TENNIS AUSTRALIA CEO'S REPORT



GAME ON FOR GROWING AUSTRALIAN TENNIS TOGETHER

As we look back on another successful year in Australian tennis, growth and teamwork are defining themes.

The Tennis Australia values of imagination, collaboration, humility and excellence were fundamental as we celebrated new milestones in participation, with more than 1.5 million Australians engaged in the sport.

It was collaboration, however, that was arguably most pivotal as we embarked on a major strategy to ensure our tennis community could build on those gains.

From coaches to volunteers, clubs to schools, administrators to officials and of course, all levels of players, every possible area of tennis was represented as we created the 'Game On' strategy. It carries a clear and simple objective to get more people playing tennis more often – regardless of how, where or what form of the game they play. In careful consultation with our tennis community, three key pillars are part of that plan.

Firstly, we aim to get more kids to start playing tennis. This sees us proactively targeting schools, supporting and developing more engaging coaches, and making it easy for parents to get their kids into the game.

Keeping kids and teens in tennis is also a focus with plans for a nationally branded social and team-based way to play, as well as the expansion of existing competitions.

Getting adults back into tennis is the third pillar, helped by the creation of compelling promotions for how, where and with who to play tennis. The rollout of complementary and easier-to-play formats – such as Padel, Pop and Pickelball – are strategically included as part of that promotional plan.

The overall good health of the sport in this nation provides an encouraging foundation for success. The latest Ausplay data shows a turnaround in the number of children playing the sport, which is up six per cent year-on-year. We've also managed to grow our total participation (1%).

When comparing our overall growth this year to last, it is important to remember that we grew more than 32 per cent since 2019 (pre-COVID) while most other sports lost participants during this period. On this basis, we are comparable in our growth.

As we welcomed the world's best players for the summer of tennis, leveraging events to provide fans with memorable experiences further boosted participation goals.

While the United Cup, an innovative teams event, was staged for the first time in Sydney, Perth and Brisbane, the Adelaide International and Hobart

International also helped patrons forge a stronger and more accessible connection to the sport.

And as the Australian Open returned to pre-pandemic operations, a memorable 111th edition generated both a new passion to experience tennis and funds that are invested into the development of our grassroots game.

Other milestones highlight our objective to make tennis a sport that's welcoming to all. Within our Women and Girls strategy, the goal to increase the representation of women coaches was happily achieved.

The 883 women coaches that are now delivering tennis at clubs, community centres and schools across Australia represent a 10 per cent increase, reaching our Australian Sports Commission target. Of course, we still want to do more.

Fostering engagement in other areas of the community is also key. The National Indigenous Tennis Carnival returned to Darwin in August 2022, allowing aspiring First Nations players with the first step in the potential journey to emulate heroes such as Ash Barty and Evonne Goolagong Cawley.

It brought together a record 230 participants from every Australian state



and territory, providing the opportunity for general participation, national competition (in both 14/u and 18/u categories) as well as cultural activities off the court.

None of these achievements would be possible, of course, without painstakingly maintained venues and facilities, or the many valuable contributors to our sport.

We especially thank the 25,000 dedicated volunteers who facilitate the delivery of tennis at every level across the nation. There's a parallel appreciation for the coaches who are fostering connections to tennis, as well as the network of officials who are critical to the delivery of our sport.

Those combined efforts also ensure that competitive play opportunities continue to expand. With an awareness that great competition not only breeds great competitors but also great tennis communities, there have been numerous highs in club competitions, leagues, team tournaments and professional tour events throughout the past year.

Meanwhile, we can also celebrate the

many Australian role models making career-best gains on the global tours. As numerous pro players set new ranking highs in both singles and doubles, Australian tennis proudly shone in team events as well.

John Peers and Storm Hunter notably combined to triumph in the US Open 2022 mixed doubles competition. Alongside Ajla Tomljanovic, Ellen Perez, Priscilla Hon and much-loved veteran Sam Stosur, Hunter also starred as Australia progressed to the Billie Jean King Cup Final, finishing runner-up to Switzerland.

Led by Australian No.1 Alex de Minaur, the Australian Davis Cup team contested a 48th final in the world team competition. Thanasi Kokkinakis, Max Purcell and Matt Ebden also featured in the team's inspired campaign, which was second only to Canada.

Another exciting breakthrough followed in Melbourne, when popular Australians Rinky Hijikata and Jason Kubler claimed the Australian Open men's doubles title. It marked a maiden major title for the local wildcards, who

teamed-up at their home Grand Slam for the first time.

From grassroots to professional level, we can look back on a remarkable and transformative year in Australian tennis. There's both much to celebrate and a huge passion to grow our sport even further through more participants, greater engagement and a generally thriving tennis community.

Most exciting perhaps, is that it has been a true team effort. Thanks to all of you who make our future bright.

TENNIS SA PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Given that Kent's tenure as President completed on 30 June 2023 and Philip's tenure as President commenced on 1 July 2023, we have decided to present this as a joint report. On behalf of the Tennis SA Board, we are pleased to present the President's report for the 2022-23 financial year, the eighth and final of Kent's term. What an exciting and challenging year it has been with the incredible highs of not one but two weeks of Adelaide International womens and mens tournaments balanced by the global COVID pandemic recovery impacts and societal cost-of-living pressures.

We can report the Board met each month during the year, except January, and discharged its governance obligations with diligence and enthusiasm. We thank our fellow Board members for their outstanding commitment, in an entirely voluntary capacity, to the sport of tennis in South

Australia. A very big thank you to Philip Roberts for his most significant effort as Deputy President during another hectic year.

As foreshadowed last year, we have now completed the third stage of capital works at Memorial Drive, which has been possible due to \$48m in grant funding from the SA Government. Physical work commenced in March 2021 with the marvellous fabric roof over the Sunken Show Court and new South Stand seating completed in time for the 2022 Adelaide International. Brand new state-of-the-art North and East grandstands joined by a concourse wrapped around both with fantastic spectator, player and staff/volunteer facilities were completed just in time for the 2023 Adelaide International. TSA has re-branded the venue as 'The Drive' to acknowledge the rich history both for tennis and other entertainment that many of us grew up with and fondly remember. We both

greatly appreciate the effort that many people have put in over a significant period to reach this point including the project team ably led by Lynton Franzi, Cox Architects, Kennett Builders and many partners. We are positive all South Australians join us in being extremely proud of the generational legacy this has created for tennis.

