# **TENNIS AUSTRALIA CEO'S REPORT**



It has truly been a remarkable year.

Together we rose from a pandemic to greater heights and some stunning outcomes.

It started in triumph with Ash Barty following in the footsteps of her long-time friend and mentor, Evonne Goolagong Cawley, to become the first Australian woman to win Wimbledon in 41 years. The world No.1 went onto claim the singles and doubles titles in Adelaide before becoming the first Aussie to win on home soil since 1978. A victory watched by more than 4.261 million

Australian viewers... and unbeknownst to any of us, her final match. What a way to mark 100 years since women first competed in the Australasian Championships.

Dylan Alcott also soared. With victories in every Grand Slam quad wheelchair singles event and another gold medal at the Tokyo Paralympics, the much-loved Melburnian became the first man in tennis to win a Golden Slam. His achievements on and off the court were recognized in January when he was named Australian of the Year.

A 14-strong team of players represented Australia in Tokyo at the Olympic and Paralympic Games, where Ash teamed with John Peers to win bronze in mixed doubles, and Dylan and Heath Davidson combined superbly to claim the silver medal in doubles.

In January world-class tennis returned to Sydney, Adelaide, Melbourne and regional Victoria and the 157 Aussie players who competed did not disappoint with Thanasi Kokkinakis winning his maiden ATP title in front of a home crowd Adelaide.

John Peers took home the doubles crown in Sydney and Dylan Alcott claimed his final quad singles title at the Victorian Wheelchair Open before teaming up with Heath Davidson to win the doubles.

The Australian Open was one for

the history books with Ash's win immediately followed by Thanasi Kokkinakis and Nick Kyrgios defeating fellow Aussies Matt Ebden and Max Purcell to claim the men's doubles title.

The new Competitive Play Framework also launched in January to make it easier for players to understand their level on the pathway and find competitive opportunities most suited to their standard. The number of endorsed events increased 70 per cent in the first six months to more than 300 with 11,934 players competing.

A new qualification criteria was introduced for National Junior Championships and more than 150 upand-coming tennis players represented their state at the annual junior team competition with a further 131 players competing in Canberra in the Claycourt

Nationals.

During the year, more than 5000 young players are in Talent Development programs around Australia with 40 players aged between 15 and 23 qualifying for the National Tennis Academy. Another 760 girls went to Female in Tennis development camps –getting quality coaching in sync with trends and tactics of the modern women's game.

The Australian player success inspired many of us onto the court during the year, participation growing 14 per cent to 1.514 million with a 20 per cent increase in the number of adults playing the sport. Our Schools Program celebrated being the number one delivered Sporting Schools program for the sixth year in a row.

Play.Tennis.com.au continues to be

fundamental to growing the game with traffic to the website increasing 605 per cent during January 2022 and more than 75 per cent of the Australian population able to book a court online within 15 kilometres of their homes.

Tennis Hot Shots had 634,473 kids participating while our Tennis in Schools program continues to be the No.1 requested and delivered sport as part of the Sporting Schools initiative. And another 40,000 kids across Australia enjoyed AO Holiday Programs delivered by 275 coaches at 450 venues during January.

Whether they are developing the next elite athlete, teaching a young kid to hold a racquet for the first time or out there on tour, the connection between a coach and their player is something that remains constant. It takes dedicated coaches to spark the passion for tennis and our 3200 coach members are the

driving force behind the growth of our tennis programs.

Australian Francois Vogelsberger was awarded the International Tennis Federation's Wheelchair Tennis Coach of the Year. Vogelsberger was recognised for his work with Dylan Alcott and Heath Davidson, who were both top 10-ranked players in the quad wheelchair division. He also won the Australian Tennis Award for Coaching Excellence in Performance.

Tennis continues to deliver coach education courses facilitated by a qualified team. More than 600 coaches have enrolled in courses over the past 12 months. Another 630 tennis Coaches from 31 countries participated in the virtual Grand Slam Coaches Conference, featuring 49 world class presenters from 13 countries.

Coach Connect launches to engage, educate and connect, focused on the recruitment and retention of female coaches. 200+ participants have enrolled in mentoring, workshops and networks since its inception. And in May, the Women Leaders in Tennis program consisting of formal learning, networking and mentoring opportunities launched. The program has been developed to help build the confidence and competence of current and emerging leaders.

We continued to foster safe, inclusive tennis venues that thrive in their respective communities. A national education and awareness campaign called A Safer Game Plan launched in October 2021 and more than 400 staff members and 788 Club administrators, TA Coach Members and Officials attend a series of safeguarding children training workshops.

Since 2007, more than \$29 million has been invested into facility development as part of the National Court Rebate





initiative, partnering with all levels of government and the local community to generate over \$430 million in investment over this period (excluding major event venues). This included helping more than 20 flood-affected venues which are being supported with their clean-up efforts and to get them back up and running.

The HIT tool helps improve the experience and accessibility of reporting on the performance of tennis venues nationwide. Venue reporting information is now entered via online forms and submitted directly into the HIT platform, ensuring greater data accuracy and richer insights.

The community spirit of tennis continues to thrive largely due to the support and dedication of over 25,000 passionate volunteers. To complement their work, initiatives like the National Hitting Wall project and Women Leaders in Tennis program create opportunities within local communities to both support and encourage grassroots access to the sport, as well as to foster diverse community engagement.

An artistic initiative to showcase hitting walls around the country as part of a push to increase community participation in tennis. The national project sees walls redesigned by local artists in every state and territory. With

more than 450 hitting walls at affiliated venues and clubs across Australia, and hundreds more in community parks and public settings, hitting against a wall is a great way for people of all ages to have fun, stay active and improve their tennis skills.

As the traditional game continues to grow, so too do new and emerging formats. More than 10,000 Australian Open fans got to experience Padel, POP and Beach Tennis in 2022. These formats offer exciting scope to broaden the reach of traditional tennis, and to engage both existing players as well as brand new participants.

We recognize the opportunity and responsibility we have to harness the power of tennis to champion equality, sustainability, mental health and wellbeing. Some of the initiatives introduced this past year include holding the first AO Pride Day which saw more than 140 LGBTQ+ players from around Australia compete in the AO Glam Slam presented by Ralph Lauren with the finals held on Kia Arena.

The inaugural AO First Nations Day was also held with a Koorie Heritage Cultural Walk from Birrarung Marr. Yolngu man, Baker Boy performed on Rod Laver Arena before the night session.

