

VACCINATION REQUIREMENTS

Only fully vaccinated individuals will be provided an exemption to enter Australia and you must bring with you to Australia a vaccine certificate confirming you are vaccinated. Below we set out the key things you need to know.

What does it mean to be fully vaccinated?

At present, the Australian authorities define 'fully vaccinated' individuals as those that have received:

- ▶ Two doses at least 14 days apart of:
 - AstraZeneca Vaxzevria
 - AstraZeneca COVISHIELD
 - Pfizer/Biontech Comirnaty
 - Moderna Spikevax
 - Sinovac Coronavac
 - Bharat Covaxin
 - Sinopharm BBIBP-CorV (for ages 18-60 only)
- ▶ One dose of Johnson & Johnson / Janssen-Cilag COVID Vaccine.

Seven days must have passed since the final dose of a vaccine prior to entering Australia. Mixed doses are acceptable provided the vaccines are both from the list above.

What are the requirements for vaccination certificates?

Vaccination certificates need to:

- ▶ Be issued by a national or state/provincial-level authority or an accredited vaccination provider.
- ▶ Be written in English or accompanied by a certified translation.
- ▶ Contain at a minimum:
 - your name as it appears in your passport
 - either date of birth or passport number
 - the vaccine brand name (truncated brand names are acceptable – e.g. 'AstraZeneca'), and
 - the date of each dose or the date on which a full course of immunisation was completed.

Paper and digital certificates are acceptable.

What if you have received vaccination doses in different countries?

If you have received vaccination doses in different countries, you can present multiple certificates. You can also present one certificate that lists your vaccination doses received in different countries. A certificate does not have to be issued by the country in which the vaccination was administered.

What if the name in a vaccination certificate is different to the passport name?

As long as your name on the certificate is not materially different to your name on your passport it will be accepted (e.g. it will not be a problem if a middle name is not on your vaccination certificate). If your name on the certificate is materially different to your passport (e.g. your married name is different), it won't be a problem as long as you can show you are the person named on the certificate, such as a marriage certificate or driver licence.
