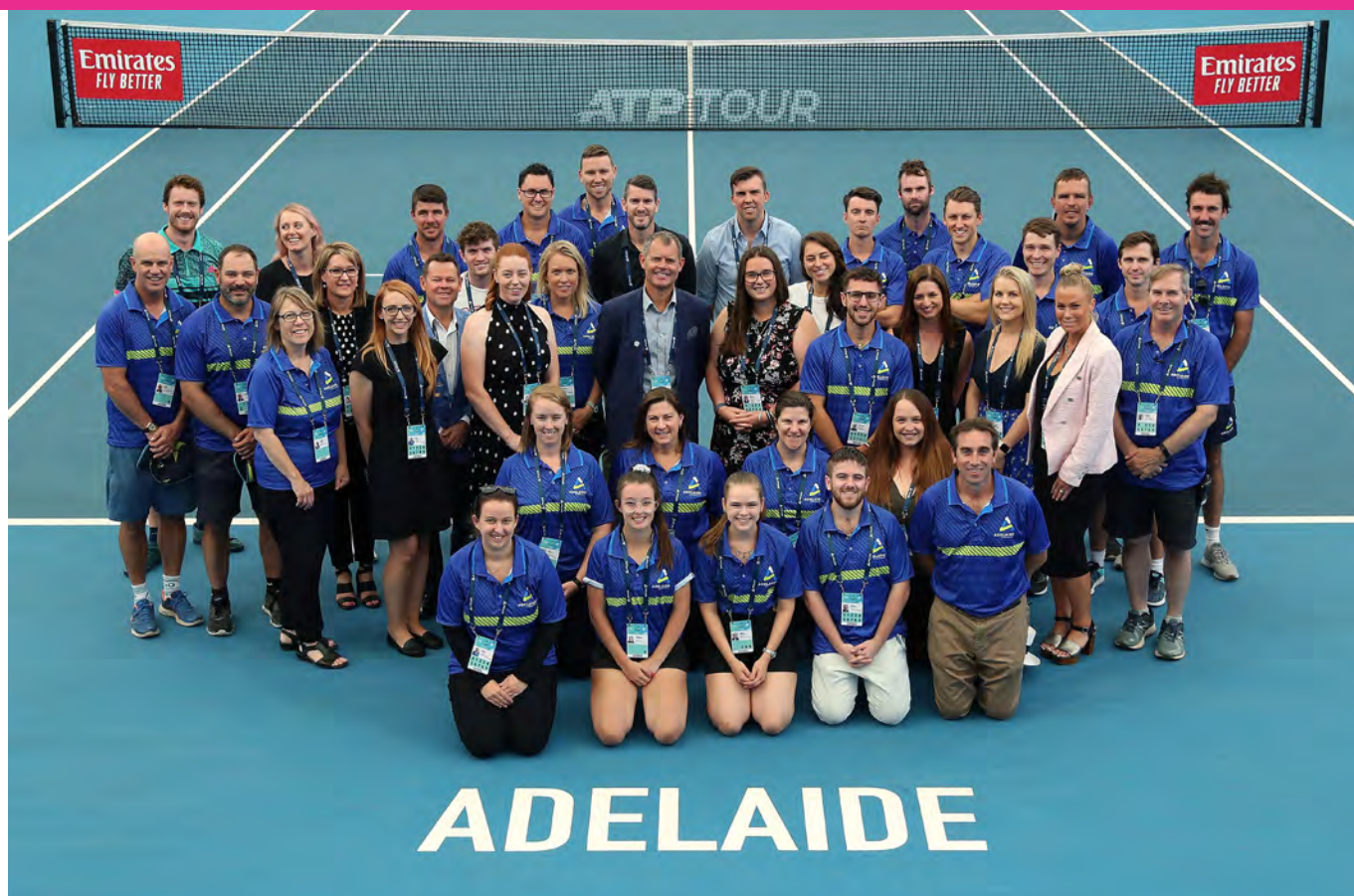

TENNIS SA PRESIDENT REPORT



On behalf of the Tennis SA Board, I am pleased to present the President's report for the 2019 - 2020 financial year, the fifth of my term. Well, what an exciting and challenging year it has been with the incredible highs of completing construction of the Memorial Drive Stadium Roof followed by an incredibly successful first Adelaide International balanced by the shutdown of tennis, along with much of society, caused by the global Covid-19 pandemic.

I can report the Board met each month during the year, except January, and discharged its governance obligations with diligence and enthusiasm. I thank my fellow Board members for their outstanding commitment, in an entirely voluntary capacity, to the sport of tennis in South Australia. A big thank you to Philip Roberts for his very significant effort as Vice President during another hectic year. I would like to thank retiring Directors Neville Messenger and Alice Clark for their outstanding contribution to the Board over several years, Neville in particular retiring after 20 years of service.

Late 2019 saw the completion of the new Centre Court Stadium

Roof. This project only came to fruition through the generosity of the SA Government providing \$10M of funding, matched by \$500k from each of Tennis Australia and Tennis SA. It was a very tight construction schedule and was largely successful due to the superb efforts of staff Lynton Franzi and Brett Hidson creating a teaming culture with all of our construction partners. Many people saw the lift-off of the old South Stand roof and the new roof go up piece by piece, somewhat like a gigantic mechano set. The end result is a spectacular roof which matches the precinct perfectly and, along with the previous Anchor Project, has set the site up for the return of professional tennis and other community events. The Board continues to work on potential future upgrades to Memorial Drive to bring other elements of the site up to world class.

Whilst construction of the roof was in the latter stages, Alistair MacDonald (Tournament Director) and Debbie Sterrey (AI GM) were incredibly busy setting up the staffing, volunteer and site requirements for our first full professional event in over a decade. The Adelaide International brought top tier professionals back for combined ATP/WTA events the week before the Australian Open. It seemed the largest undertaking ever for tennis in SA involving partnerships with Adelaide Oval, Next Generation and Memorial Drive Tennis Club to present the site in a way we could only have dreamt of before. Player and fan feedback was extremely positive and it was a pleasure to see the stands packed most sessions and even overflowing every time our world No.1 Ash Barty took to the court. Thank you to the SA Government through Events SA for their major financial support of the event, to Alistair, Debbie, Tennis Australia and all of the incredible

support staff and volunteers. It was an amazing way to bring the excitement of top flight tennis back to the Drive and made everybody proud.

Tennis SA's Mission is to showcase, promote, develop and manage the game of tennis in SA so significant time is spent on policies and activities in support of this. The Tennis SA Board has always seen the objectives of encouraging greater levels of participation, as well as nurturing talented young players in their quest to become elite players as complementary elements. The Adelaide International provided a much-needed platform to help stimulate both these important areas and I expect tennis in SA will see significant benefits over coming years.

The National Academy in South Australia is continuing to produce elite young tennis players and the direction taken by Milo Bradley and the team is proving invaluable, particularly in broadening the base of the talent pool by working directly with our affiliates. A recent restructure of Tennis Australia's high-performance area has seen Milo relocate to the ACT and Sandon Stolle take up the reigns leading the SA contingent - thank you to Milo for your years of dedicated service to SA and good luck to Sandon. I would like to acknowledge the following SA players who have represented Australia: Charlotte Kempenaers-Pocz, Edward Winter, Alex Despoja, Alex Bolt, Ricky Segura, Mark Haskett, Dragan Bekric, Andriana Petrakis and Roger Davey.

The 12th edition of the Ken McGregor Fund luncheon turned into a breakfast in order to accommodate the tight Adelaide International schedule and was another success, this time held at the Adelaide Oval overlooking the best football/cricket ground in



Australia. Anna Meares, Judy Murray, Tahlia McGrath and John Fitzgerald highlighted a list of informative and entertaining speakers. It was a great opportunity to acknowledge our SA Legends Club members whilst raising important funds to support promising juniors and athletes with a disability. A special welcome to the SA Legends Club's newest members in Kath Le Messurier (dec), Melanie Clayton and Melissa Beadman - all great South Australians.

In March Memorial Drive hosted the World Group qualifying round between Australia and Brazil, with the Aussies coming out on top after some very tight but entertaining tennis. Seeing the stands packed with spectators cheering on the players for the second year in a row in Adelaide surely validates Government support for the Memorial Drive Redevelopment.

Almost immediately after the Davis Cup tie, tennis and many other parts of our society were paused by the global Covid-19 pandemic we are still experiencing. It has been an incredibly tough time for all our staff, clubs, coaches and volunteers. It was pleasing that tennis was recognised as the most

organised sport by the Office of Recreation & Sport and the first major sport to recommence in SA due to the tireless efforts of all of our staff in developing and promoting a safe return to tennis. This pandemic has forced tennis across Australia to reconsider how it is managed and supported and there is no doubt that the social and economic effects will be felt for quite some time.