As we reflect on this remarkable

12 months and look to the future, we should be proud of all that we achieved during this time. We made use of every moment spent off the court as a result of the pandemic to dive deeply into our coaching and competitive play ecosystems around Australia and start building plans for ongoing improvement.

Our engagement with coaches and the playing community throughout this process highlighted the importance of building stronger relationships, finding improved ways to connect, learning from each other's experiences and planning together for the future of our game. A future that looks brighter each day.

# **TENNIS SA PRESIDENT'S REPORT**



On behalf of the Tennis SA Board, I am pleased to present the President's Report for the 2021–22 financial year, the seventh of my term. Well, what an exciting and challenging year it has been with the incredible highs of not one, but two weeks of Adelaide International Men's and Women's tournaments,

balanced by the ongoing impacts on tennis caused by the global COVID pandemic.

I can report the Board met each month during the year, except January, and discharged its governance obligations with diligence and enthusiasm. I thank my fellow Board members for their outstanding commitment, in an entirely voluntary capacity, to the sport of tennis in South Australia. A very big thank you to Philip Roberts for his most significant effort as Vice President during another hectic year. At the end of the financial year, the Board said farewell to Roger Sanderson as he completed his term and welcomed Brandon Oster as our newest Board member

As you read this report, we will be near completion of the third stage of capital works at Memorial Drive, which has been possible due to \$47.1 million in grant funding from the Government

of South Australia. Physical work commenced in March 2021 with the marvellous fabric roof over the Sunken Show Court and new South Stand seating completed in time for the 2022 Adelaide International. Brand new stateof-the-art north and east grandstands joined by a concourse with fantastic spectator, player, staff and volunteer facilities about to be completed. Tennis SA has rebranded the venue as 'The Drive' to acknowledge the rich history both for tennis and other entertainment that many of us grew up with and fondly remember. I greatly appreciate the effort that many people have put in over a significant period to reach this point including Vice President Philip Roberts and the project team ably led by Lynton Franzi, Cox Architecture, Kennett Builders and many partners. I am positive all South Australians will be extremely proud of what is being built, as we look forward to welcoming

everyone to The Drive this summer.

Given what was going on with the pandemic, at one stage we were concerned that there would be no professional tennis at Memorial Drive over the summer. Instead, at very late notice, Tennis SA were asked to step up and asked to host two weeks of Adelaide International events due to health restrictions preventing events being run in some other states. I don't think anyone will forget Ash Barty winning the women's title in week one and Thanasi Kokkinakis winning his inaugural ATP Tour title in week two - then going on to win the Australian Open women's singles and men's doubles titles respectively. More details can be found in the CEO report, but I would like to sincerely thank the Government of South Australia, the South Australian Tourism Commission, Debbie Sterrey, Ali MacDonald, our Tennis SA and Tennis Australia event staff and volunteers for the incredible amount of effort they put in to allow players to experience two weeks in wonderful Adelaide and our community to experience double the amount of professional tennis.

Tennis SA's mission is to showcase. promote, develop and manage the game of tennis in South Australia so significant time is spent on policies and activities in support of this. The Tennis SA Board has always seen the objectives of encouraging greater levels of participation, as well as nurturing talented young players in their quest to become their best as complementary elements. Two weeks of the Adelaide International provided a much needed platform to help stimulate both these important areas and I expect tennis in South Australia will see significant benefits over coming years. The Board, CEO and senior staff have also worked on a revised 2022–24 Strategic Plan which will be released shortly.

The National Academy in South Australia is continuing to produce elite young tennis players and the direction taken by Sandon Stolle and the team is proving invaluable, particularly in broadening the base of the talent pool by working directly with our affiliates. Whilst COVID reduced the number of opportunities our players experienced in representing Australia compared to normal years, I would like to acknowledge the following South Australian players for their significant achievements: Charlotte Kempenaers-

Pocz, Diana Badalyan, Filip Fantasia, Hugh Winter, Luke Saville, and Thanasi Kokkinakis. More information on their achievements can be found in the High Performance report.

Given the events restructure and impacts of COVID, the annual edition of the Ken McGregor Fund (KMF) luncheon was not held this year, but I am sure it will return. Instead, the team worked on other opportunities to raise funds for the important work the KMF perform. Thank you to the committee members of the KMF, so well led by Rick Baldock.

Our Diversity and Inclusion Board sub-committee's first pillar of focus some time ago was Gender Equity. Over the past two years, the focus has been on our Indigenous community. We have been focusing on delivering the commitments contained in our first Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RRAP), endorsed by Reconciliation Australia. We are now starting to investigate the next stage of our RRAP, based on innovation. The committee also spent time on the third pillar in our Diversity and Inclusion Strategy of Disability and Accessibility. The committee recognise we have more work to do in achieving some of our Female Leadership KPIs from the Gender pillar and there will be more news on this to follow in the coming year. Thank you to our Diversity and Inclusion sub-committee for their efforts this year.

The Board is mindful Tennis SA is essentially 'owned' by our member Associations. The Board, in various forums, met with Association representatives throughout the year, with the aim of supporting their endeavours at grassroots levels.

On behalf of the Board, I thank the Government of South Australia, Premier Peter Malinauskas, Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing Katrine Hildyard and Kylie Taylor as the Chief Executive Officer for the Office of Recreation, Sport and Racing, for their outstanding support. We have also enjoyed excellent support from the City of Adelaide, the City of Unley, Adelaide Oval Stadium Management Authority, Adelaide Venue Management - in particular Chief Executive Officer Anthony Kirchner, Sport SA, Next Generation Clubs Australia, Memorial Drive Tennis Club and many other organisations.

I thank the Board and staff at Tennis

Australia for continuing to provide funding for a number of our activities and for working so constructively with us. Tennis Australia's ability to fund member states in the 2021–22 financial year decreased slightly due to the cost of running both the 2021 and 2022 Australian Opens, however Tennis Australia and Tennis SA worked in great partnership to minimise the impacts this could have caused in delivering grassroots activities to our members. Our thanks in particular to Craig Tiley and Tom Larner for this.

Our CEO, Debbie Sterrey, has continued to show great leadership and endeavour in all of her activities and has admirably led what we consider our greatest asset, our dedicated staff. Thank you so much Debbie. The relationships our staff have fostered with so many partners are crucial to our success in the development of our sport as well as with the new Adelaide International, so I sincerely thank them for this. I also thank our past players and affiliated Associations and Club representatives with whom we have been able to work so positively with throughout the year.