For the second year running, at very late notice, Tennis SA was asked to step up and host 2 weeks of Adelaide International events due to an increase in the number of sanctioned events. We were very fortunate to secure one of the greatest players of all time in Novak Djokovic for week one and the excitement he created with sell-out crowds will not be forgotten for some time. It is interesting to point out that week one winners in Novak and Aryna Sabalenka went on to win the singles titles later in January at the Australian Open, which helps us push the case

for top talent to play in Adelaide to prepare for the Australian Open. More details can be found in the CEO report but we would like to sincerely thank the SA Government through SATC/Events SA, Debbie Sterrey, Ali MacDonald, our Tennis SA/Tennis Australia event staff and volunteers for the incredible amount of effort they put in to allow players to experience two weeks in wonderful Adelaide and our community to experience double the amount of professional tennis.

Tennis SA's Mission is to showcase, promote, develop and manage the game of tennis in SA. Accordingly, significant time is spent on relevant tennis-based policies and activities. The Tennis SA Board has always seen the objectives of encouraging greater levels of participation, as well as nurturing talented young players in their quest to become their best as complementary elements. Two weeks of the Adelaide International provided a much-needed platform to help stimulate both these important areas and we expect tennis in SA will see significant benefits over coming years. The Board, CEO and senior staff have also worked on a slightly revised 2022-24 Strategic Plan to ensure we are also in alignment with changes TA have made to their strategic direction following a thorough national review.

The National Academy in South Australia is continuing to produce elite young tennis players and the direction taken by Sandon Stolle and the team is proving invaluable, particularly in broadening the base of the talent pool by working directly with our affiliates. It is a great honour for players to represent Australia and we would like to acknowledge the following SA players for their significant achievements: Diana Badalyan, Sarah Mildren, Hannah Park, Elim Yan, Petra Hule, Jeffrey Strydom, Hugh Winter, Brendan Loh, Filip Fantasia, Jonas Hahn, Thanasi Kokkinakis and Luke Saville. More information on their achievements can be found in the high-performance report.

Given the events restructure and the amount of effort required of our TSA staff, the annual edition of the Ken McGregor Fund (KMF) luncheon was not held this year. Instead, the team worked on other opportunities to raise funds for the important work the KMF perform. Thank you to the committee members of

the KMF, so ably led by Rick Baldock.

Our Diversity and Inclusion board sub-committee's first pillar of focus some time ago was Gender equity while its second pillar of focus in the last three years or so has been on Indigenous aspects. As previously reported, our first Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) was endorsed by Reconciliation Australia, so we have been focussing on completing the commitments contained in that whilst a new RAP Working Group has started to investigate our next Innovate RAP. The committee also spent time on the third pillar in our Diversity and Inclusion Strategy of disability and accessibility. The committee recognise we have more work to do in achieving some of our Female Leadership KPIs from the Gender pillar but hope some new programs will help this. Thank you to the effort of those on our Diversity and Inclusion committee and RAP Working Group.

The Board is mindful Tennis SA is essentially 'owned' by our member Associations. The Board, in various forums, met with Association representatives throughout the year, with the aim of supporting their endeavours at grass roots levels.

On behalf of the Board, we thank the SA Government and in particular Premier Peter Malinauskas, Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing Katrine Hildyard, and Kylie Taylor as the Chief Executive of the Office of Recreation, Sport and Racing, for their outstanding support. We have also enjoyed excellent support from the City of Adelaide, the City of Unley, Adelaide Oval SMA, Adelaide Venue Management, Sport SA, Next Generation Clubs Australia, Memorial Drive Tennis Club, and many other organisations. This year the Governor of South Australia, a keen tennis follower, agreed to be the Patron of Tennis SA for which we are most grateful.

We thank the Board and staff at Tennis Australia for continuing to provide funding for a number of our activities and with whom we work so constructively. Tennis Australia's ability to fund member states in FY23 almost recovered to pre-covid levels, however Tennis Australia and Tennis SA have a great partnership and worked together to minimise the impacts this could have caused to delivering grass roots activities to our members. Thank you in particular to Craig Tiley and Tom Larnar

for their support.

Our CEO, Debbie Sterrey, has continued to show great leadership and endeavour in all of her activities and has admirably led what we consider our greatest asset, our dedicated staff. Thank you so much Debbie. The relationships our staff have fostered with so many partners are crucial to our success in the development of our sport as well as with our new facility 'The Drive', so we sincerely thank them for their hard work. We also thank our past players and affiliated Associations and Club representatives with whom we have been able to work so positively with each year.

Kent Thiele departs the Board after 27 years continuous service and the handover to Philip Roberts has been extremely smooth, unsurprisingly given the nature of our shared leadership over the years.

Thank you for the privilege we enjoy in serving tennis in South Australia as we look forward to another successful year.

TENNIS SA CEO'S REPORT



On behalf of the staff of Tennis SA, I am pleased to present my CEO report in my fourth year of service for 2022-23.

The Memorial Drive Centre Court redevelopment continued during this financial year with the team working tirelessly to ensure that construction was completed ahead of the Adelaide International in January 2023. The redevelopment will now see The Drive be able to host a wide variety of community, sporting and entertainment events in the future.

Our South Australian team travelled to the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival held in Darwin in August. The team performed admirably on court and were also recognised for the special friendship they forged with the team from Canteen Creek, north-east of Alice Springs, winning the Ash Barty Cup for participation and effort.

Our Tennis Hot Shots District School Carnivals continued to go from strength to strength in the second half of the year. 46 carnivals were held around the state seeing 43,815 students pick up a racquet as part of the pathway designed to transition students from interschool sport to their local tennis club.

Two ITF World Tennis Tour events were held at The Drive in September. South Australia's Alexander Despoja and Kristina Tai were finalists in week one, while Caitlin Baker claimed the girls singles title in week two.

South Australia was selected to host the 12/u and 14/u Australian Hardcourt

Championships in late September at West Lakes Tennis Club. Filip Fantasia, Sarah Mildren and Kalina Stefanov won 14/u doubles titles at the event.

Following her debut at the Virtus European Summer Games in July, Andriana Petrakis won the women's II-1 classification singles title at the highly successful Peter Smith Players with an Intellectual Impairment (PWII) Open held at Next Generation Memorial Drive in October.

The State Foundation Cup was held at Berri Tennis Club for the ninth consecutive year in October with Hills Fleurieu taking home the overall championship after a fantastic week of tennis.