The Board is mindful Tennis SA is essentially "owned" by our member Associations. The Board, in various forums, met with Association representatives throughout the year, with the aim of supporting their endeavours at grass roots levels.

On behalf of the Board, I thank Kylie Taylor, Chief Executive of the Office of Recreation and Sport and Corey Wingard as Sports Minister, for their outstanding support. We have also enjoyed excellent support from the City of Adelaide, the City of Unley, Adelaide Oval SMA, Next Generation Clubs Australia, Memorial Drive Tennis Club and many other organisations.

I thank the Board and staff at Tennis Australia for continuing to provide funding for a number

of our activities and to work so constructively with us. The Board farewelled Steve Baldas as CEO and I thank him for his tireless contribution. Consequently, we welcomed Debbie Sterrey to the role with almost a 'baptism of fire' with seemingly every challenge that could happen actually happening! Debbie has admirably led what we consider our greatest asset, our dedicated staff through this. The relationships our staff have fostered with so many partners are crucial to our success in the development of our sport as well as with the new Adelaide International, so I thank them for this. I also thank our past players and affiliated Associations and Club representatives with whom we have been able to work so positively with each year.

Thank you for the privilege I enjoy in serving tennis in SA as we look forward to another successful year.

CEO REPORT



On behalf of the staff of Tennis SA, I am pleased to present my CEO report in my first year of service for 2019/20.

It was a great honour to commence the role of Chief Executive Officer and General Manager Adelaide International in November 2019. Tennis is a sport that has been such a big part of my life and I feel privileged to be able to come back to the sport that has provided me with so many opportunities over the years. It has been a challenging, but rewarding, nine months in the role.

The Memorial Drive Centre Court redevelopment took place throughout 2019 and we were pleased to have the Premier of South Australia, the Honourable Steven Marshall MP and Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing, the Honourable Corey Wingard MP on hand for the official opening ceremony in December 2020. Our sincere thanks to both Premier Marshall and Minister Wingard for their continued support in the redevelopment of Memorial Drive.

In December, South Australia was proudly represented by seven finalists at the Newcombe Medal, Australian Tennis Awards and came home with three winners. Congratulations to Elizabeth North Primary School

(Most Outstanding School), Darren Wunderer (Volunteer Achievement Award) and City of Playford Tennis International (Most Outstanding Professional Tournament).

The inaugural Adelaide International was a major highlight of the 2019/20 financial year.

To not only build a roof, but to also construct a world-class international tournament for the first time was an enormous undertaking that our team took on with passion and enthusiasm. My congratulations to Tournament Director Alistair MacDonald and the entire team at Tennis SA for their tireless work to ensure the tournament got off to an outstanding start.

Our sincere thanks to the South Australian Tourism Commission for their unwavering support and their vision to bring international tennis back to South Australia.

The Adelaide International also offered opportunities to promote the sport of tennis. We did this through the introduction of the Adelaide International TennisFest. TennisFest provided opportunities for all to get involved through a variety of participation events held around Adelaide. A highlight was the Adelaide International Kids Tennis Day, with 18 players in attendance.

Tennis SA also held the Talking Tennis Breakfast, raising funds for the Ken McGregor Fund (KMF). Hosted by Channel 9's Tom Rehn, the Talking Tennis Breakfast featured sporting royalty with John Fitzgerald, Judy Murray, Anna Meares, Tahlia McGrath and Alex de Minaur speaking to attendees.

Congratulations to Bianca Marron, Josh Kildare, Rennaha Cavallaro and Belinda Bralic for their work on this event.

We were once again proud to run the City of Playford Tennis International in November, in collaboration with the City of Playford. James Duckworth (NSW)

and Storm Sanders (WA) took out the singles titles. Duckworth defeated top seed, world No.78 Yasutaka Uchiyama (JPN) 7-6(2) 6-4 to take home his ninth ATP Challenger title, while Sanders continued her singles comeback after a two year hiatus, overpowering third seed Lizette Cabrera. Congratulations to Tournament Directors, Emily Smith, Dylan Hicks, Breanna Hassam and Ty Allen on such a wonderful event.

Congratulations to our National Academy athletes who experienced some fantastic results throughout the year. Thank you to Milo Bradley, Sandon Stolle, Andrew Waters and Codie George for their dedication and commitment to the development of our players across metropolitan and regional South Australia.

In early January, many states around Australia were hit by bushfires. For us, this included major devastation on Kangaroo Island and in the Adelaide Hills. A visit to Kangaroo Island in February allowed us to see firsthand the impact and whilst devastated by the loss, the positivity and resilience shown by the club members to not only rebuild but be in a position to play tennis next season was truly inspirational. Tennis SA has continued to support and track the progress of the communities and clubs affected as we work through the planning and rebuild phases. Thank you to Hayley Allen, Bianca Marron, Brett Hidson and Breanna Hassam for their work in leading our bushfire relief projects.

A restructure in the Participation Team saw additional resources added to support our clubs around the state.

Open Court Sessions were launched in January as a new initiative to encourage new and lapsed players back to tennis. 95 clubs were a part of Open Court Sessions with 1,077 players participating. Thank you to Matt Fitzgerald, Erin Haines, James Pick, Andrew Fitzgerald, Adrian Dezen, Hayley Allen and Giles Ellis

for their work on this exciting new participation initiative.

Schools continue to be a key part of our tennis participation strategy. 33 ANZ Tennis Hot Shots District School Carnivals were held in 2019/20, an increase from 22 in the previous year. A highlight was the ANZ Tennis Hot Shots District State Finals held at the Tennis SA Clay Courts with Australian tennis legend John Fitzgerald in attendance. Congratulations to Cobdogla Primary School and Prince Alfred College for winning the country and state finals respectively, before Prince Alfred College won the state championship on centre court at the Adelaide International. Well done to Amelia Waters, Shane Leatham, Troy McNeil and Scott King in their roles as School Development Coordinators for an outstanding year.

At the end of the 2019/20 year, we had 244 financial coaches in South Australia. I would like to congratulate our Coach Development Team Warren Foote and Amy Sneath on the amazing work delivering professional development courses across all levels of coaching, and in particular I was so proud to see 73 South Australian tennis coaches, along with representatives from other National Sporting Organisations and the Office for Recreation and Sport, attend the Adelaide International Coaching Clinic and enjoying their time on the Aperol Sundeck overlooking Centre Court.

Support has been provided to over 30 venues around South Australia who have been a part of redevelopments or upgrades during 2019/20. Significant work has also gone in to the rebuild phase following the bushfires across the state.

The inclusion of the roof above Memorial Drive has brought about many new opportunities. Thank you to Brett Hidson, Lynton Franzi, Sarah Horgan and Tammie Wightman for their efforts in this space.

We were thrilled to welcome the Davis Cup back to Adelaide in March with Australia taking on Brazil under the roof at Memorial Drive.

A 6-7(6) 7-6(3) 7-6(3) win from John Millman in the fourth rubber saw Australia take a 3-1 victory against Brazil and guaranteed the nation's

place at the 2020 Davis Cup by Rakuten Madrid Finals in November. Thank you to our Tennis SA Team, along with our Tennis SA Cheer Squad for their efforts to support Team Australia to victory in Adelaide once again.

The COVID 19 pandemic hit Australia in the week following the Davis Cup. The initial wave saw Tennis Australia and Member Association run competitions, tournaments and events postponed indefinitely. Fortunately, tennis courts could remain open for casual tennis and coaching throughout the pandemic, with a variety of protocols in place to ensure the safety of all participants.

This has undoubtedly been a difficult time for everyone and we thank our clubs and associations for the cooperation and understanding as we continue to navigate the situation at hand.

Tennis SA has continued to modernise competition delivery in South Australia through the Competition Reform project. Tennis SA has successfully continued to deliver competitions for Southern Districts Tennis Association, Eastern Districts Tennis Association, North East Tennis Association State League, Junior State League and Green Ball State League continue to go from strength to strength. Our thanks to our major sponsor Statewide Super for their sponsorship of women's tennis in South Australia.

Our summer seasons unfortunately came to an abrupt end due to the COVID pandemic. The team then worked tirelessly to present a plan to the SA Government to ensure that competitive tennis could return in a safe way. To the credit of all involved, Winter Pennant got underway just a few weeks later than planned.