Thank you for the privilege I enjoy in serving tennis in South Australia as we look forward to another successful year.

# **TENNIS SA CEO'S REPORT**



On behalf of the staff at Tennis SA, I am pleased to present my CEO report in my third year of service for 2021–22.

A constant throughout this financial year has been the redevelopment of the Memorial Drive Centre Courts. With demolition completed in early 2021, construction commenced with the need to be event ready for the Adelaide International in 2022. The construction team worked tirelessly to ensure that we could have the venue in a position to host the tournament before returning to construction mode in late January 2022. Construction continues in mid-2022 with the redevelopment to be completed ahead of the next Adelaide International in January 2023.

In July, we were excited to celebrate the debut of Luke Saville in the Australian Olympic Team. We had planned to turn Cobdogla Primary School green and gold in celebration, however this was unfortunately cancelled due to COVID.

In August, we were proud to launch our Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan as part of the Indigenous Tennis Carnival.

A public event was held at the Tennis SA Clay Courts, with a school event also at Playford Tennis Centre for 160 students in the weeks following. State-based activations took the place of the national event being held in Darwin in 2021.

Our ANZ Tennis Hot Shots District School Carnivals continued to go from strength to strength in the second half of the year, with 44 held around the state. Over 7,960 students picked up a racquet as part of the pathway designed to transition students from interschool sport to their local tennis club.

As part of the national Hitting Wall project, works commenced at Bordertown's Memorial Park Tennis Complex in September. Designed in conjunction with local juniors, South East-based artist Anthony Hamilton created a two-sided mural featuring a solar system theme on one side, with a Bordertown Show theme on the other, both incorporating targets for participants to aim at. The completed artwork was unveiled at an opening ceremony in October.

Two ITF World Tennis Tour events were held at Playford Tennis Centre in September. Edward Winter won backto-back tournaments, while Charlotte Kempenaers-Pocz and Elim Yan won the first and second weeks respectively.

We released our 2021–2024 Strategic Plan in September, with a focus on the five key pillars of Participation, Growth and Retention, Competitive Play, Financial Sustainability, Event Momentum and Organisational Development. The purpose of these pillars is to inspire everyone to enjoy life through tennis.

The State Foundation Cup was held at Berri Tennis Club for the eighth consecutive year in October with the support of new sponsor ANZ Mobile Lending. Hills Fleurieu took home the overall championship after a fantastic week of tennis.

We were thrilled to kick off the Tennis SA State League season with the inaugural Tennis SA State League All Stars team visiting Port Lincoln. The event was a stunning success with players taking part in An Evening with the Stars, Family Fun Day, All Stars match and tourism activities.

Summer competitions also commenced in October, with Tennis SA administering competitions for Southern Districts, Eastern Districts, North East and Great Southern Tennis Associations. Tennis SA State League and Junior State League competitions continued to go from strength to strength.

The ANZ Tennis Hot Shots Racquet Roadshow started in Whyalla in November with Reception students given brand new racquets thanks to ANZ and Tennis Australia. Tennis legends Todd Woodbridge, John Fitzgerald and Casey Dellacqua continued to make virtual appearances and the roadshow went on to deliver over 2,600 racquets to reception students around the state.

With the support of Rally as One and the Australian Tennis Foundation, Cudlee Creek Tennis Club celebrated the opening of their newly redeveloped tennis courts following the devastating bushfires that hit the Adelaide Hills in late 2019. Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing Corey Wingard joined Liberal Candidate for Schubert Ashton Hurn, along with Cudlee Creek Tennis Club, Adelaide Hills Council and Tennis SA representatives, to officially open the courts

The Metro vs Country teams event was held at Tennis World Adelaide in late November with 36 players participating. Country South Australia won the 13/u and 15/u age groups, while Metropolitan South Australia was too strong in the 17/u age group. Country South Australia were crowned overall winners for the second year running.

In mid-December, St Joseph's School Clare and Prince Alfred College were named the 2021 South Australian ANZ Tennis Hot Shots school state champions, after winning their respective competitions at the Tennis SA Clay Courts. The events were the culmination of ANZ Tennis Hot Shots District School Carnivals held around the state throughout 2021.

Six South Australians led the charge for the state at the 2021 Newcombe Medal, Australian Tennis Awards in December. Domenic Marafiote (Coaching Excellence Club), Sam Wall (Coaching Excellence Development), Edward Winter (Junior Athlete of the Year - Male), Andriana Petrakis (Most Outstanding Athlete with a Disability), Cobdogla Primary School (Most Outstanding School) and Broadview Tennis Club (Most Outstanding Club) were named as finalists. The event was



held virtually with Domenic Marafiote, Sam Wall and Cobdogla Primary School winning their respective categories.

The Adelaide International returned to the newly named The Drive with back-to-back tournaments ahead of the Australian Open in January. The first week saw Gael Monfils (FRA) defeat Karen Khachanov (RUS) 6-4 6-4, before Ash Barty claimed what was to be her final WTA Tour title against Elena Rybakina (UKR) 6-3 6-2 to claim the title.

In the second week, Madison Keys defeated fellow American Alison Riske 6-1 6-2 before hometown hero Thanasi Kokkinakis took to the court against Arthur Rinderknech (FRA) 6-7(6) 7-6(5) 6-3 in front of raucous and adoring home crowd. The sound and scenes were truly a sight to behold.

Our sincere thanks to the South Australian Government and South Australian Tourism Commission for their unwavering support and their vision to bring international tennis back to South Australia.

Unfortunately, COVID continued to cause problems and resulted in Country Carnival being cancelled and our Regional State Teams not being able to compete in Queensland during January.

Thanasi went on to win the Australian Open men's doubles crown with Nick Kyrgios later in the month, while Charlotte Kempenaers-Pocz had a fabulous run to reach the girls' singles semi-finals.

As part of Rally as One, Tennis SA team joined with the Adelaide Hills community at the Mount Torrens Tennis Club and Football Oval in February for a day of ANZ Tennis Hot Shots, social tennis, fun activations, raffles and giveaways.

Adelaide Payneham Tennis Club claimed their first Tennis SA Junior State League premierships following an action-packed Friday evening at Next Generation Memorial Drive. Tea Tree Gully Tennis Club won their first men's title in 17 years, while Glenlea Tennis Club claimed a three-peat with a hard-fought win in the women's as the Tennis SA State League grand finals took place.

In March, Glenlea Tennis Club and East

We celebrated the year that was at the Tennis SA Awards Night, held at the Adelaide Convention Centre in late April. This evening celebrated the outstanding achievements of our players, coaches, clubs, communities, volunteers and officials.