We were thrilled to kick off the Tennis SA State League season with the second edition of the Tennis SA State League All Stars. This year the team visited the Riverland, with players taking part in An Evening with the Stars, Red Ball Carnival, All Stars match and tourism activities.

Summer competitions also commenced in October, with Tennis SA administering competitions for Southern Districts, Eastern Districts, North East and Great Southern Tennis Associations. Tennis SA State League, Metro League, Junior State League and Green Ball Junior State League competitions continued to go from strength to strength.

The City of Playford Tennis International returned in late October following a three year hiatus. Tennis SA and Tennis Australia hosted the tournament in conjunction with the City of Playford, TennisGear and Playford Tennis Club. Australians Rinky Hijikata and Kimberly Birrell took out the singles titles at the fourth edition of the tournament.

We were thrilled to celebrate the achievements of nine South Australian tennis volunteers at our Tennis SA Service Award presentations. Our congratulations to Jill Williams, Kerry Haysman, Craig Glennon, Jim Ferguson, Carol Davis, Mike Horsman, Anne Morgan, John MacKenzie and Roger Davey.

The Metro vs Country teams event was held at Tennis World Adelaide in late November with 36 players participating. Metro South Australia won the 13/u and 15/u age groups, while Country South Australia was too strong in the 17/u age group. Metro South Australia were crowned overall winners for the first time in the three-year history of the event.

In mid-December, Maitland Lutheran School and Linden Park Primary School were named the 2022 South Australian Tennis Hot Shots school state champions, after winning their respective competitions at the Tennis SA Clay Courts. The events were the culmination of ANZ Tennis Hot Shots District School Carnivals held around the state throughout 2022.

Six South Australians led the charge for the state at the 2022 Newcombe Medal, Australian Tennis Awards held in December. David Grainger (Coaching Excellence Club), Domenic Marafiotte (Coaching Excellence Development), Robyn Tucker (Excellence in Officiating), Ian Delbridge (Most Outstanding 30+ Tennis Senior), Edward Winter (Junior Athlete of the Year - Male), Torrens Valley Christian School (Most Outstanding School) and Julie Polkinghorne (Volunteer Achievement Award) were named as finalists. South Australia claimed a record breaking four awards, with Grainger, Tucker, Winter and Polkinghorne all winning their respective categories.

After a couple of years off due to COVID, our South Australian Regional State Team was able to return to compete in the Queensland Junior Teams Carnival in December. Selected following the individual event at State Foundation Cup in October, the team consisted of players in 13/u, 15/u and 17/u age groups.

The Adelaide International returned to the The Drive with back-to-back tournaments ahead of the Australian Open in January. The first week saw Aryna Sabalenka overcome Czech teenager Linda Noskova 6-3 7-6(4), before Novak Djokovic (SRB) saved championship point to defeat Sebastian



Korda (USA) 6-7(8), 7-6(3), 6-4.

In the second week, Belinda Bencic (SWI) defeated Daria Kasatkina 6-0 6-2 while Soonwoo Kwon (KOR) overcame Roberto Bautista Agut 6-4 3-6 7-6(4). Our sincere thanks to the South Australian Government and South Australian Tourism Commission for their unwavering support and their vision to bring international tennis back to South Australia.

Adelaide International TennisFest made its return in January with a record 32 individual tennis events held in South Australia throughout the Adelaide International. More than 3000 participants took part this year.

Tennis SA State League grand finals were held under the roof on Centre Court at The Drive in March. Peake Gardens Riverside Tennis Club won their first men's title, while Glenlea Tennis Club claimed their fourth consecutive women's title.

345 players took part in the Les Tapp OAM Junior Inter Association event at Woodville Orion Tennis Club and West Lakes Tennis Club over the March long weekend. This was the largest number of teams to have participated in the last five years.

Later in March, Seacliff Tennis Club (girls) and Collingrove Tennis Club (boys) were crowned Tennis SA Junior State League champions at The Drive. The grand finals were held on Centre

Court following the Junior Awards Night held in The Courtside Room celebrating the achievements of our junior players from the past 12 months.

A highlight of the year was the Tennis SA Gala Dinner held in April under the roof on Centre Court at The Drive. More than 430 people were in attendance for the evening hosted by 22-time Grand Slam doubles champion Todd Woodbridge, alongside Shane Leathem. The one-off, very special event signified the official opening of The Drive and incorporated the Tennis SA Awards celebrating the achievements of our South Australian tennis community over the past 12 months.

The National Indigenous Tennis Carnival - SA was held in May with a community activation including social play and cultural activities taking place at The Drive. A team of nine players will represent South Australia at the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival to be held in Darwin in August.

Our 11/u, 13/u and 15/u South Australian teams performed admirably at the 2023 Australian Teams Championships in Queensland in June. Our 11/u girls and 15/u boys finished their respective events in third place.

I would like to thank Tennis SA President - Kent Thiele, Vice President - Philip Roberts and the entire Tennis SA Board for their support throughout the year. This year marks Kent's final

year as President of the Tennis SA Board with Philip moving into the role come 1 July 2023. We sincerely thank Kent for his tireless efforts and exceptional leadership to the game of tennis in South Australia over the past 30 years.

Congratulations to our Leadership Team consisting of Dylan Hicks (Tournaments, Competitions and Officiating), Bianca Marron (Marketing and Communications and Partnerships), James Pick (Tennis Development) and Matthew Fitzgerald (Operations and Venues), along with Adelaide International Tournament Director Alistair MacDonald, for the great work they have done throughout the year.

I also wish to acknowledge the entire Tennis SA and Adelaide International team for their tireless work over the past 12 months. You should all be very proud of your achievements.