Congratulations to Ty Allen, Dylan Hicks, Luke Doughty and Luke Taylor for their great work in the competitions space.

Tournaments continue to play a big role in South Australia. After a huge summer, Australian Ranking Tournaments were postponed due to the COVID pandemic. We have been pleased to include UTR tournaments on our calendar on an interim basis to provide playing opportunities for players.

Congratulations to Dylan Hicks, Emily Smith and Darren Sahb for their work in this space during such a difficult time.

Due to be held in April, the Tennis SA Awards Night was postponed due to the COVID pandemic and rescheduled to be held virtually. Congratulations to South Australia's Most Outstanding Tennis Clubs Greenacres (City/Hills) and Crystal Brook (Rural).

Our thanks to MCs Tom Rehn and Shane Leatham, along with our Production Team for their efforts in ensuring that this event could go ahead, albeit slightly different to how we planned.

Three leading tennis administrators Col Lawson, Joanna Lydeamore and Roger Sanderson were elected to the Board in June 2020. Tennis SA thanks our outgoing Tennis SA Board Directors Neville Messenger and Dr Alice Clark for their commitment and contribution to our sport in South Australia.

I would like to thank our Tennis SA President - Kent Thiele, Vice President - Philip Roberts and the entire Tennis SA Board for their support throughout the year. Congratulations to our leadership team of Matt Fitzgerald (Participation), Ty Allen and Dylan Hicks (Tournaments and Competitions), Bianca Marron (Marketing and Communications) and Brett Hidson (Venues and Government Relations) for the great work they have done throughout the year.

I also wish to acknowledge the Tennis SA team for their tireless work over the past 12 months to work through a variety of challenging situations and ensure that tennis could continue in the state. It has been a very difficult time and the team should be very proud of their achievements.

CEO REPORT

RALLYING TOGETHER

When we talked about 2020 being a transformational year no one could have possibly envisaged the magnitude of change we are enduring. The positive transformation we were planning involved a fresh, new, look summer and a widespread and inspired effort to entice new generations to our sport and keep them with us.

Incredibly, despite the enormous challenges of some of the worst bushfires in our nation's history, we still managed to achieve a large part of what we set out to do. And then along came an unprecedented global pandemic.

These enormous challenges have tested our sport, our teams and our communities. We have come together like never before. Along the way they have also amplified the public appreciation for the game we all love. It remains a passion, a delight and a part of our everyday lives – in good times and bad.

ACES FOR BUSHFIRE RELIEF

The community outpouring for those affected by the bushfires was a reminder of all that is good about Australia. This support inspired The Aces for Bushfire Relief campaign which was tremendously backed by the global tennis community, many of whom have called Australia home each January for years. We not only raised \$6.1m for those in need, but raised worldwide awareness of the plight of those who suffered from this natural disaster.

A personal highlight for me was the AO Rally for Relief, which, brought together our staff, players, officials, partners and fans for a show beamed into loungerooms across the globe. It demonstrated the enormous power of good that our sport can do, while creating long lasting memories, like that of volunteer firefighter Deb Borg

teaming up with her hero Rafa in front of a packed Rod Laver Arena and a global audience of millions.

All that good work continues as our charitable arm, the Australian Tennis Foundation, works with some of the towns hardest hit by the bushfires to help in the rebuild of not just tennis facilities, but the spirit of those communities.

OUR AUSSIE NUMBER ONE

How could we summarise the year without headlining the amazing performances of Ash Barty who rose to the top of the world rankings with such aplomb and grace that she captured the hearts of fans all over the world. Ash became the first Australian woman to finish the year-end as number one on the WTA Tour.

Along the way, Ash deservedly scooped up many major accolades and awards off the court, including the 2019 Newcombe Medal, WTA Player of the Year, the Don, Person and Sportswomen of the Year at the Dreamtime Awards and three AIS awards.

On the court, she led our Aussie Fed Cup team to its first final in 26 years in front of a packed RAC Arena in Perth. Unfortunately, the French team was too strong and we lost 3:2 in the last Fed Cup competition to be held in its current format. She is our nation's most prominent athlete who carries herself in a manner that can only inspire future generations to pick up a racquet.

A NEW-LOOK SUMMER

The summer brought a new era in tennis with the launch of the ATP Cup in Perth, Brisbane and Sydney. The Aussie men led by Nick Kyrgios and Alex de Minaur defeated Greece, Canada and Germany to top the table in the group stages held at a packed Pat Rafter Arena in Brisbane. They moved into the Final

Eight in Sydney where they beat Great Britain in the quarterfinals, before losing to Spain in the semis.

The event generated 93 million hours of viewing worldwide which was an 85 percent increase on previous week one tournaments. As we look to grow the Australian summer of tennis and provide more opportunities for the world's best players to compete in more capital cities, we hope to improve on these numbers.

Ash Barty quickly recovered from her loss in the doubles final of the Brisbane International to claim the inaugural Adelaide International title. Her summer success didn't end there, when Ash became the first Aussie woman to reach the Australian Open semifinals since Wendy Turnbull in 1984.

Nick Kyrgios's run at the Australian Open was also inspiring. He recovered from a grueling five set match against Russia's Karen Khachanov to take on Rafa Nadal in the fourth round on Rod Laver Arena.

Dylan Alcott continued his success in Melbourne by winning his sixth-straight Australian Open quads title. He also again teamed up with fellow Victorian Heath Davidson to win the doubles.

A NEW MISSION FOR PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Another major initiative this last year has been the implementation of our new player development stagey, which we released after more than 18 months of consultation, 150 interviews, workshops and surveys with players, coaches, parents, staff and global experts.

This new strategy has been implemented from a position of strength and the mission is to simply enable every player, coach and support team to be the best they can be.



There are many different pathways and goals for different individuals. We want to enable everyone to find his or her own way, while providing the right level of support in the areas of need, at the appropriate time. We aim to do this by providing more opportunities to more players, adopting a team-based approach, better integrating with the private coaching sector and ensuring our programs are inclusive and have broad goals.

COVID-19

Little did we know the bushfire disaster was only the beginning of our challenges for 2020. As the summer drew to a close, the pandemic enveloped our shores and seeped into our communities. We knew our response had to be both measured and swift. From the start, our decisions have been in accordance with some key guiding principles:

- We operate and maintain a safe working environment for our

staff and the broader tennis community (players, coaches, officials and clubs)

- We remain financially sound for the long-term health and viability of the game in Australia
- Our behaviours align with our values of:
 - Imagination
 - Collaboration
 - Humility
 - Excellence.

There have been some tough decisions made this year and there will be more. The second wave in Victoria has tested the entire nation. But we know that we have a unique sport which complies with physical distancing and hygiene protocols, with limited impact on how it's played. Ours is a sport that can help the community cope with all that comes with this pandemic and also help many recover from it - be it for their physical or mental health. We remain committed to getting through this and hosting another great summer of events -

along with helping the morale of this sport-loving nation.

THANK YOU

It gives me great pride to be associated with a sporting community that has shown so much resilience and class in the face of adversity. There has been so much time off the court for our coaches, players and participants and it has been a struggle for many. Regardless of the challenges that remain, we will continue to find a way forward by working collaboratively and with great care for one another.

A YEAR IN REVIEW

The 2019/20 financial year has been a momentous one for Tennis SA, with key achievements including the roof over Memorial Drive and the return of world class tennis to the City of Churches.

Following the announcement of the Memorial Drive Centre Court redevelopment in early 2019, the roof of the North Stand was removed in four pieces before the roof of the South Stand was removed in one piece on 1 June. Drilling for the roof columns began on 25 June.

In August, the Adelaide International was launched with the announcement that world No.2 Simona Halep (ROU) would lead the field.

On 2 September, the first of 24 roof pieces left SA Structural headquarters at midnight. Weaving its way through the streets of Adelaide, the 25 metre-long, 23-tonne piece of roof arrived safely at Memorial Drive at 5.50 am with just 10 minutes to spare. The northern transfer truss was lifted on 20 September, with the southern transfer truss put in position the following day. The first canoe truss connected the transfer trusses on 25 September.

On 2 October, it was announced that world No.1 and Roland Garros champion, Ash Barty would headline the Adelaide International.

The Newcombe Medal, Australian Tennis Awards were held at the beginning of December and saw South Australia once again bring home three awards. Darren Wunderer (Henley South Tennis Club) brought home the Volunteer Achievement Award, Elizabeth North Primary School was awarded the Most Outstanding School and the City of Playford Tennis International was announced as the Most Outstanding Professional Tournament.