The UTR Pro Tennis Series hit Memorial Drive in May. Dayne Kelly won back-to-back titles, with Katherine Westbury and Monique Barry claiming the week one and two titles respectively

The Indigenous Tennis Carnival events wrapped up the events for the financial year with a public event held at the Tennis SA Clay Courts before a school event at Playford Tennis Centre. A team of eight players were selected to represent South Australia at the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival to be held in

Darwin in August.

It goes without saying that the last few years have been difficult for everyone. We thank our clubs and associations for their cooperation and understanding as we have continued to navigate the situation at hand.

I would like to thank Tennis SA President - Kent Thiele, Vice President -Philip Roberts and the entire Tennis SA Board for their support throughout the year.

# MEMORIAL DRIVE CENTRE COURT REDEVELOPMENT





\$44 million in funding for stage two of the Memorial Drive Centre Court redevelopment was announced as part of the Government of South Australia's budget in November 2020.

Construction commenced in mid-2021 with a strict timeline to ensure the venue was event ready in time for the Adelaide International in

Kennett Builders led the project, working tirelessly to ensure that

the venue could be taken out of construction mode for a month to accommodate the Adelaide International.

While the Memorial Drive Centre Court redevelopment took place, a secondary project got underway to build a roof over the Sunken Show Court. This project was completed in December 2021.

As the Adelaide International got underway, 'The Drive' was revealed as the new name of the home of

tennis in South Australia.

Construction recommenced late in January 2022 and will be completed in time for the Adelaide International in 2023. The upgrade of the venue will allow The Drive to host a wider variety of community, sporting and entertainment events, as well as make the venue an attractive proposition for other high profile tennis events such as Davis Cup and Billie Jean King Cup (formerly Fed Cup).



# **TOURNAMENTS REPORT**

# THE NEW LOOK COMPETITIVE PLAY EVENTS

2021–22 saw a new era of competitive tennis introduced across the country. Australian Ranking tournaments concluded on 31 December 2021, with the introduction of the new Australian Competitive Play Framework from 1 January 2022. Universal Tennis Rating (UTR) became the primary rating method used for all events across Australia, for acceptance and seeds.

The Australian Pro Tour was suspended for the remainder of 2021, therefore, no Pro Tour events were held in South Australia. UTR Pro Tennis Series events continued to provide playing opportunities to those unable to travel overseas and compete due to COVID. Memorial Drive hosted back-to-back UTR Pro Tennis Tour Events in May 2022.

# JUNIOR AND OPEN TOURNAMENTS

Between July-December 2021, 16 Junior Australian Ranking Tournaments were offered to players across South Australia. 2138 participants were involved in these tournaments over the six months, an increase of 462 compared to the first six months of the year.

On 1 January 2022, Australian Competitive Play Events were introduced. 28 endorsed Junior Events took place over the first six months of 2022, with participants totalling 1739, a retention rate of 76% compared to the first six months of 2021. Due to the increase in events offered, the average number of players per event fell 36% on average. Regional events were once again held in Renmark, Mount Gambier and Port Pirie as a part of there Foundation Cup pathway. Strathalbyn also hosted a very successful Queen's Birthday Long Weekend event which had 188 entries.

Seven Australian Money Tournaments (AMT) were held in the second half of 2021 with an additional five Open Series Events held in 2022. A total of \$53,500 in prizemoney was earnt by players.

#### **JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT SERIES**

14 Junior Development Series events were scheduled between August 2021–February 2022. Metropolitan numbers decreased to an average of 61 players per event while regional numbers were slightly higher than the previous year, averaging 71 players per event. Regional

Junior Development Series events were held in Barmera, Lucindale and Port Lincoln, with all regions using these events as a part of their Foundation Cup pathway.

## UTR PRO TENNIS SERIES - NEXT GENERATION MEMORIAL DRIVE

Two UTR Pro Tennis Series events were held back-to-back at Next Generation Memorial Drive from 9–22 May 2022. The UTR Pro Tennis Tour events were introduced following the successful rollout of the tour in 2020. The format featured a singles only competition for men and women based on Universal Tennis Ratings (UTR) and featured a player group round robin followed by a World Cup-style playoff format.

In week one, Dayne Kelly (Vic) defeated Ashwin Vijayaragavan (SA) 6-2 6-1 to win the men's tournament. In the women's, Katherine Westbury (NZL) defeated Taylah Lawless (NSW) 6-4 7-5 to take the win.

In week two, Kelly defeated Ken Cavrak (Vic) 6-3 6-3 to claim back-toback wins. In the women's final, Monique Barry (NL) defeated week one winner Katherine Westbury (NZL) 6-3 6-3 to take the win.



#### **ITF JUNIORS**

Tennis SA and Tennis Australia, in conjunction with Playford Tennis Centre, hosted back to back Grade 5 ITF World Tennis Tour events from 11–24 September 2021. The two events, Adelaide Junior International and South Australian Junior International, saw around 120 18-and-under players visit Adelaide during the two week period.

South Australian juniors Edward Winter and Charlotte Kempenaers-Pocz took out the week one titles at the South Australian Junior International. Top seed Winter defeated Hayden Jones (Qld) 6-1 6-0, while in an all-South Australian showdown, Kempenaers-Pocz defeated Elim Yan 7-6(4) 7-5.

Winter went on to claim back-to-back titles defeating Hayden Jones (Qld) 6-4

6-2 in the week two final. In the girls', after finishing runner up in week one, Yan overcame top seed Lily Fairclough (WA) in a tight match 7-5 2-6 6-1 to claim her maiden ITF World Tennis Tour Junior title.

#### **BALLKIDS**

There were 160 expressions of interest to be a Ballkid at the 2022 Adelaide International. Due to training commitments, vaccination policies, age criteria and the 2022 Adelaide International being confirmed two months before the event was held, only 105 participated during the week.

Ballkids attended a minimum of two and maximum of four training sessions in the second half of 2021. Ballkids were provided with one hat, two shirts, one pair of shorts and a water bottle as uniform for the tournament. They had to provide their own shoes and white crew length socks. Lunches and dinner were also provided to Ballkids for the duration of the event. There was a pizza night and a food voucher given for Ballkids to use at the food trucks on one of the nights. This provided variety in the Ballkids meals throughout the two-week event.