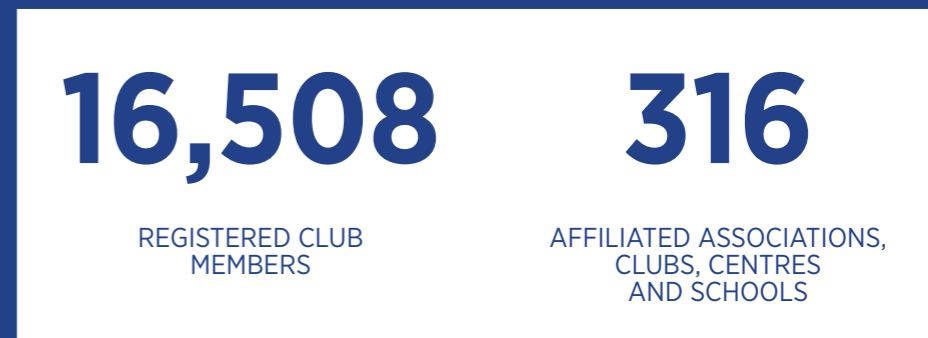

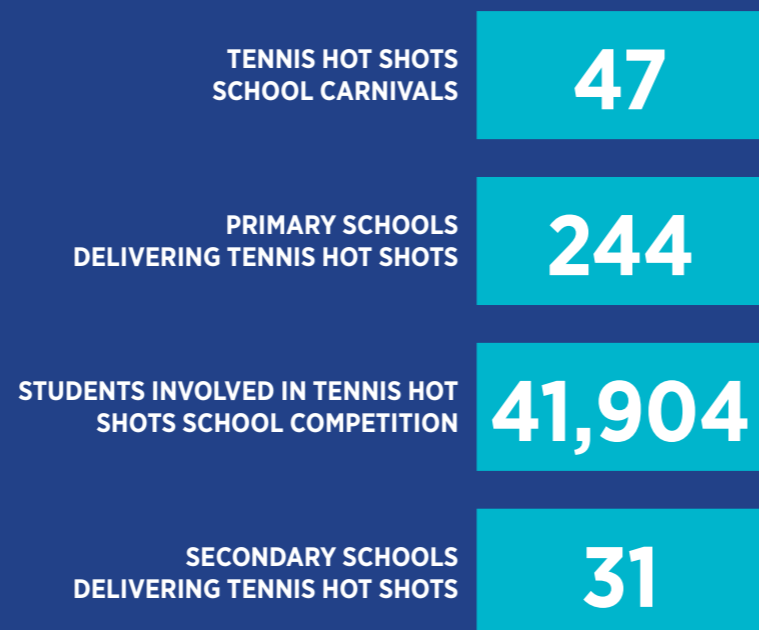

TOURNAMENTS REPORT

TOURNAMENTS

On January 1 2023 the Junior Tour Points Race and Progress Series were introduced. 20 endorsed Junior Events took place between July 2022-June 2023. Regional Tournaments were once again held in Renmark, Mount Gambier, Port Pirie, Port Lincoln and Gawler. Strathalbyn also hosted a very successful King's Birthday Long Weekend event which had 203 entries.

Five Open Tournaments were held in the second half of 2022 with an additional five Progress Series Events held in 2023. A total of \$56,000 in prizemoney was earned by players.

16 Junior Development Series events were scheduled between July 2022-June 2023. Seaclyff Tennis Club was awarded Event of the Year for their JDS held in February 2023 which had 153 entries.

ITF JUNIORS

Some of the best juniors from around Australia hit Adelaide for two ITF World Tennis Tour Junior tournaments being hosted in South Australia.

Tennis SA and Tennis Australia, in conjunction with Next Generation Memorial Drive, hosted the tournaments from Monday 5 to Sunday 18 September 2022.

The two ITF World Tennis Tour Junior Grade 5 events saw 120 18-and-under players visit Adelaide during the two week period.

Week one saw South Australians Alexander Despoja and Kristina Tai reach the finals.

Week two saw an all-South Australian match up with Caitlin Baker defeating Diana Badalyan 6-3 6-3 to be crowned the South Australian Junior International champion.



CITY OF PLAYFORD TENNIS INTERNATIONAL

The City of Playford Tennis International returned to Playford Tennis Centre from Sunday 23 to Sunday 30 October 2022, after a three year hiatus.

The Australian Pro Tour event, a combined Men's ATP Challenger and Women's ITF World Tennis Tour tournament, offered a total prize pool of more than AUD \$200,000 and valuable world ranking points.

Tennis SA and Tennis Australia hosted the tournament in conjunction with the City of Playford, TennisGear and Playford Tennis Club.

Rinky Hijikata (NSW) and Kimberly Birrell (Qld) were crowned 2022 City of Playford Tennis International champions after taking out the singles titles.

12/U AND 14/U AUSTRALIAN HARDCOURT CHAMPIONSHIPS

Australia's top junior tennis players took part in the 2022 12/u and 14/u Australian Hardcourt Championships presented by Kia at West Lakes Tennis Club and Woodville Orion Tennis Club from Monday 26 September to Sunday 2 October.

Renee Alame (NSW) became a two-time Australian champion after taking out the 14-and-under girls' title, with Lucas Han (Qld) overcoming top seed Flynn Coventry-Searle (NSW) 6-2 6-4 to win the 12/u boys' championship, top seed Jennifer Ott (NSW) defeating No.4



seed Aimee Jin (NSW) 6-1 6-1 to win the 12/u girls' championship and second seed Myron Papadimitriou (NSW) defeated Cameron Burton (WA) 5-7 6-3 7-6(3) to win the 14/u boys' title.

BALLKIDS

There were 184 expressions of interest to be a ballkid at the 2023 Adelaide International. There were 5 training sessions held at either West Lakes Tennis Club or Tennis World Millswood. Ballkids were required to attend a minimum of 2 training sessions to qualify to be a ballkid for the Adelaide

International. At each training session we averaged 80 kids participating. We then ended up having 140 kids serve players at the Adelaide International.

During the event the kids were provided with a long sleeve polo, shorts, a water bottle and a legionnaires hat. Each Ballkid rostered on Centre Court was allocated one complimentary ticket per shift, and for Ballkids rostered on outside courts, they were given two complimentary tickets per shift. These were used by parents and they were very appreciative.





There were ten teams competing in the Girls competition, and four advanced to the finals. Both Seacliff and Athelstone were successful in advancing to the Grand Final. Seacliff was able to maintain their composure, winning five rubbers to one, and clinching their fourth Junior State League Girls Premiership.

Jude Gale from Collingrove won the boys Junior State League Player of the Year while Kristina Tai from ETKG and Sarah Mildren from Glenlea shared the honour of girls Junior State League Player of the Year.

METRO LEAGUE

TENNIS DEVELOPMENT REPORT

AFFILIATION AND MEMBERSHIP

Tennis SA had a total of 316 affiliates in 2022-23 comprising of 40 associations, 19 self insured facilities and four schools. This also included two new affiliates, Blair Athol Racquet Sports Hub (One Culture Ltd) and Karoonda Tennis Club who joined Tennis SA for the 2022-23 season. Tennis SA continues to adopt the per court affiliation model and is continually looking at adding benefits to all affiliates. Tennis SA and our affiliates registered a total of 16,508 club members, 5,012 Hot Shots

participants (clubs/coaching) and 41,904 participants in schools for the 2022-23 season.