The final piece of fabric was placed on the roof, with building works completed on 6 December. The project was officially opened by the Hon. Steven Marshall MP, Premier of South Australia and the Hon. Corey Wingard MP, Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing on 20 December.

The pavilion at the Tennis SA Clay Courts was named in honour of former Tennis SA President, Dennis Dall. Dennis' wife Kerry, children Sarah, Tiffany, David and Joanna, as well as their families were in attendance as the Dall

Pavilion was unveiled.

In the new year, the Adelaide International took centre stage with some of the best players in the world competing for \$2 million in prizemoney from Saturday 12 January to Saturday 18 January. Barty and Andrey Rublev emerged as the eventual winners.

Open Court Sessions launched nationwide during the Australian Open, providing a new way for people to play tennis. Over 100 clubs around the state signed up to be a part of the new program, with Channel 9's Today Show visiting Henley South Tennis Club in January as part of the launch.

Bushfires gripped the nation in early 2020 and South Australia was no different with the Adelaide Hills, Yorke Peninsula and Kangaroo Island all hit hard. In February, Tennis SA staff visited Kangaroo Island to see the impact first hand, meeting with club representatives to support the relief and rebuild efforts.

Davis Cup returned to Adelaide in March with Australia taking on Brazil. South Australia's Alex Bolt was named in the team for the first time. After a solid opening day, Australia went in to the second day with a 2-0 lead, however Brazil steadied to take the third rubber. An epic fourth rubber ensued, with John Millman eventually taking the win over Thiago Monteiro 6-7(6) 7-6(3) 7-6(3) in a touch over three hours.

Just a week after Davis Cup, the summer season came to an abrupt end as the COVID-19 pandemic took hold. Whilst most clubs remained open in some capacity throughout, Tennis SA tournaments, competitions and events were postponed. With the support of the South Australian Government, Winter Pennant kick started the return to competitive sport in the state on Saturday 13 June 2020.





PARTICIPATION REPORT

AFFILIATION AND MEMBERSHIP

Tennis SA with full support and significant investment from Tennis Australia is pleased to continue the simple annual affiliation fee based on the number of tennis courts at the club. There were 319 affiliated bodies with Tennis SA in 2019/20, including 282 clubs across 37 associations.

Tennis SA and our affiliates registered a total of 15,467 club members. The per court affiliation fee model offers a more flexible and innovative option and encouragement to record all club participants.

ORGANISATION STRUCTURE

August 2019 saw the introduction of a new organisation structure for the Participation team. The change saw Matthew Fitzgerald appointed to the role of Head of Tennis Development (formerly Participation Manager).

The changes also saw the introduction of two Regional Tennis Managers. James Pick was promoted to the Regional Tennis Manager Country role (formerly Participation Leader) and Erin Haines joined us from a successful career at Lawn Bowls SA to look take the Regional Tennis Manager Metro role.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT OFFICERS (previously Participation Leaders)

The new structure saw the introduction of four new Club Development Officers with Adrian Dezen, Andrew Fitzgerald, Giles Ellis and Hayley Allen responsible for Metro South, Metro North, Country North West and Country South East respectively. Their roles as Club Development Officers was to be the first point of call to assist clubs, councils and coaches in



their region and support a variety of groups in promoting tennis participation through a number of activities.

During the reporting period, unfortunately we farewelled Egon Loh (Participation Leader). Egon has now moved into a role at Table Tennis Australia.

Our Club Development Officers conducted 354 face-to-face visits (up by 58 visits previous year) with our affiliates during the financial year to develop strong relationships with our tennis community that resulted in 15,467 unique registrations for 2019/20 - excluding Hot Shots registrations. Important relationships built with STARCLUB officers to ensure our clubs had all the resources at their disposal to maintain a healthy and sustainable club.

SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT COORDINATORS

The new structure also saw the introduction of an additional two School Development Coordinators. Troy McNeil (formerly a Participation Leader) was appointed the region of South

East Country, while Scott King was appointed the region of North West Country. They joined Shane Leathem (Metro North) and Amelia Waters (Metro South).

Tennis SA is pleased to report we had 297 primary schools register as part of the Australian Sports Commission Sporting Schools (partnership and play program) during 2019/20. Tennis SA also had 38 secondary schools register. Through these programs, Tennis SA engaged 54,052 school children.

Tennis SA also held 33 ANZ Tennis Hot Shots District School Competitions (up from 22 in 2018/19) across the state resulting in the annual finals being held at the Memorial Drive Clay Courts. Due to increase number of schools participating in school carnivals throughout 2019/20, the decision was made to introduce a metro and country final to be played over two days. With 160 children representing 16 schools. Prince Alfred College won the metro competition and Cobdogla Primary School won the country competition. Both schools were represented at the State Final

played on Centre Court during the Adelaide International with Cobdogla Primary School awarded state champions for the second year running.

SYSTEMS

Tennis Australia has spent a significant amount of time upgrading the MyTennis 2 system this past financial year. This has increased confidence in the system and decreased administrative burden to Tennis SA affiliated bodies.

Tennis SA acknowledge the system is still not flawless and thank volunteers for their patience and understanding, along with the amount of time and energy they have put into the MyTennis system. Tennis SA continues to work on solutions to make life easier for club membership and data entry.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE

Tennis SA staged its fifth annual Club Development Conference in June 2019. The conference is a great opportunity for Tennis SA and our affiliates to jointly discuss opportunities and resolve challenges directly affecting our affiliates.

Key presentations on the day included a workshop by Ian Sandbrook on 'Unleashing Your Entrepreneurial Spirit'.

This workshop was really well received by all attendees and made everyone think outside the box to how they run their clubs, associations or coaching programs.

Sarah Armstrong (Tennis Australia) also presented on Bounce and the new additions to help club and coaches operate. A key follow up has been working with our stakeholders in communication, participation and resources.

A total of 54 club members across 34 clubs attended the conference.

FREE TENNIS DAYS

Free Tennis Day packs were removed for the 2019/20 affiliation due to the introduction of Open Court Sessions. Tennis SA continued to support clubs who wished to continue promoting their clubs through the Free Tennis Day platform.

OPEN COURT SESSIONS

Open Court Sessions was a new initiative to encourage new and inactive participants back to tennis in a social environment.

No gear? No problem, everything is supplied for an Open Court Session and you don't need to dress like a Grand Slam champion to join in. Just wear comfortable clothes (think sneakers) and arrive at the session, where racquets and balls (including the cool compression ones) will be provided and courts (both full size and mini versions) are all set up and ready for your hit. Forget the traditional tennis thinking of a full-size court, serious scoring and hitting the right shot at the right time.

With an emphasis on fun, Open Court Sessions included activities like triples (doubles, with room for one more!) and pickleball - one of the fastest-growing racquet sports in the US, pickleball is played with paddles rather than racquets, and a plastic ball on a mini court.

95 clubs registered for Open Court Sessions across South Australia with 1,077 players participating in the new and exciting concept. Tennis SA views Open Court Sessions as a massive addition to tennis clubs across South Australia and look forward to working with participating venues to increase participation in the future.

DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

Diversity and Inclusion Coordinator Rebeka Schaefer coordinated a variety of inclusion programs throughout 2019/20.

These included the Ken McGregor Foundation, Wheelchair Pathway and Hampstead Rehabilitation Programs, State Championships for Players with an Intellectual Disability and Special Olympics Gala Day.

Multicultural programs and the development of Indigenous programs are just a few of the areas Tennis SA has invested a significant amount of time raising awareness in the Diversity and Inclusion space.

Rebeka, along with Matthew Fitzgerald, took a team of three indigenous children to Darwin to represent South Australia for the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival. South Australia received the Ash Barty award presented for combined sportsmanship and results throughout the event, a fantastic effort considering SA were the smallest team represented at the tournament.

Bek unfortunately farewelled us in January after the completion of the Adelaide International. Tennis SA is currently working on implementing a strategic plan for the Diversity and Inclusion space. Matthew Fitzgerald is currently addressing all enquiries and ongoing programs in the Diversity and Inclusion space in the interim.



GOVERNMENT RELATIONS AND PLACES TO PLAY REPORT

MEMORIAL DRIVE REDEVELOPMENT

As part of the redevelopment program, the home of South Australian tennis, Memorial Drive, received its second major upgrade in as many years with the installation of a new canopy to cover the Centre Courts, along with some cosmetic refurbishments to the North Stand.

Practical completion was 13 December 2019, with the Official Opening performed by Premier Steven Marshall and Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing Corey Wingard on 20 December 2019, just in time for the set up and staging of the new Adelaide International.