Each Ballkid rostered on Centre Court was allocated one complimentary ticket per shift, and for Ballkids rostered on outside courts, they were given two complimentary tickets per shift. These were used by parents who were very appreciative.







# **COMPETITIONS REPORT**

#### **STATE LEAGUE**

The 2021–22 State League season was another strong display of high-level tennis played between the best players in South Australia. Eight teams competed in the State League men's competition and six teams in the women's competition.

In the men's competition, Tea Tree Gully and Seaside earned their way into the grand final. In a very tense affair, Tea Tree Gully were able to secure their first win in 17 years after winning three of the singles rubbers and winning a set in both of the doubles rubbers to clinch the State League men's premiership.

In the women's competition, it was again Glenlea and Seacliff in the grand final. In a hard fought contest that came down to a doubles super tiebreak, Glenlea were able to stand strong and

secure their third consecutive State League women's premiership.

Ashwin Vijayaragavan from Tea Tree Gully won the men's State League Player of the Year, while Cydney Crumbie from Seacliff won the women's award.

The girls' competition consisted of eight teams with four making the finals. Glenlea and Athelstone were both able to win their way through to the grand final. In a tight matchup, Glenlea were able to remain composed winning five rubbers to one securing the Junior State League girls' premiership.

Noah Coghlan from Peake Gardens Riverside won the boys' Junior State League Player of the Year while Caitlin Baker from Seacliff won the girls' Junior State League Player of the Year.

# TOURNAMENT, EVENT AND COMPETITION SERVICING

Tennis SA was able to meet service requirements at all Australian Ranking Tournaments, Junior, and Open Series events, including in regional areas (Barmera, Berri, Mount Gambier, and Port Pirie).

Tennis SA continued to service tournaments and events with Chair Umpires and Line Umpires at a 90% efficiency rate.

The minimum servicing of these tournaments with referees and court supervisors was also met, with the integration of Court Monitors continuing.

Court Supervisors were also used at all State League men's and women's minor round matches, as well as Chair and Line Umpires for the grand finals.

Officials were also used at various junior association events as well as the Junior State League grand final.

#### **POLICY EDUCATION**

The position of the Policy and Education Officer is designed to guide and educate clubs throughout South Australia in implementing policies approved by Boards at both national and state level ensuring tennis is played in a safe and enjoyable environment.

Tennis SA worked closely with the Tennis Australia Integrity department to ensure a high level of child safety in the South Australian tennis community Venue Supervisor training was conducted to several junior associations giving clubs the confidence to enable a safe environment for all junior players to participate in.

Parent Expectations training commenced at the younger junior level at Super 10s tryouts. This is a combined initiative of Tennis SA and Tennis Australia Officiating, along with the High Performance team.

Support was provided to clubs and other South Australian tennis stakeholders on complaint handling and minor matters.

Compliance with national policies and state government legislation through appropriate screening and Child Safe Environments further accentuate the emphasis on all participants feeling safe in our tennis environments.

Working with Children Legislation implemented by the Government of South Australia was communicated to all Clubs and Associations in South Australia in accordance with child protection in tennis.

The Member Protection, Safeguarding Children Code of Conduct, and Code of Behaviour Policies were also enforced through investigation, management and support of player, parent, and spectator behaviour.



# TENNIS DEVELOPMENT REPORT

#### **AFFILIATION AND MEMBERSHIP**

Tennis SA had a total of 319 affiliates in 2021–22 comprising of 40 associations, 257 clubs, 19 sporting complexes and three schools. Pleasing to note new affiliates Burra and Districts Tennis Association, Birdwood Tennis Club, Borrika Tennis Club and Tintinara Tennis Club joining Tennis SA for the 2021–22 season. Tennis SA continues to adopt the per court affiliation model and is continually looking at adding benefits to all affiliates.

Tennis SA and our affiliates registered a total of 15,722 club members over the 2021/22 season.

#### **ORGANISATION STRUCTURE**

The Tennis Development Team led by Matthew Fitzgerald (Head of Tennis Development and Venues) went through another challenging year with further changes in 2021–22. James Pick taking on the responsibility of looking after the metro and country teams whilst we were still navigating through the challenging environment that COVID presented us

with

James has done an amazing job leading his team consisting of Troy McNeil (School Development Coordinator), Adrian Dezen (Club Development Officer Metro South), Sarah Horgan (Club Development and Facilities Metro North), Hayley Allen (Regional Officer South East) and Giles Ellis (Regional Officer North West)

Sadly, Giles left Tennis SA in late 2021 to take on a new opportunity in his hometown of Wallaroo. We wish Giles all the best on his new career path. But as

the old saying goes, one door shuts and another one opens, and we welcomed Jess Gardner to the team in early 2022 into the Regional Officer North West role.

Hayley Allen welcomed a beautiful baby girl into their family, with Hayley now on maternity leave, Luke Taylor from the Tournaments and Competitions Team has come into the role of Regional Officer South East in a 12 month secondment role. We know Luke will hold down the fort well in Hayley's absence.

Shane Leathem was promoted into the role of School and Pathways Lead. Shane has continued to grow in his new role this past year and has shown huge growth in the Diversity and Inclusion sector.

Shane leads the team consisting of Amy Sneath (Women and Girls, Program Pathway Coordinator) and during this period we also welcomed Corey Tugwell as a Schools Trainee. Corey was a part of the university placement program in 2020. It was fantastic to see Corey secure a traineeship with Tennis SA, further acknowledgement that the pathway created through this initiative is alive and well

# CLUB DEVELOPMENT OFFICERS AND REGIONAL OFFICERS

The role of Club Development Officer (CDO) and Regional Officer (RO) are to work collaboratively with our affiliated clubs and members to improve the delivery of tennis at grassroots level.

The CDO/RO is the first point of call to assist clubs in growing participation, improving facilities, volunteer support, club/coach support, system support and much more.

Looking after the metropolitan clubs (CDO) are Adrian Dezen, who currently looks after clubs in Metro South consisting of 56 clubs across seven Associations and Sarah Horgan looking after Metro North consisting of 57 clubs across five Associations.

Looking after our country clubs (RO) we have Jess Gardner looking after Country North West consisting of 87 clubs across 18 Associations and Luke Taylor looking after Country South East consisting of 78 clubs across 11 Associations. The Regional Officers also travelled approximately 18,000kms throughout the year visiting clubs and promoting tennis in their regions.

Our clubs team conducted 450 club visits (previous year 385). The purpose of these visits is to build strong relationships



administration duties and help connect them to their participants by providing a platform that creates more opportunities to find, access and participate in tennis – more easily and more often.