ORGANISATION STRUCTURE

The Tennis Development Team went through some changes during the 2022-23 period with Matthew Fitzgerald moving into the Head of Operations and Venues role which then saw James Pick promoted to Head of Tennis Development.

Sarah Horgan was also promoted to Regional Tennis Manager from her previous Club Development Officer Metro

North role. Sarah has done an amazing job leading the team which consists of Adrian Dezen (Club Development Officer Metro South) Jessica Gardner (Club Development Officer Metro North), Regional North West position (currently vacant) and Luke Taylor (Regional Officer South East) who was offered a fulltime role after his 12 month secondment. Hayley Allen was welcomed back after her maternity leave and has taken a new role as Venues Lead under Matt Fitzgerald.

Shane Leathem (Schools and Pathways Manager) who took a new position at UniSA. We were sad to see Shane leave but wish him all the best with his future endeavours and thank him for all his work during his time at Tennis. Shane's departure created an opportunity within the team, and we were thrilled to welcome Luke Doughty from the Tournaments and Competitions team into the Schools and Pathways Manager position. Luke's team includes Amy Sneath (Women and Girls Program Pathway Coordinator), Jack Crispin (Schools Development Coordinator Metro) and Corey Tugwell (School Development Coordinator Country).

SYSTEMS

In the 2022-23 period, we continued utilising ClubSpark, resulting in an additional 45 clubs (making it a total of

209) adopting the membership module. Moreover, there was an increase of 31 clubs (bringing the total to 170) utilising the website module. These features offer digital solutions to our stakeholders and help save valuable volunteer hours.

Additionally, ClubSpark's Court Hire module provides clubs with a digital solution to open their courts to the community and generate revenue. Currently, we have 48 venues in South Australia offering court hire, and with the introduction of the more cost-effective Igloohome lock system, we anticipate this number will increase in the upcoming 2023-24 period.

Furthermore, this year marked the introduction of the Health Indicator of Tennis (HiT Tool). The HiT Tool combines useful, evidence-based, and up-to-date

resources, tools, research, and information to assist clubs in developing tailored action plans that align with their unique environments. So far, 55 clubs across the state have completed a HiT Tool conversation with the Tennis Development team, and we are enthusiastic about witnessing this number grow in the upcoming 2023-24 period.

SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT COORDINATORS

Key responsibilities of the School Development Coordinator are to drive greater participation in tennis and a deeper engagement of the education sector at local levels. The role is integral in building sustainable pathways from schools to club-based tennis. Additionally this drives quality and consistency of program delivery and links directly to



Government school initiatives designed to entrench tennis into school culture and curriculum.

Our School Development team consists of Corey Tugwell and Jack Crispin. Tennis SA are pleased to report we had 244 primary schools registered as part of the Australian Sports Commission Sporting Schools (Partnership and Play program) during 2022-23. Tennis SA also had 31 registered secondary schools. Through these programs, Tennis SA engaged 41,904 students. A new secondary schools program was launched in 2022 by the team at Tennis SA, with a total of 5 schools and 101 students being involved within the first few events. This day is formally named the 'Tennis SA Secondary Schools Festival' and consists of a wide range of tennis formats which encourage social play and other opportunities within the sport.

Tennis SA held 47 school carnivals across the state. An incredible result with 7601 Year 3/4 and 5/6 students participating in the carnivals from 187

different schools. The finalists for the Year 3/4 carnival state finals were Linden Park PS (metro winners), Prince Alfred College (metro runners up), Maitland Lutheran School (regional winners), and St Joseph's School - Clare (regional runners up). All four schools competed for the title during the Adelaide International with Linden Park PS winning the 2022 title.

To thank our key stakeholders, the team held the annual Teachers Recognition Function during the 2023 Adelaide International, which saw 125 attendees on the night. Key highlights were an interview with Torrens Valley Christian School who were the School of the Year at the Annual Tennis SA Awards Night, as well as a finalist at the Newcombe Medal Awards. In addition, we took this opportunity to thank our key stakeholders in ACHPER SA, SACPSSA, Flinders University, University of South Australia, and School Sport SA.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT OFFICERS AND REGIONAL OFFICERS

Integral to the Tennis Development team are the Club Development Officers (CDO)

and Regional Officers (RO). This team works collaboratively with our affiliated clubs and members to improve the delivery of tennis at grassroots level.

The CDO/RO is the first point of call to assist the 316 affiliates and 40 associations in growing participation, improving facilities, volunteer support, club/coach support, system support and much more.

Metropolitan clubs are serviced by the metro team of CDO's, comprising of Adrian Dezen looking after 57 clubs and 7 associations in Metro South, and Metro North with 59 clubs and 5 associations being looked after by Sarah Horgan (July-April) and Jessica Gardner (May-June). The country team of RO's comprises of Luke Taylor looking after 80 clubs and 11 associations in the South East region, and Jessica Gardener servicing 84 clubs and 18 associations in the North West.

The clubs team conducted 245 in person club visits throughout the year servicing tennis clubs and promoting tennis in their regions. A key focus area for the clubs team is to get clubs visible online via the national website play.tennis.com.au, as well as digitally enabled with memberships, program and events using the Clubspark software. There are now 209 affiliated clubs using the membership module (previous year 164)

and 170 clubs that have their website on Clubspark (previous year 139).

COURT HIRE

Court hire capability at clubs and venues continues to be a big area focus for the Tennis Development team. At the end of 2022-23 there were 48 venues offering digital court hire across South Australia (previous year 23). This is comprised of 26 venues with hardware gate access solutions such as Book a Court (21) and IglooHome Lock (5), and 22 venues using Clubspark software only. This increase of venues with court hire functionality has resulted in a 24% rise in online bookings with a total of 8,056 bookings made, and an increase of 31% in court hire revenue of \$45,479. These venues can be found on the national tennis website play.tennis.com.au as a venue that anyone can go to, and in the matter of a few clicks, can easily book a court and play tennis. The bookable online solution provides these tennis venues with online visibility and promotes their venue as a place where people can be active playing tennis.