The project cost \$11 million with contributions of \$10 million from the SA State Government and a combined \$1 million contribution from Tennis SA and Tennis Australia.

The centre court canopy followed the previous year's redevelopment

of the Memorial Drive Tennis Club courts at Next Generation Memorial Drive, thus truly anchoring tennis to our traditional location for further generations.

MEMORIAL DRIVE EVENTS

While no events were staged at Memorial Drive during the second half of 2019 due to the redevelopment project, 2020 promised to be highly anticipated with new events. Following the Adelaide International (12-18 January 2020), Tennis SA hosted its second Davis Cup qualifying tie in consecutive years, this time against Brazil on 6-7 March 2020.

From March 2020, rules for public gatherings were implemented to slow the spread of COVID-19. As such, Tennis SA were forced to cancel confirmed events such as State Opera SA's season opening event, Carl Orff's Carmina Burana (28 March 2020),

and the Vinnies CEO Sleepout (18 June 2020).

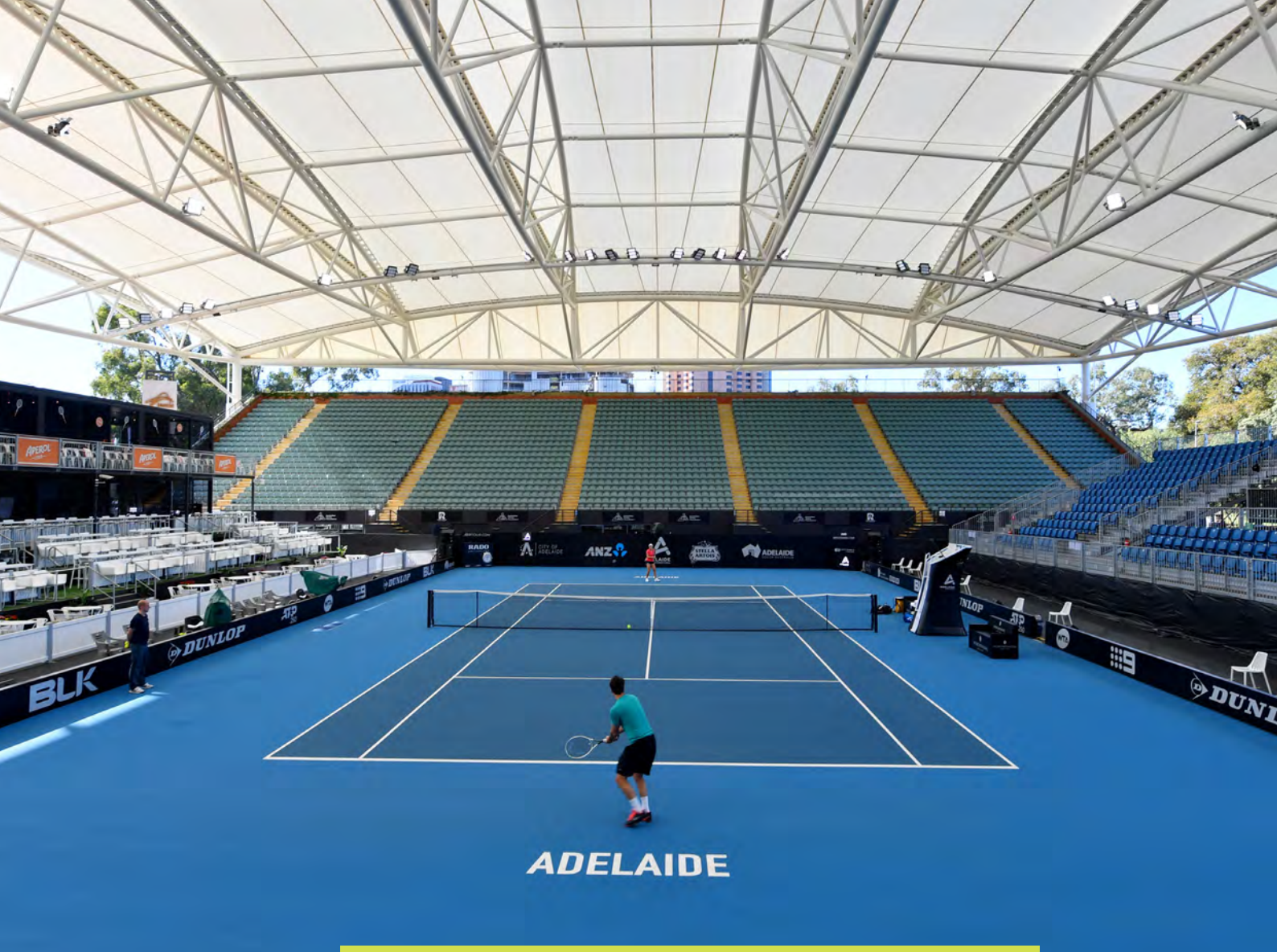
BOOK A COURT

Book a Court is an online court booking and payment platform, which is integrated with pin pad technology placed on a court entry gate. When players book and pay for court hire online, they receive a PIN that allows them to access their court and turn on court lighting if required. The system aims to provide flexibility and ease of access to players wishing to hire a tennis court, while increasing court hire revenue and decreasing the administration burden on clubs.

People could safely play tennis thanks to the sport's ability to naturally enable the physical distancing and hygiene protocols, resulting in more people enjoying

the social, mental and physical benefits of tennis.

Data obtained from Tennis Australia's award winning Book a Court online booking system has shown a sharp increase in the number of people playing tennis during May 2020, compared to the same time last year. Playing a small part in the national totals, bookings in SA have more than doubled in 2020.

Book a Court is a priority

program following outstanding results from interstate regions that have embraced the system. Tennis SA were successful in receiving funding through the State Government's Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing to install the system in 15 more venues over three years. As such, Tennis SA will continue to work with clubs, local councils and Tennis Australia, in the expansion of this program.

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS AND PLACES TO PLAY REPORT (continued)

MILLSWOOD TENNIS CENTRE

“Millswood” is home to a variety of programs and events that cater for every level and ability of tennis player. These include casual and public users, tournament, social and association competition matches, as well as coaching and development programs led by qualified Tennis Australia Coach Members. Managed on behalf of Tennis SA by TennisWorld, a business unit of Tennis Australia, Millswood maintains an extremely important place in the South Australian tennis spectrum following the merger of the SA Hardcourt Tennis League with the SA Lawn Tennis Association in 1996 that resulted in the formation of Tennis SA.

GRASS COURT FORUM

The second Tennis SA Grass Courts Forum was held at Reade Park Lawn Tennis Club on 30th August 2019. Tennis SA aims to support and assist the grass tennis court clubs and venues as they are an integral part of our history which is important to preserve.

Attendees heard from a variety of speakers including Reade Park Lawn Tennis Club President, Tom Twelftree. Tom discussed the club's recent journey, highlighting the club's growth in memberships and social play, as well as initiatives taken to streamline club process and create efficiencies.

The forum also welcomed Di Stor from the Millswood Lawn Bowls Club. The club introduced Barefoot Bowls, a program which encourages and facilitates social avenues of play with less formal procedures in order to welcome new people into the club. This initiative has increased participation with many now playing within traditional competitions, thus helping to boost the club's membership numbers beyond expectations.

Prior to lunch, the group were treated to a presentation from Reade Park Lawn Tennis Club greenkeepers, James Gregory and Brendan Fisher. The group were then taken on a tour of the grounds, showing off the 14 grass courts and the maintenance facilities and equipment.

ADELAIDE INTERNATIONAL STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENTS

Friends of Tennis

The Friends of Tennis networking event was held on 17th January 2020 during the Adelaide International. 40 State & Federal Government representatives and their families had the opportunity to network, socialize and take in the Adelaide International atmosphere with a hit on show-court in the morning followed by a Day session

ticket to the Adelaide International on the Aperol Sundeck, where Tennis SA was given the opportunity to discuss the progress and future of the sport.

Government Forum

Similarly, the Government Forum invited Local Council and ORSR representatives to the Adelaide International to learn, network and share while enjoying the corporate hospitality facilities at the newly redeveloped Memorial Drive. 36 people attended a function staged on the Aperol Sundeck on 16th January 2020. Tennis SA's Brett Hidson welcomed all and spoke about the programs and initiatives being undertaken, including the new 'Get Your Racquet On!' campaign and the Places to Play Strategic Plan. Guests then had the opportunity to stay and enjoy the tennis for the remainder of the Day session.



TENNIS SA PLACES TO PLAY STRATEGIC PLAN 2019-2022

The Tennis SA Places to Play team is part of a national team that supports participation sustainability and growth through a network of welcoming tennis venues and deliverers.