The Tennis Development team has been working collaboratively with our affiliated clubs to get them digitally enabled. Tennis SA is pleased to report we now have 139 clubs utilising the website module and a further 164 clubs using the membership module.

ClubSpark has been a wonderful addition for clubs by providing simple to use tools to manage memberships, club events, news and website updates just to name a few.

#### **DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION**

A big focus for the team at Tennis SA has been to improve accessibility and options to all people irrespective of their background. This led to a structural change in the organisation with Amy Sneath moving into the newly created Women and Girls and Program Pathways Coordinator position.

The role of the Women and Girls Program Pathway Coordinator is to deliver national initiatives to help increase the participation and opportunities for women and girls across the state.

Two regional Female in Tennis Development Camps were held in Naracoorte and McLaren Vale where 45 girls aged 10-14 participated in a full day of structured activities. These camps were designed to provide regional athletes with the opportunity to connect and to explore their strengths both on and off the tennis court.

Two South Australian clubs took part in a new pilot called 'Tennis Match-Ups' which is designed to bring more girls into tennis for their first competitive experience. 19 girls participated in a six week program which involved competitive round robin doubles play introducing them to scoring and match play in a fun and safe environment.

Tennis recognises the importance of having a strong women coaching network as an imperative part of increasing participation particularly among girls, in our clubs. 'Coach Connect' is a national initiative which aims to engage, educate and connect women coaches across the country through mentoring and professional development opportunities. 17 female SA coaches attended the first networking event and workshop during the Adelaide International. Nine coaches have registered on Mentorloop where they have been assigned a mentor who they work with to receive guidance and one-on-one support to help build their capabilities in both professional and

personal settings.

The inaugural Women Leaders in Tennis Program also launched where 24 women comprising of club committee members and coaches have started their 4-month journey working through the leadership program. This program is a fantastic opportunity for women leaders in SA to build their networks and grow in their confidence and competence across three areas; Leading Self, Leading Others and Leading Change.

Tennis SA were very excited to introduce the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival-SA during September 2021 and June 2022. The four events held at the Tennis SA Clay Courts and Playford Tennis Centre saw 245 participants across the four events take part in a range of tennis and cultural activities. The success of these events saw Tennis SA select a team of eight Indigenous athletes to represent South Australia at the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival in Darwin, building on the three athletes from 2019 when the event was last held. Tennis SA proudly introduced their Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) through an ever strengthening relationship with Reconciliation SA.

In September 2021, Tennis SA was proud to be a part of the Blind Sports Camp running a day of Tennis at Somerton Park Tennis Club for students

with our affiliates and Thriving
Tennis Communities. Thriving Tennis
Communities is an initiative that sees
Tennis partnering with local stakeholders,
to foster safe, inclusive, and playful clubs
that thrive in their local communities.

# SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT COORDINATORS

Key responsibilities of the School
Development Coordinator are to drive
greater participation in tennis and a
deeper engagement of the education
sector at local levels. The role is integral
in building sustainable pathways
from schools to club-based tennis.
Driving quality and consistency of
program delivery and linking directly to
Government school initiatives designed
to entrench tennis into school culture and
curriculum.

Our School Development team consists of Troy McNeil and Corey Tugwell. Tennis SA are pleased to report we had 237 primary schools registered as part of the Australian Sports Commission Sporting Schools (Partnership and Play program) during 2021–22. Tennis SA also had 32 registered secondary schools. Through these programs, Tennis SA engaged 44,142 students.

Tennis SA held 44 school carnivals across the state. An incredible result with 7,960 Year 3/4 and 5/6 students participated in the carnivals from 160 different schools. The finalist for the Year 3/4 carnivals, Prince Alfred College and St Josephs (Clare) competed for the title during the Adelaide International with Prince Alfred College winning the 2021 title.

Tennis SA also delivered 2707 racquets to reception students across the state through the Tennis Australia Tennis Hot Shots program, with the goal of breaking down barriers for reception students to get involved in Tennis.

#### **SYSTEMS**

ClubSpark is a venue management platform that tennis clubs in Australia have access to utilising. Used by thousands of tennis clubs around the world, it is designed to simplify a club's







who are blind or have low vision. 35 students took part in the day with many participating in one of the only junior tournaments for blind and low vision athletes in the world during the year. This could not have been possible without the support of the South Australian School for Vision Impaired, who consequently were a finalist for Most Outstanding School at the Tennis SA Awards Night.

Whilst COVID postponed the Blind and Low Vision State Champs we were able to have eight of our elite athletes play in an exhibition tournament at the Lightsview Community Centre run by State Coach Nicholas Bradley. One of these athletes, Ethan Cooke, went on to win the Most Outstanding Athlete with a Disability at the Tennis SA Awards Night on the back of some outstanding achievements.

Due to the success of these events we launched the Northern Hub at Hope Valley Tennis Club through club coach Josh Crowe. This provides greater opportunities for students who are blind or have low vision and compliments the offering at Somerton Park Tennis Club. As well as this, blind and low vision sessions have started at the Renmark Tintra Lawn Tennis Club through coach John Pick. These sessions provide opportunity to students all across the Riverland and further showcase the increase in opportunities to all.

Tennis SA aim to provide students with an Intellectual Disability opportunity to participate and continue playing tennis. Through our Movement Disorder Foundation Gala Days we were able to provide 66 students the opportunity to do so. A newly formed high performance state squad for players with an intellectual disability and who are deaf or hard of hearing has launched and will be held fortnightly, led by coach Lance Everett. This initiative has seen five participants enrol into the squad with growth expected throughout the remainder of 2022.

Tennis continues to activate the wheelchair space with coach development workshops, having the first wheelchair tennis activation at the Adelaide International and promoting Craig Palfrey at the Woodville Orion Tennis Club, South Australia's wheelchair tennis hub.

#### **COURT HIRE**

Tennis SA is pleased to report we have 23 clubs offering digital court hire across South Australia. This has resulted in a 65% increase in online bookings with \$34,640 in revenue secured for our clubs and total of 6,509 bookings were made in 2021-22.

There are currently three options for clubs wanting to adopt the digital court hire software in ClubSpark.

The first being Book a Court which is an online court booking and payment platform, which is integrated with pin pad technology placed on a court entry gate. When players book and pay for court hire online, they receive a PIN that allows them to access their court and turn on court lighting if required.