In March Tennis SA were successful in receiving funding of \$137,500 across 2 years for the 'Click to Court' project from the Office for Recreation Sport and Racing through their Active State Collaboration Program. This project will provide 75 tennis venues across South

Australia with bookable online solutions, complete with IglooHome lock and Book a Court gate access solutions where applicable. Along with the Click to Court project partners Tennis Australia and the City of Playford, Tennis SA aims to significantly increase the accessibility for all South Australians to play tennis throughout the state by opening up tennis courts through digital access. This will allow the community to simply book a court at their nearest club with the click of a button. Having greater accessibility to tennis courts across the state will lead to more opportunities for children and adults to play in our local communities, leading to more healthy Active Lives. It also has the added benefit of reduced burden of volunteers and helping our clubs thrive, through bringing people together to build strong and connected communities.





INCLUSION AND DIVERSITY REPORT

WOMEN AND GIRLS

This is the second year where South Australia has had a staff member working specifically in the Women and Girls space, focusing on supporting women and girls in tennis from participation all the way through to Community Leadership. 19 Women across South Australia have commenced the second Women Leaders in Tennis Program, a four-month program that is designed to help build the leadership skills of women in our tennis community. 36 women attended a South Australian first, Women Leaders in Tennis networking event, held during the Adelaide International, aimed at providing a space for women across the state to connect and learn.

The Riverland Girls Project led by Amy Menzel commenced in November. This project aims to address the lack of teenage girls playing tennis in the Riverland. Two workshops with various stakeholders across the Riverland were held across November and January using the 'Design Thinking Process'. These workshops highlighted what girls in this age group were wanting from a tennis program and in response to this,

the "Tennis Your Way" program has been developed and will be piloted in the region in Term 3 2023.

#nolimits girls squads launched in term 2 with six squads across the state taking part. These squads are structured tennis sessions designed by Tennis Australia targeted at girls aged 10-14 who are seeking a talent development program. 82 girls across the state took part in these squads.

INDIGENOUS

Tennis SA were excited to continue the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival SA in 2023, however unfortunately the Playford school event was cancelled due to inclement weather. The SA event saw 50 participants take part in a range of tennis activities, delivered by Jason Todd our Indigenous State coach. There were also cultural activities available for the participants to learn more about indigenous culture. The success of the event saw Tennis SA select a team of nine Indigenous athletes to represent South Australia at the National Indigenous Tennis Carnival in Darwin.

Tennis SA were also successful in receiving \$105,000 worth of funding through the Office of Recreation, Sport

and Racing. The funding will go towards creating a sustainable indigenous pathway in the form of programs and education in both Metro and Regional areas of South Australia. A big thank you to the City of Playford, Elizabeth North



and Elizabeth Downs Primary school for being partners in the initial stages of the project.

BLIND AND LOW VISION

Tennis SA was proud to be a part of the Blind Sports Camp running a day of Tennis at Somerton Park Tennis Club for students. Vision impaired athletes continued to attend weekly trainings at two locations in South Australia. The two training sessions are held at Somerton Park Tennis Club and Hope Valley Tennis Club. Tennis SA would like to thank Andrew Whisson, Nicholas Bradley and Josh Crowe for their dedication to increasing vision impaired tennis by developing these programs.

Tennis SA were also excited to host the Blind and Low Vision State Championships after not being able to deliver it the previous year due to COVID. The tournament saw over 20 athletes compete last November, with 10 of those being from South Australia.

These programs and tournament could not have been possible without the support of the South Australian School for Vision Impaired, who consequently were a finalist for Most Outstanding School at the Tennis SA Awards Night.

PLAYERS WITH AN INTELLECTUAL IMPAIRMENT

Tennis SA offers several opportunities throughout the year to people with intellectual impairments (PWII) to be

involved in tennis. Throughout the Adelaide International, four players with an intellectual impairment participated on Centre Court to showcase PWII Tennis.

Through funding received from the Movement Disorder Foundation, Tennis SA also delivered two Tennis Gala Days for students with intellectual impairments to come and experience tennis.

The fortnightly Talent Development Squad coached by Lance Everett has continued and the development of these players has led to them competing in both interstate and international PWII Events. Andriana Petrakis was selected to travel to France and represent Australia by competing in the Virtus Global Games. Lance Everett was also selected by Tennis Australia to travel with the team to France as an assistant coach.

Andriana Petrakis also took out most outstanding athlete with a disability at the 2022 Tennis SA awards, which is a credit to her and the dedication to her tennis.

The Peter Smith PWII Open was held in September where 28 players with an intellectual impairment competed across the weekend. This was the highest number of entries to date for this tournament. For the first time ever, there was an opportunity for South Australian wheelchair players to enter

the tournament in a separate wheelchair tennis event. Four players competed in a round-robin style format for this event.

Two of these wheelchair players were also offered the opportunity to showcase their skills on centre court during the Adelaide International.

Tennis SA has also been recognizing players in the South Australian tennis community who have disabilities through posting individual profiles of them on social media throughout the year. Tennis SA want to raise the profile of these players as well as promote to other people living with a disability that tennis is a sport available for them to play.

DEAF AND HARD OF HEARING

In August 2022 saw the very first Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DHOH) Gala Day take place at the Tennis SA Clay Courts, with 74 students from Reception to Year 12. Lance Everett, our State Inclusion Coach, was in attendance and as always provided a fantastic experience to the students. Avenues College, Adelaide High School, Klemzig and Brighton Primary Schools were all involved on the day, all with positive feedback as a result. Moving into 2023, schools have now been provided the option to run programs in the lead up to the Gala Day, with plans for greater opportunities afterwards.





issues specific to the region. This has led to some positive outcomes in Professional Development, Foundation Cup, Training Opportunities and Tournament Scheduling.

Over the past 12 months, 13 coach education courses have been delivered across Foundation, Community and Junior Development coaching levels. These courses have introduced another 66 coaches into the South Australian tennis community. Women's Foundation and Community Coaching courses have also been delivered by the Women in Tennis team. These courses included 17 new female coaches who experienced specific course structures and content designed to maximise women's coaching experiences. Planning for the first regional Junior Development coaching course in Mount Gambier has also been a priority with the completion of the course expected in 2024.

Workshops have continued to be a priority for the coach team. Thirteen workshops have been conducted across the state with participants given the opportunity to listen to global industry leaders. Workshops were well supported by the coaches throughout the year with over 200 participants reinforcing the belief that a coach is a lifelong learner.