Tennis is played at over 600 venues across Adelaide and South Australia, all offering a variety of facilities and services. The Tennis SA Places to Play Strategic Plan 2019-2022 has been developed to guide the accountable provision and sustainable management of places where tennis is accessible so to benefit the whole community.

The plan delivers a set of broad expectations for Tennis SA affiliated bodies, all levels of Government and other key stakeholders to work collaboratively and clearly communicate on proven and innovative actions that will:

- Improve the quality of existing facilities
- Enhance our partnerships
- Ensure an appropriate spread of quality venues across the state
- Plan and develop new facilities in major growth areas, schools and community spaces

VENUE DEVELOPMENTS

During 2019/20, over 30 venues around South Australia were developed or upgraded, with funding assistance from parties including local councils, Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing (ORSR), Tennis Australia and the respective clubs.

South Australian tennis clubs again received wonderful support for community tennis infrastructure projects with \$1.7 million provided through the Community Recreation and Sport Facilities Program (announced in September 2019), Active Club Program (August

2019) and the Grassroots Football, Cricket, and Netball Facility Program (April and June 2020).

Tennis Australia continues to support community tennis infrastructure projects and participation initiatives via the National Court Rebate Scheme (NCRS). Through the NCRS, Tennis Australia contributed \$142,500 towards projects in SA.

COACH DEVELOPMENT REPORT



At the end of the 2019-2020 financial year there were 244 financial coaches in South Australia comprised of 51 business, 93 qualified and 100 trainee coach members. 33.6% of these coaches are female which sits more than 5% above the national average.

Tennis Australia continues to maintain the highest possible standard in professionalism by having all qualified coaches compliant. Qualified coach members must hold a recognized first aid qualification, a National Police Check and Working with Children Check as a compulsory requirement of coach membership.

Ongoing professional development has remained a focus for the Coach Development team with 17 workshops presented to 89 unique coaches in the last 12 months, 14 more coaches than the same time last year. Five of these workshops were delivered regionally.

For the first time ever in South Australia, a full day coaching conference was held in line with the Adelaide International. Multiple

world class presenters spoke on the day including Judy Murray, Stephen Amritaj (UTR), Marc Sophoulis, Craig O'Shannessy, Nicole Pratt and Matthew Clark (AFLW Adelaide Crows Senior Coach). 73 South Australian tennis coaches attended this conference as well as five people from other National Sporting Organisations and the Office for Recreation and Sport.

The first 'Women in Tennis Coaching' networking event was also held in line with the Adelaide International where 20 key female South Australian coaches attended. Jaslyn Hewitt-Shehadie presented and spoke on her journey, followed by a morning tea and a day at the Adelaide International. It was a fantastic event to bring female coaches in South Australia together.

The Coach Development team also met three times with the 'Industry Leaders' which is a handpicked group of leading operators around the state. The Industry Leaders group aims to meet quarterly and discuss the direction of tennis coaching in the state, current issues or barriers

the coaching fraternity is facing in clubs and ways to manage these effectively moving forward.

Strengthening relationships with coaches and assisting them with the growth of their businesses has been a key focus for the Coach Development team in the past year. 49 unique coach check-ins were conducted with 15 of these being with regional coaches. Coach check ins are an opportunity to meet with these coaches in their club environments, talk through any challenges they are facing and help them improve their day to day running of their business operations.

For the second year in a row all 12 Foundation Cup coaching positions were filled with regional coaches. With three more regional coaches becoming qualified this year, the competition for these coaching positions moving forward will continue to get stronger.

Courses:

In 2019-20, two Foundation Coaching courses were held with 15 participants. This course is a five-hour course targeting

young aspiring coaches who are predominantly assistant coaches at their club.

The Community Coach Course was delivered twice in the last year to a total of 16 participants. This is a three-day course focusing on the delivery of ANZ Tennis Shots. There was one Junior Development Course delivered which incorporates a Certificate III in Sports Coaching and is delivered over six months. There are 12 participants currently completing this course with five females and three from the regions. The 'Presidents Women in Tennis' scholarship is available for females undertaking the Junior Development Course to apply. This year, all five females have applied

for the scholarship, the highest number of scholarship applicants ever in South Australia.

It is important to note, an extra Foundation, Community and Junior Development Course were planned to be delivered in the past year but due to COVID, these courses were unable to go ahead.

Throughout COVID-19 the Coach Development team focused on supporting the mental health of the coaches in South Australia, as their businesses were greatly impacted by the pandemic. A phone call was made to all 244 coaches in the state to check in and offer individual support to the coaches. Follow up phone calls were made to coaches who were identified needing extra one on one support.

A 'coach resource kit' was put together by Tennis Australia which included information on financial support, HR support and mental health support, this was provided to all coaches which was widely appreciated. All coach members were invited to regular Skype calls which was used as a platform to ensure consistent messaging and direction regarding state/national regulations throughout COVID and how this would impact coaching.

We were extremely pleased with the coaches of South Australia on their willingness to go over and above to ensure a safe tennis environment throughout COVID and they should be greatly commended for their efforts.



COMPETITIONS REPORT



WINTER PENNANT

The 2019 season consisted of 248 teams competing each week over 14 rounds. All participating clubs are to be commended for the excellent sportsmanship and the spirited competition that was shown throughout the season.

SUMMER COMPETITIONS

Tennis SA, along with the associations, thank the club volunteers who looked after their respective teams during the season.

The difficult decision was made to cancel the finals due to Coronavirus (COVID-19). The decision was based on expert medical advice and was in line with the recommendations of the global tennis community.

The teams who made it to the Grand Final by winning the 1st v 2nd Semi Final in their division were declared premiers.

STATEWIDE SUPER STATE LEAGUE

The 2019/20 Statewide Super State League season was another strong display of high-level tennis played between the best players in South

Australia. Eight teams competed in the State League men's competition and six teams in the women's competition.

East Adelaide Payneham/Kingswood Tennis Clubs finished minor premiers put in a strong performance to defeat Coromandel Valley in the men's semi-final and earn their way into the Grand Final. However, due to the global pandemic and the cancellation of the remainder of the season, Coromandel Valley were declared premiers.

In the women's competition Glenlea were victorious against The Drive in the other semifinal in an incredibly tight contest to make their way through to the Grand Final. With the remainder of the season being cancelled due to the global pandemic Glenlea were declared State League Premiers.

Li Tu from East Adelaide Kings won the Men's State League Player of the year while Jasmine Adams from Kingswood and Marie Bonnin from Glenlea shared the Women's award.

Tennis SA would like to acknowledge the State League

STATEWIDE SUPER JUNIOR STATE LEAGUE

The Statewide Super Junior State League saw the best juniors in South Australia competing over a 14-round season.

The boy's competition consisted of eight teams with four making the finals. Coromandel Valley and Trinity Gardens both won their way through to the Grand Final, however due to the global pandemic the remainder of the season was cancelled with Coromandel Valley being declared premiers as they were the highest placed team in the Grand Final.

The girl's competition consisted of six teams with four making the finals. Through Statewide Super's sponsorship we were able to host two female wellbeing workshops at Millswood and Seacliff with the first being focused on careers in tennis and the second on nutrition. The goal of these sessions was to help

support our junior female players and help create a pathway to keep them involved in the sport.

Seacliff and East Adelaide Payneham were both able to win their way through to the Grand Final, however due to the remainder of the season being cancelled due to the global pandemic Seacliff were declared premiers due to being the highest placed team in the Grand Final.

Callum Gale from Trinity Gardens won the boys Junior State League Player of the Year while Jasmine Adams from Seacliff took out the girls' Junior State League Player of the Year

The response to the Orange Ball competition continues to be positive with the WDTA orange ball league consisting of 10 teams comprising of three players each, and the GDTA orange ball league consisting of 16 teams comprising three players each spread over two divisions.

These Match Play Leagues were term length seasons, with a home and away format. The key difference was having the final round matches at one location to act as 'super rounds'. The feedback

overall was very positive, with the kids loving the super rounds and the presentations, and these Match Play Leagues have continued to run throughout winter in both associations.

It's exciting for junior tennis, with some of Adelaide's best nine and 10 year olds involved. This is not only exciting for the sport but exciting for the participants as they are playing kids the same age, similar ability and on the correct modified ball, beneficial for their development.