The system aims to provide flexibility and ease of access to players wishing



to hire a tennis court, while increasing court hire revenue and decreasing the administration burden on club volunteers.

The second option is through the Igloohome lock system. Tennis Australia has teamed up with Igloohome to provide a cost-effective solution to tennis clubs for electronic gate access. The Igloohome lock is integrated with the ClubSpark software that enables players to simply book and pay online and receive a 9-digit pin that provide them with access to the tennis courts at the time of their booking.

The third option is purely ClubSpark software only, however this option requires gates to be open at all times or a club member/coach at the courts to ensure access is available for the online booking. This option can be used for clubs that have a council open court policy for their courts.

All three options give clubs the opportunity to open their courts up outside their usual membership base and promote online during local and national marketing campaigns. As a reference

total searches on play.tennis.com.au in SA went up a massive 262.2% from the previous year. This demonstrates that our local consumers are looking for more playing opportunities and the more clubs we have visible online, the best chance we have to secure these participants across our clubs through court hire, coaching and program offerings.





# **COACH DEVELOPMENT REPORT**

In another 12 months impacted by COVID, we are grateful that coaches have come through having lost very little time on court and are now experiencing a boom in enquiries for new and existing players.

With this increase in enquiries, the need for more assistant coaches is at an all time high. This has lead to an increase in the number of courses being offered and the number of participants participating in those courses. All of the recent courses and workshops have been conducted at Tennis World, Millswood due to the redevelopment at Memorial Drive with no or little inconvenience to the coaching fraternity.

In the last year there have been four Foundation Coaching Courses (one day

course), this course targets the younger school aged tennis players that are looking at helping at their club and gaining some practical teaching experience in coaching.

There have been four Community
Coaching Courses (formerly a three day course, now run over two longer days), generally a slightly different demographic attend this course, more university aged students and parents that are looking to help around their club or understand more of the Tennis Australia coaching philosophy with regards to Hot Shot aged children (aged 4-12). Coaches that complete either of the courses will be deemed as Trainee coach members.

The Junior Development Coaching course has been offered to coaches both

on a Monday and on Sunday. This course is conducted over 17 days face to face with successful candidates becoming qualified Tennis Australia coach members. The Monday course appeals to coaches that are currently working at a club for a coach, the course starts at 8:00 am and finishes at 2:00 pm which allows the coaches time to get back to their club to commence work that evening. The Sunday course is for those people that currently work, attending school or University and unable to commit to a weekday. Between the two courses there are 18 coaches participating in this level of qualification.

The Club Professional Course is now wrapping up from last year, and historically this course is run every second year. It is anticipated that this course will go ahead again in 2022–23.

The total number of coaches for the 2021–22 year has jumped slightly to 220, the break down is 52 Business members, 79 Qualified members and 89 Trainee members. A large jump in the number of Trainee members is attributed to the need for assistant coaches. There has also been a fantastic offer by Tennis Australia to allow Business members to sign their assistant coaches as Trainee members for no cost. These trainees are still required to provide the same level of compliance (National Police Check and Working With Children Clearance) as all other coach members.

As always there is a strong emphasis on Professional Development for the coaches to ensure that Tennis Australia coach members remain as world leaders in tennis coaching. Tennis Australia's coaching pathway is an ITF Gold Level standard and recognised worldwide for it's contemporary coaching philosophy.

Once again, slightly compromised by COVID, 13 workshops were delivered (three regionally) last year in the state. For a second year, the Grand Slam Coaches Conference was conducted virtually with a range of world class speakers, many of

our local coaches able to log in and watch presenters either live or a recording of some outstanding topics.

Similar to 2020, a local conference was also held in conjunction with the Adelaide International tournament where coaches were able to hear four esteemed coaches discussing the theme of the Conference "See the level, know the level". This was followed by two ATP/WTA coaches talking about coaching on the tour before concluding with Phil Smyth (five time Olympian - basketball) talk about his experience in mentoring coaches and players, in particular his current work with Darren Cahill. There were 39 coaches attend this event in which they heard some great speakers, had a great networking opportunity, before being able to walk around the outside courts and watch world class tennis.

Prior to the Adelaide International starting, there was a Women in Tennis networking event, held court side with 17 female coaches attending, listening and participating in a great workshop environment, lead by Australia's Billie Jean Cup coach, Nicole Pratt. This was one of many Women and Girls in tennis events held throughout the year.

With an emphasis on the Coach Development team visiting coaches in the own club environment to listen to concerns, assist with problems, hear good news stories and in conjunction with the Club Development team, make coaches and clubs successful. During the last year there were 38 coach check ins (nine regional).

Part of the engagement with coaches (and clubs) has seen a rise in the number of Club/Coach agreements being finalized which helps in making the tennis industry a more professional and respected profession. The agreement is beneficial in defining each parties responsibilities at the club, outlining the tenure of the arrangement, giving all concerned a sense of security.

Going forward, there is a great opportunity for tennis coaches to benefit from the current increase in all things tennis (coaching and competition).

# MARKETING AND COMMUNICATIONS REPORT



The last financial year has seen tennis continue to adapt and thrive through this new COVID landscape. Tennis by its nature is socially distance, which has meant more people have been out on court than ever before.

We launched our financial year with the new strategic plan- setting us up with a clear direction and five strategic pillars to focus on from 2021–24. Our purpose is to inspire everyone to enjoy life through tennis. We are committed to helping our tennis community thrive, and to provide ongoing support so our clubs and courts are open, accessible, and inclusive for all. Quite simply we want to help more people play more often.

The Marketing and Communications team have focused strongly on grassroots this year and the delivering of great content to promote and grow tennis in South Australia. In the last twelve months we have created and delivered more than ten pieces of video content to help us increase the promotion of tennis in our state. From our school carnivals, social and club offerings, to our competitive play, and through to the Adelaide International, it is important for us to continue to highlight the many ways you can engage in tennis.

The Tennis SA Awards Night was another key highlight in the tennis calendar, with 329 guests in attendance, an approximate 6.5% increase from the previous year. We were delighted to also receive over 60 nominations showing that tennis is thriving and growing in our state. It was incredible to see so many in the tennis community celebrating after two hard years of COVID restrictions.

We were also excited to deliver our State League finals and Junior State League Awards and finals in March, live streamed for the first time as part of our strategy to increase the profile of our top local players. With this in mind, we also embarked upon the Tennis SA State League All Stars

Tennis SA, in conjunction with the City of Port Lincoln, Port Lincoln Tennis Association and Elderton Wines, hosted the inaugural event in Port Lincoln on Saturday 9 October. The state's highest level competition visited regional South Australia for the first time, with eight Tennis SA State League players joining six local tennis players to create Team Red and Team Blue.