A new initiative born out of coach exchanges is the networking possibilities of a forum discussion for coaches. The first forum was held between coaches and the Tournament and Competitions team which created our biggest attendance



outside the SA coach summit.

In January 2023, the SA Coach Summit was also held in conjunction with the Adelaide International tournament. Thirty six coaches attended and listened to modified ball expert Martin Rocca (ARG). The summit also included a presentation and Q&A session with Piotr Sierzputowski (POL). Piotr won WTA coach of the year in 2020, largely thanks to his work with world number 1 Iga Swiatek, he spoke in depth about life on the tour for young coaches. The summit concluded with networking on site which was also identified as being important to the coaches. Coaches were able to combine access to the newly built The Drive - Premier Suite to view centre court matches whilst also able to walk around the outside courts and watch world class tennis.

The Adelaide International also played host to a Coach Connect Workshop. An initiative by the Women in Tennis team. The workshop gave women coaches a networking event whilst taking in the Adelaide International. Twenty four female coaches attended, giving them the opportunity to listen and participate in a great workshop environment led by Australia's Billie Jean Cup coach, Nicole Pratt and author Emma Doyle. Coach Connect Workshops were also held throughout the year to support and grow the women's coach community, with 11 women coach members committing to Tennis Australia's mentor program, mentor loop.

The total number of coaches for the 2022-23 year was 250, which includes 141 males, 65 females and 44 regional coaches.

COACH DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Over the past 12 months, the Coach team instigated a number of coach projects. One of the first projects to be actioned was a team restructure, with the new role of Coach Relationship and Education Manger being created and Joel Kerley appointed to this role in January.

As part of the key coach projects the new role focused on the following actions:

- Increased stakeholder engagement with a focus on supporting coaches to increase sustainably and business growth
- Ensuring regional coaching courses are embedded in the Coach Education calendar
- A coach education calendar to suit market needs

- Increased networking opportunities for coaches for both formal and informal learning opportunities.

Out of the coach review, coaches wanted more connection, engagement and a better relationship with tennis. As an action to this, the Coach Exchange project was created. Coach Exchanges are deep and meaningful conversations driven by coaches out in their environments. The exchange sessions include active listening, problem solving and follow up. Coach Exchanges started in January 2023 and 52 have been conducted with coaches from across South Australia. Some of the key coach feedback has included:

- Formation of coach working groups
- Coach forum opportunities

- Increased collaboration with Tennis SA and the private sector. These initiatives have helped in making the tennis industry a more professional and respected profession. Going forward, Coach Exchanges will become a key coach relationship tool with plans to connect with the entire SA coaching fraternity.

As a shared project, energy has been invested in the coaches and clubs in the Riverland. The Riverland is the largest region for qualified coaches in South Australia and through a joint initiative between the coaches and Tennis SA a coach's working group has been established to help grow the sport in the region. The coaches group meets monthly to discuss and collaborate on

ADELAIDE INTERNATIONAL

In person appearances returned in 2023 following a COVID-induced hiatus. Players took part in 27 media conferences, 50 player appearances, 52 colour opportunities and a cooking show. Highlights included:

In total, 86 media representatives including 70 local and 16 international media provided detailed coverage of the Adelaide International.

An analysis of coverage for the Adelaide International found 3,286 unique media items (14,283 syndications) with an audience of 288,159,816. The total advertising value for the coverage was estimated at \$15,154,274.

MARKETING AND COMMUNICATIONS REPORT



The second year of our new strategic plan saw more initiatives in the marketing, communications and partnerships calendar, and a great year of growth for all our social and digital channels.

Throughout the 2022-2023 year the Tennis SA social channels grew by 300+ followers on both Facebook and Instagram, these two platforms being the main channels where our content is being delivered. We produced six content campaigns throughout the year including, Play on Clay in May, NAIDOC Week, Pride Month, International Women's Day, National Volunteer Week and National Reconciliation Week. We also ensured we supported our competitive pathways and Tennis Development initiatives to ensure South Australians are informed on all things tennis in the state.

Our focus on grassroots and supporting our clubs to build their own channels has stepped up again in this financial year. At a local level, we delivered 11 local area marketing plans for our clubs to assist them with their social media presence and helping them to define and reach their goals. In addition, we have created 300+ Canva assets during this period, these are delivered through our social media channels to advertise tournaments and registrations, coaching and club flyers, local area marketing plans used to provide examples for clubs, School Carnival and Tennis Hot Shots flyers.

One of our proudest moments for the year was the delivery of the Tennis SA Gala Dinner, the official opening of The Drive held on Centre Court. The event saw over 430 people experience the magic under the roof, celebrating our amazing tennis community and the

redevelopment of The Drive cementing the future of tennis for generations to come. We were also thrilled to welcome two major sponsors in Cox and Eventwise, plus seven category sponsors in Seeley International, AECOM, Pernix, Tripodi Kitchen Designs, Inline Bathrooms, Heysil and Keen Office Furniture.

We were also excited to deliver the State League Grand Finals and Junior State League Grand Finals and Awards at The Drive. Welcoming back our state's top competitive players to the venue was a highlight for the business, and a huge success. Profiling our top players is a key strategic initiative, and the second instalment of the Tennis SA State League All Stars saw the profile lift again in our regional areas, this year in the Riverland. Securing sponsorship from the Renmark Council and Riverland Tennis Association allowed us to deliver another successful event, allowing the community to watch some top tier tennis, and our State League All Stars to experience engagement in the regional community. Our team also played integral roles in delivering the Winter Pennant presentations, State Foundation Cup, Playford Tennis International, and National Indigenous Tennis Carnivals. These events are a key priority across our entire team to ensure we are promoting, delivering, and growing the game of tennis in our state.

The Adelaide International saw two back-to-back weeks of tennis back at The Drive, and a calibre of players like never before. Our marketing initiatives focused heavily on digital and a conversion strategy, leveraging on the great talent hitting Adelaide to build the strongest week one sales to date. The Nielsen survey reported a customer satisfaction of 8.8 which is extremely strong, with the most recall from our marketing efforts coming from TV and socials. Our socials saw a huge growth, with a combined increase of over 9,800 new followers to our Facebook and Instagram pages during the event



period. Some new key focuses around inclusion and diversity and community engagement saw the first ever Pride Day and Night, with Hans as the headline supporter, and an epic Tennisfest, with 33 events across two weeks with more than 3,000 participants.