EDTA/NETA SENIORS

The inaugural Eastern Districts and North East Tennis Associations senior summer competition for 2019/20 consisted of 15 rounds

EDTA JUNIORS

SDTA SENIORS AND JUNIORS

Tennis SA and Southern Districts Tennis Association worked collaboratively for the second season to deliver both the Junior and Summer competition. The 2019/20 season consisted of 14 rounds for juniors and 15 rounds for seniors, with 180 juniors teams and 92 senior teams competing each week. Tennis SA and The Southern Districts Tennis Association also ran a junior season throughout the 2019

winter with 104 teams competing. All participating clubs are to be commended for the excellent sportsmanship and the spirited competition that was shown throughout the season.

FOUNDATION CUP

The 2019 Foundation Cup was played over four days on the courts of the Berri Tennis Club in perfect weather conditions.

Six regions, Eyre Peninsula, Upper Northern and Yorke, Lower Northern, River Murray, South East and Hills Fleurieu competed in the teams format combining the boys and girls in each age group for 13-and-under, 15-and-under and 17-and-under.

With nearly 180 of the best regional juniors in South Australia battling it out, the standard of tennis throughout the event was extremely high. Spectators were spoilt for choice with sensational matches taking place on the many courts.

This year for the first time coaches were allowed to speak with their players during change of ends and the end of sets. This was a change that was very positively

received with both players and coaches enjoying the greater access throughout the matches.

Lower Northern was the dominant region taking out both the 13/u and 17/u teams events, going undefeated in both age groups. Hills Fleurieu provided stiff competition finishing second in both age groups and only dropping one match each. 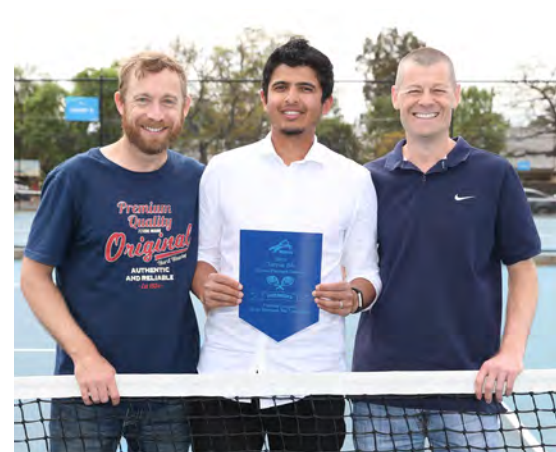

TOURNAMENTS REPORT

AUSTRALIAN RANKING TOURNAMENTS – JUNIOR TOURNAMENTS AND AUSTRALIAN MONEY TOURNAMENTS

2019/20 has been another busy year for the tournaments team in South Australia which saw the third City of Playford Tennis International take place as well as the reintroduction of the ITF Junior events back into South Australia.

JUNIOR TOURNAMENTS

29 Junior Tournaments (JT) were scheduled for 2019-21, however due to the COVID-19 pandemic only 21 took place. The scheduled number of events was an increase of four from the 2018-19 calendar. Participation numbers at Metropolitan and Regional JTs were slightly down on previous years to 118 and 98 respectively. Regional JTs were held at Gawler, Renmark, Berri and Mount Gambier.

AUSTRALIAN MONEY TOURNAMENTS

10 Australian Money Tournaments (AMT) were scheduled for 2019-20, however, due to the effects of COVID-19 only nine took place. A total of \$54,000 in prizemoney

was earned by players. Platinum level AMTs were held at Playford Tennis Centre and Tea Tree Gully Tennis Club.

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT SERIES

Junior Development series events continue to grow in popularity with 11 tournaments scheduled over 2019-20. Due to the effect of COVID-19 only 10 of these events took place with an average of 49 players in metropolitan events and 75 players across the six regional JDS events held. Regional events were held in Clare, Port Lincoln, Berri, Lucindale and Kadina with many regions using these events as another stepping stone in the Foundation Cup pathway.

CITY OF PLAYFORD TENNIS INTERNATIONAL

Tennis SA and Tennis Australia, in conjunction with the City of Playford, TennisGear and Playford Tennis Club, hosted the City of Playford Tennis International from Saturday 26 October to Sunday 3 November 2019.

James Duckworth (NSW) and Storm Sanders (WA) were crowned the City of Playford Tennis

International II Singles Champions, following an outstanding week of tennis action at the Playford Tennis Centre. Second seed Duckworth defeated the top seed, Japan's Yasutaka Uchiyama 7-6(2) 6-4 in the men's singles final, while Sanders overcame third seed Lizette Cabrera (Qld) 6-3 6-4 in the women's singles final.

In the men's doubles final, the Finnish pairing of Harri Heliovaara and Patrik Niklas-Salminen defeated crowd favourite top seeds, Ruben Gonzales (PHI) and Evan King (USA) 6-4 6-7(4) [10-7]. In the women's, top seeds Sanders and Asia Muhammad (USA) claimed the women's doubles title with a 6-3 6-4 win over third seeds Naiktha Bains (GBR) and Tereza Mihalikova (SVK).

Thanks to the City of Playford, TennisGear, Playford Tennis Club and to all who made this tournament such an amazing success in its third year.

ITF JUNIOR EVENTS

Tennis SA and Tennis Australia, in conjunction with Next Generation Memorial Drive, hosted back to back Grade 5 ITF World Tennis Tour events from Saturday 14 September 2019 to Friday 27 September 2019. The two events, Adelaide Junior International and South Australian Junior International saw around 120 18-and-under players visit Adelaide during the two week period.

Janice Tjen (INA) and James McCabe (NSW) were crowned the inaugural champions of the first Adelaide Junior International. Tjen, the number one seed in the girls' championship, defeated 13-year-old Western Australian Taylah Preston 6-4 2-6 6-3 in a tight battle. In the boys' championship, unseeded McCabe dug deep to get past fourth seed Derek Pham (WA) in two tough sets, 6-4 6-2.

The South Australian Junior International concluded a week





later with Taylah Preston (WA) and Enzo Aguiard (Vic) crowned the champions Having finished as the runner up the previous week, 13-year-old Preston defeated Japan's Anna Kobayashi 6-2 6-1 to take home the girls' championship. In the boys' championship, second seed Aguiard took home the trophy over fellow Victorian, Matthew Bosancic 6-2 6-3.

BALLKIDS

There were over 170 expressions of interest to be a Ballkid at the very first Adelaide International. Due to training commitments and age criteria, only 68 participated during the week. Ballkids attended a minimum of 4 and maximum of 7 training session in the second half of 2019, as well as participated in the 2019 City of Playford Tennis International as Ballkids.

Ballkids were provided with 1 hat, 2 shirts, one pair of shorts, 2 pairs of socks and a water bottle as uniform for the tournament. They had to provide their own shoes. Lunches and dinner were also provided to ballkids for the duration of the event.

Each Ballkid rostered on centre court was allocated one complimentary ticket per shift, and for ballkids rostered on outside courts, they were given two complimentary tickets per shift. These were used by parents and they were very appreciative.



OFFICIATING, POLICY AND EDUCATION REPORT

OFFICIATING

In 2019/2020 the following accredited courses were run in South Australia:

- Three Line Umpire Level D courses, as well as a
- Court Supervisor course

These courses were well attended and were followed by training and assessments resulting in:

- Seven new Line Umpires
- Three new Court Supervisors

Many South Australian officials continued their progression and development through officiating. Leading young official Dana Zahr won the Tennis SA Excellence in Officiating Award as well as the prestigious Phil Read Trophy for Outstanding Service in Officiating in SA. Once again, several SA line umpires excelled on the international stage and were selected for the inaugural Adelaide International, Davis Cup tie against Brazil and the 2020 Australian Open with David Gobbett, Ian Curran and Darren Sahb making the men's singles final

and Dana also officiating in the women's singles final.

TOURNAMENT SERVICING

Tennis SA were able to meet service requirements at all Australian Rankings Tournaments including tournaments in regional areas at Renmark and Mount Gambier. Tennis SA continued to service tournaments with Chair Umpires and Line Umpires at an 85% efficiency rate. The minimum servicing of these tournaments with referees and court supervisors was also met. Court Supervisors were also used at all State League Men and Women minor rounds, as well as all finals.

POLICY EDUCATION

The position of the Policy and Education Officer is designed to guide and educate clubs throughout SA in implementing policies approved by Boards at both national and state level ensuring tennis is played in a safe

and enjoyable environment.

Child safety continues to be monitored by the TA Integrity department and the Policy and Education Officer at Tennis SA with support from Tennis SA staff. Compliance with national policies and state government legislation through appropriate screening and Child Safe Environments further accentuate the emphasis on all participants feeling safe in our tennis environments.