The inaugural National Indigenous
Tennis Carnival SA was held on 19 June
at the Clay Courts in North Adelaide,
and on 30 June at the Playford Tennis
Centre. The event saw Indigenous youth
take part in both tennis and cultural
activities. We were privileged to win the
South Australian Sports Reconciliation
Award.

As part of our focus on inclusion and diversity, we worked to launch our Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan, endorsed by Reconciliation Australia and Reconciliation SA. Our RRAP uses the four core pillars of relationships, respect, opportunities and governance to provide a framework with the aim of ensuring that tennis is a sport accessible to all. Our vision is to ensure that tennis is accessible, and brings communities together and provides more opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples to participate and engage in our sport.

Our support for grassroots tennis and clubs has seen the introduction of Club Support Guides for our tennis development team to educate affiliates on the benefits our team can provide and the tools they can access to increase people playing. Tennis Design Hub is our design platform we can access to increase the profile of clubs, and deliver to them marketing materials for any programs, coaching needs, club competitions, social events and more.

We have also started to deliver Local



Area Marketing Plans, assisting clubs with social media audits, brand identity, and focused marketing to reach their desired goals.

The Adelaide International marketing campaign was focused on ticket sales across two weeks of events this year. With uncertainty around boarders and the calendar of events, our team focused heavily on digital media to promote our COVID safe events and world class tennis being back in Adelaide, and for two weeks. With Ash Barty winning week one and Thanasi Kokkinakis taking out week two, our finals nights were the best sellers and the atmosphere was amazing. To deliver two weeks of

tennis action was an unbelievable effort, and our team was responsible for the management of all media, socials and content, event signage, entertainment including Kids Zone and the Racquets and Strings Festival, TennisFest, Centre Court management and production, and fundraisers and events, making for another exciting experience for all involved.

Finally, we were very excited to launch The Drive. Fresh off the \$44m redevelopment, The Drive is back with a new story to tell. Our new venue enriched in tennis history is soon to be ready for new memories, with three champion-sized tennis courts, a high

performance gym, new North and East Stands with premium office space, plus the Courtside Room – our new functions space overlooking the East of the City and the River Torrens.

During the 2021–22 financial year, the Tennis SA website had over 72,700 users which totalled to an excess of 293,400 total pageviews. Throughout this period, our website saw over 22,300 (26.6%) of users return to our website, engaging 61,500+ new users (73.4%). Our homepage had the highest number of views, with over 53,400 (18.2%) clicks. Following this, our Competitions Results was the most popular subpage, receiving over 23,100 views (7.87%).

# ADELAIDE INTERNATIONAL REPORT

Once again South Australia demonstrated that we can deliver major events during challenging times and that the public will come out and support the Adelaide International.

In January 2022, the Adelaide International delivered not one week but two weeks. With the help of the Government of South Australia, SA Health, SAPOL and our key partners we were able to deliver an international event safely and with no incident. The two weeks of international professional tennis delivered a huge economic impact at a time when the event suppliers had been starved of major work. In 2022, The Adelaide International as an event booked over 6.000 hotel room nights across 18 days. Once again, we had fantastic feedback from the players, broadcasters, media, support teams, officials and various suppliers from

interstate and overseas. Supported by a venue that is currently being upgraded (and will be ready for January 2023), our guests enjoyed the world class precinct that is created by working collaboratively with Adelaide Oval, Tennis SA, Next Generation Memorial Drive and Memorial Drive Tennis Club.

A short stroll from the hotel to the venue combined with our friendly and professional staff and volunteers has quickly resulted in Adelaide becoming a favourite for the ATP and WTA tours.

It is not only the 'travelling circus' that is enjoying the Adelaide International, but it is our fans. Over the last 3 years (including COVID affected events) our fans have been amazing. In 2022, the Adelaide International decided to extend its footprint to close War Memorial Drive and activate Pinky Flat with the ever popular 'The Lawn'. Once again

The Lawn hosted over 35 music acts across two weeks promoted live music and delivering on Adelaide's status as UNESCO city. The big screen, street food vendors, live music and two-story bar overlooking the River Torrens made this space as retreat from the fast-paced action on the courts.

With over 100 players, 5 match courts and 6 practice courts the Adelaide International has become a tennis festival where the fans can watch multiple tennis matches, watch training and where possible get up close with the players.

Over 40,000 people attended the Adelaide International during the pandemic and collectively provided us with a customer satisfaction score of 9.1 whilst providing constructive feedback to keep growing the event. We will continue to listen to the fans as we build





Adelaide's own truly global event.

Once again Channel Nine broadcasted our event domestically which peaked at almost 400,000 viewers as Thanasi Kokkinakis captured his maiden ATP Tour title. However, the Adelaide International is a global event and delivered 22 million of globally viewed hours including almost 4 million hours viewed in the USA. Our social platforms reached record highs in 2022 with 78,000 users and 180,000 page views.

On the court we hosted some of the best players in the world. Once again, our women's field was as tough as anywhere in the world. We were blessed to host Ash Barty as she won her second Adelaide International by defeating 2022 Wimbledon champion Elena Rybakina in front of a packed house in week one. To get to the final, Ash had to play some of her best tennis to defeat current world No.1 Iga Swiatek. On the men's side, we watched Gael Monfils return to some of his best form to defeat former top 10 player Karen Khachanov.

In week two, we watched the brilliant resurgence of Madison Keys as she held off her compatriot Alison Riske. It was fitting that Thanasi Kokkinakis closed out the 2022 Adelaide International with his maiden title in by defeating Arthur Rinderknech in three tough sets. To have our hometown hero Thanasi celebrate an ATP Tour victory in Adelaide was befitting of the upgraded Memorial Drive and his semifinal and final win provided two of the best stadium

atmospheres that the venue has been privileged to witness over a storied history

On the doubles side we were thrilled to add Ash Barty/Storm Sanders, Makoto Ninomiya/Eri Hozumi, Rohan Bopanna/Ramkumar Ramanathan and Wesley Koolhof/Neal Skupski to our beautiful trophies designed by master carver Patrick Anderson.

A big thank you to the Government of South Australian, all our sponsors and partners, the incredibly dedicated team at Tennis Australia and Tennis SA and our wonderful volunteers. By having strong partnerships and collaboration we are able to showcase Adelaide to the world.