Finally, the completion of the redevelopment allowed our team to branch out to deliver an exciting new brand for the venue - The Drive. Working with KPWX, we undertook a major brand project, engaging

stakeholders across tennis to deliver a new name, new logo and new look for tennis' home in SA. We also engaged KPWX to roll out our first major marketing campaign with the intention to position The Drive as a premier new venue in Adelaide. This campaign saw us successfully deliver ads across display (News Corp websites), YouTube, social (Facebook and Instagram) and search (Google Ads) over a three-month period. During this period, The Drive complemented this paid campaign with

organic socials to our owned channels to extend our reach and further grow our audience.

The Tennis SA website had 80,972 users which totalled 330,366 pageviews. During this period, our website saw 27,055 (28.7%) of users return to our website, with increased engagement from the previous year with 63,188+ (71.3%) new users. The most popular way our users found us was by organic search with 48,299 (61.7%) followed by social media with 14,288 (18.26%) users.



THE DRIVE REPORT

Fresh from a \$48m redevelopment, The Drive is back with a new story to tell.

\$44 million in funding for stage two of the Memorial Drive Centre Court redevelopment was announced as part of the Government of South Australia's budget in November 2020.

From February 2021 to April 2023, the \$48 million redevelopment has seen the demolition of the North Stand and the construction of new Northern and Eastern facilities.

Construction commenced in mid-2021 with the venue taken out of construction mode for a month to accommodate the 2022 Adelaide International. Construction recommenced late in January 2022 and was completed in time for the Adelaide International in 2023.

The 2022-23 financial year saw The Drive officially open for business, across tennis, events and functions, allowing South Australians to enjoy the new facilities. Our team has been privileged to start to promote and sell The Drive as Adelaide's only open-air, undercover music, sporting, events, and function venue, where unforgettable experiences are born and cherished.

We were delighted to embark upon a partnership with Adelaide Venue Management, who have come on board as our presenting partner for concerts

and functions at The Drive. Adelaide Venue Management (AVM) is South Australia's leading provider of venue management services. It is responsible for operating three of Adelaide's most iconic venues: Adelaide Convention Centre, Adelaide Entertainment Centre, and Coopers Stadium, in addition to AVMCatering, the corporation's outside catering arm. And now, we have the experienced team at AVM as our presenting partner ensuring the success of The Drive for more than just tennis.

Fully operational after the 2023 Adelaide International, in just 6 months The Drive saw over 15 functions and events in our

Our team was proud to officially open The Drive with the first ever function on centre court, our Tennis SA Gala Dinner held on Saturday 29 April. Tennis SA President Kent Thiele and Tennis SA CEO Debbie Sterrey were joined by the Honourable Peter Malinauskas MP, Premier of South Australia and the South Australian Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing, the Honourable Katrine Hildyard MP for the one-off, very special event to officially open the stage two redevelopment of The Drive, as well as celebrate the achievements of the South Australian tennis community over the past 12 months. We were thrilled with

the success of the event and hope that it was a memorable experience for all who attended.

We were also excited to announce our multi-year partnership with Ticketmaster Australia to ticket content for The Drive. Under the agreement, Ticketmaster will provide ticketing services on an exclusive basis for all publicly ticketed events scheduled at The Drive, which now has an expanded capacity to accommodate up to 7,000 attendees. From a seamless ticket purchase process to ensuring frictionless entry into The Drive and leveraging innovative marketing tools, both teams will benefit from Ticketmaster's market-leading technology that will support bringing crowds to the newly refurbished venue.

Finally, we delivered a comprehensive marketing campaign to start to build awareness of the new enhanced offerings at The Drive, and build our social and eDM channels. The campaign ran across digital (display and search), YouTube and socials, complimented by our organic marketing and eDM strategies.

ADELAIDE INTERNATIONAL REPORT

The Adelaide International for 2023 saw two major events ascend on The Drive in the lead in to the Australian Open. Tournament one was hosted from 1 to 8 January and featured a WTA 500 and ATP 250 combined tournament, followed by the second Adelaide International event, a WTA 500 and ATP 250 tournament from 9 to 14 January. Players arrived in Adelaide from early December to train and prepare, meaning the site was a buzz from much earlier this year.

The Drive, freshly completed from the redevelopment, delivered spectacular world class tennis for 79,303 patrons. Week one saw Aryna Sabalenka (WTA) and Novak Djokovic (ATP) take titles, proving the perfect run in to the Australian Open which both lifting the titles in Melbourne. Week two provided a fairy tale ending with lucky loser

Soonwoo Kwon (ATP) taking out the men's title, and Olympic gold medallist Belinda Bencic claiming the women's.

The events in early January hosted saw 260 matches played including qualifiers across two weeks. There were 240 ball kids recruited to be involved over the two weeks of match play and the event hosted 16 of the top 20 women in the world and five of the top 10 men.

The 2023 events were broadcast around the world and the players and fans certainly appreciated the continuity of Adelaide hosting global tennis events over the last couple of years. The tournament attracted a total audience of 14.5m from 3,666 hours of coverage across TV and Digital Streaming

For Linear TV, the event attracted an audience of 9.5m across 2,990 hours of coverage.

For Digital Streaming, the event attracted an audience of 5.1m across 676 hours of coverage.

The largest market by TV audience was Romania, with 1.3 million viewers from 152 hours of coverage across the Digisport network.

The Adelaide International saw the use of 7,400 towels by the players and the competition of 924 bags of laundry. There was 24,480 bottles of water and 2,984 bottles of Gatorade consumed. Plus 2,300 racquets were strung as well as 22 local hitting partners engaged for the event.

Once again, the Adelaide International was more than a tennis tournament. The Adelaide International TennisFest delivered 33 events across two weeks with more than 3,000 participants. More than 200 junior and senior players from around regional SA played in



the Country Carnival after a two year absence due to COVID. The annual Racquets and Strings program delivered 16 different performers across 14 days, including the return of Hans to the stage as part of the first Pride Day/Night experience. Pride Night featuring Hans the German was an event first as part of the entertainment program.

It is also a great way of kick starting

the tennis season, bringing together some of the world's top tennis players for international event that is able to showcase live tennis in Adelaide. Our patron research was again really strong with our customer satisfaction rating stayed strong at 8.8 which is significantly higher than 2020 showing great growth in atmosphere and experience. the net promoter scorer

(likelihood to recommend the event) was also really strong at 71 (versus 43 in 2020). It is pleasing to also see that almost 50% likely to play tennis/play more tennis as a result of attending the Adelaide International.