Updated Working with Children Legislation Implemented by the SA Government was communicated to all clubs and associations in SA in accordance with Child Protection in tennis.

The Member Protection and Disciplinary Policies were also enforced through investigation and hearings of player, parent and spectator behaviour.



MARKETING AND COMMUNICATIONS REPORT

The last year has been filled with exciting new initiatives, the return of international tennis, and a focus on supporting the different pathways for tennis in SA.

ADELAIDE INTERNATIONAL

The marketing campaign for the Adelaide International launched in October 2019 across digital, OOH, radio, TV, social and eDMs. The mass media campaign exceeded ticketing expectations and gave us a broad reach across all of South Australia and interstate. A big thank you to our media partners Channel 9, The Advertiser and Mix 102.3 for delivery amazing outcomes for the inaugural year.

Our team was also responsible for the management of all event signage, entertainment including Kids Zone, The Lawn and the Racquets and Strings Festival, TennisFest, Centre Court management and production, and fundraisers and events, making for a busy and exciting experience for all involved.

Whilst we couldn't welcome everyone to our usual Awards Night in person, we were glad to be able to provide an event and platform to recognise our finalists and winners.

TENNIS SA WEBSITE

The Tennis SA website had over 71,000 users across the financial year period, with January peaking at 10,731 and March at 10,756, both coinciding with the Adelaide International and Davis Cup. April also had an increase in users at 7,689 due largely to COVID communications and updates.

The home page had the highest views with 54,182 and the Tournament Calendar was the most popular sub page with views at 36,527.

An analysis of coverage for the Adelaide International found an ASR of AUD 13,208,877 and a potential reach of 91,632,978.

DAVIS CUP

An analysis of coverage for the Davis Cup (Australia vs Brazil) found an ASR of AUD 10,676,111 and a potential reach of 57,687,355.

This takes the total coverage for the sport in South Australia in the 2019/20 financial year to an ASR of AUD 35,197,586 and a potential reach of 209,307,517.





ADELAIDE INTERNATIONAL REPORT

The Inaugural event saw the return of ATP and WTA tennis to Adelaide with a sense of nostalgia and a massive amount of anticipation.

Over 50,000 people came through the gates of the inaugural Adelaide International with the last three night sessions sold out. The event was also broadcast globally reaching around 200 territories and was domestically delivered into our lounge rooms through our partner in Channel 9. The team is certainly creating something special in and for Adelaide.

Our very own world No.1 Ash Barty defeated Dayana Yastremska (UKR) 6-2 7-5 for the women title and the young superstar Andrey Rublev defeated another next generation player Harris 6-3 6-0. We also witnessed some great doubles finals with the men's doubles title being won by Gonzalez and Martin who defeated Dodig and Polasek, and the women's title being won by Melichar and Xu who defeated Dabrowski and Jurak.

The finals were the culmination of eight days of tennis including qualifying and involved over 100 players from all over the world.

It is not only the players who graced Adelaide and Memorial Drive but also the hundreds of coaches, support staff, family and friends, managers, administrators and the tennis family who circled on Adelaide. The player support and feedback from the event was much appreciated. This feedback is reflective of the team who promotes and delivers the event and the commitment everyone has to be one of the best tennis events on the ATP and WTA Calendar.

However, this event is already so much more than a tennis event. The Adelaide International delivered and supported over 20 acts from the local music industry across stages located in The Lawn and the Centre Stage. Kids Zone was popular throughout the week with activities on The Lawn including our favorite ANZ Hot Shots which witnessed adults and kids enjoying the smaller courts. The event supported three charities and hosted over 12 functions including the Rally for Resilience which supported bushfire relief on the opening night. We were also pleased to host over 3000 participants and attendees for the



AI Tennis Fest which included hot shot competitions, adult events and provided the opportunity for attendance at events such as Women's Leadership in Sport, Coaches Conference and Schools workshops to name a few. The crowd numbers, the sold out sessions and the fact that 91% of patrons indicated that they are likely to return to the event (Nielson Research) have already placed the Adelaide International in a strong position to consolidate Adelaide as an important part of the Australian summer of tennis.

This event would not have happened without the support of



the South Australian Government and we should be thankful that when the opportunity arose, with short time lines, to secure a world class tennis event the government moved swiftly and diligently to make sure Adelaide featured on the new global tennis calendar. From the Premier and Sport and Tourism Ministers to the South Australian Tourism Commission and the Office for Recreation and Sport, everyone worked together to not only build a new canopy on centre court but to also execute a world class event.

A huge thank you to the world class team at Tennis Australia

and Tennis SA who delivered the event with such passion, commitment and enthusiasm. Furthermore, our wonderful 200 plus strong volunteer army were so welcoming to both our players and fans which has already established this event on the international calendar. A special mention to Sarah Easson and Patrick Ferguson who respectively assisted to coordinate and make our beautiful indigenous wooden trophies. They are unique and special and are truly reflective of the spirit and essence of what the Adelaide International strives to create.

ADELAIDE INTERNATIONAL TENNIS FEST

RALLY FOR RESILIENCE

Two grand slam champions were the headline act to officially launch the Adelaide International at the Charity fundraising event – Rally for Resilience. The charity exhibition doubles match was accompanied by live music and entertainment, with Simon Bryant and WTA and ATP players live cooking in the Champions Suite and Aperol Sundeck, and Tom Rehn, Adrian Franklin and Roger Rasheed entertaining the crowd on centre court. The opening match of the tournament was also played with the first ATP singles match.

Originally the event was to raise funds for the Australian Tennis Foundation and Roger Rasheed Foundation to aid delivery of year-round sports programs in socially disadvantaged areas of South Australia. With the bushfire crisis it was decided that funds from the evening would be raised for bush fire relief in South Australia.

TALKING TENNIS BREAKFAST

With the introduction of the Adelaide International came the need to re-look at the established Legends Lunch and develop a new format to align with an event running both day and night sessions. With this in mind, the 2020 fundraising event for the Ken McGregor fund was The Talking Tennis Breakfast.

Participants were asked to come along and enjoy a fully catered delicious hot breakfast, served with tea, coffee, juice, or even a glass of champagne, and listen to listen to 3 different panels, the first being Judy Murray and John Fitzgerald, then next was with rising superstar Alex de Minaur, and last being the new inclusion of the Women in Sport Panel with Judy, Cycling champion Anna Meares, and SACA Women's player Tahlia McGrath.

The event raised over \$6,000 for the Ken McGregor Fund.

SA PLAYERS CLUB

The SA Players Club function was a major event reunion to recognize past pennant/state league players. It took place alongside the official draw for the Adelaide International tournament.

The event featured Tom Rehn MC, and Adelaide International players Jordan Thompson and Marketa Vondrousova for the Men's and Women's draws respectively.

The Females in Coaching Brunch was a way to inspire and connect with female tennis coaches and provide an opportunity to gain knowledge and share stories. The 2020 Adelaide International Coaches workshop was an opportunity for Coaches to come together in a unique setting to meet and network with fellow coaches.

The professional event involved presentations by guest speakers, panel discussions and interviews with the inspiring Judy Murray and Craig O'Shannessy and was well received by all that attended.

TEACHER THANK YOU FUNCTION

The Teacher Thank You Function provided Tennis SA the opportunity to thank the teacher ambassadors from partnership schools for their ongoing support, and to showcase what Tennis has to offer.

Teachers also had the privilege to meet special guests commentator

Roger Rasheed and player Sam Querrey.

OPEN COURT SESSION HOST FUNCTION

The Open Court Session Host Function recognized the hosts for the Open Court Sessions being launched in 2020.

It was an opportunity to thank them for their commitment to the program, provide hype for the launch and final opportunity to liaise with Tennis SA and Tennis Australia staff prior to the launch.

Following the function, guests had the chance to enjoy the remainder of the Adelaide International Day session.

VOLUNTEER RECOGNITION FUNCTION

The Volunteer Recognition Function recognized volunteers from various facets of the business and thank them for their contribution to the sport. The event involved club volunteers, officiating volunteers, volunteers involved in management of Tennis SA committees through Tournaments and Competitions.

Award winners from the 2019 Tennis SA Awards Night received invitations as part of their prize as did members recognized with service awards and club milestones. Cocktail food and drinks were provided, and guests had the opportunity to stay and enjoy the tennis for the remainder of the Day session.

FRIENDS OF TENNIS

All Australian Ranking Events and Australian Money Tournaments that were played during January were a part of the TennisFest Program. Events ranged from beginner junior tournaments through to Platinum AMTs with a prizemoney purse of \$10,000.

COUNTRY CARNIVAL
